

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TOP SCHOLARS TO BRING KNOWLEDGE TO SESSIONS

Childhood in American Life

Contemporary historians and scholars whose names are synonymous with the interpretation of America's past will be among the participants at the Childhood in American Life conference.

Henry Steele Commager, Robert H. Bremner, Richard Bushman, Davis Bitton and Richard Jensen highlight the list of distinguished ICH scholars at the program March 30-April 1 at the Children's Museum and Stouffer's Indianapolis Inn.

Commager, whose volumes on the Civil War and American intellectual history have earned him a gold medal from the American Academy of Arts and Letters, currently is visiting professor at Indiana University-Bloomington. His "home" college is Amherst (Mass.) College.

Bremner, a professor of history at Ohio State University, is the author of the three-volume standard text on American youth, "Children and Youth in America: A Documentary History."

The University of Delaware is the home campus for Bushman, whose book "From Puritan to Yankee" earned him the prestigious Bancroft Prize in 1968.

Bitton, professor of history at the University of Utah, also is assistant historian for the Church of the Latter Day Saints (Mormon) and is recognized nationally as one of the country's top Mormon scholars.

Jensen, director of the Family and Community History Center at the renowned Newberry Library in Chicago, also is the author of "The Winning of the Midwest" and a professor of history at the University of Illinois-Chicago Circle Campus.

These five historians will be joined by 26 other ICH scholars, so named because their attendance has been made possible by a grant from the Indiana Committee for the Humanities, in co-operation with the National Endowment for the Humanities.

"The ICH scholars will serve as commentators in the formal conference sessions and they will help spark informal and lively discussions among the community persons attending and the scholars giving papers. This 'dialogue with the community' is an essential element of this entire conference format," explains Warren G. French, professor of English at IUPUI and director of the IUPUI Center for American Studies.

The Center and the Children's Museum are co-sponsors of the three-day conference that will feature a keynote address by Dr. Robert Coles, the Pulitzer Prize-winning psychiatrist-author of the five volume "Children of Crisis." Dr. Coles will speak Thursday, March 30, at 8:30 p.m. at the Children's Museum.

His address, called "Children and Ethical Conflict," is free and open to the public as are the discussion sessions on March 31 and April 1.

There is, however, a \$10 per person reservation charge to attend the conference banquet March 31 at 6:30 p.m. at Stouffer's. The post-dinner program, expected to start at about 9 p.m., is free and will feature a presentation by Donald Pease from Dartmouth College.

An expert on American film, the English professor will speak on "The Child: Paradigm Lost," followed by a showing of "The Night of the Hunter," the 1955 film starring Robert Mitchum. The only movie that Charles Laughton ever directed, "Hunter" chronicles two youngsters' efforts to escape the wrath of a "holy-roller" preacher who has killed their mother.

The State of Indiana, in co-operation with the Division of Public Service of I.U.'s School of Public and Environmental Affairs, has recently been awarded an Inter-governmental Personnel Act Grant to support the efforts of the Indiana Training and Development Project. The project's purpose is to develop job-related training programs for state and local government employees.

One of the initial activities for this project has been the development of a curriculum for government supervisors. In support of this activity, a pilot course covering basic supervisory techniques with an emphasis on human relations skills will be delivered during May, 1978.
