

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## SPOTLIGHT ON AMERICA'S CHILDREN THIS WEEK



Children have always been around, but considering them as something other than, and more than, small adults is a fairly recent invention, only about 300 years old. And probably only in America has the study of children reached into so many academic disciplines so intensely.

All these humanistic disciplines will have their say, as will the comments and conversations from interested community people, at the three-day Childhood in American Life conference Thursday through Saturday at the Children's Museum and Stouffer's.

Sponsored by the IUPUI Center for American Studies and the museum, the program participants are a stellar collage of top-notch historians and scholars. The keynoter is Dr. Robert Coles, the Pulitzer Prize-winning Harvard doctor whose "Children of Crisis" series marks him as a milestone leader in the study of American children. Dr. Coles will speak at 8:30 p.m. Thursday in the Windsor Ballroom at Stouffer's (not at the Children's Museum, as previously announced).

Tennis Anyone? -- The architecture committee of the I.U. board of trustees will take to the full board a proposal to co-operate with the city of Indianapolis in development of a tennis facility that would occupy a portion of the IUPUI campus and private land south of the Law School. The board's approval is only one of several steps needed before construction of a main clay court stadium and 17 adjacent courts could begin. The proposed facility would be the site of the U.S. Open Clay Court Championships beginning in August, 1979. Development of the facility would be financed by the city and private sources.
