POPULAR FAMILY PRACTICE COURSE STARTS TUESDAY

A mixture of leading faculty members of the School of Medicine, practicing physicians from throughout the state, and visiting professors with national reputations will conduct the annual family practice refresher course presented by the Department of Family Medicine, according to Dr. A. Alan Fischer, department chairman.

Part One of the two-part course will be held Tuesday through Thursday at the Indianapolis Hilton Hotel. (Part Two will be held July 18-20.)

Designed for general family physicians in active practice, the course has been popular, drawing an average of 200 or more physicians from the Midwest. It provides a practice-oriented opportunity to review all major areas of medicine, Dr. Fischer said.

Visiting professors for Part One will be Dr. Samuel Nixon, director of continuing education in family practice statewide for the University of Texas, and Dr. David H. Knott, professor of physiology and biophysics at the University of Tennessee at Memphis and an authority on alcoholism and alcohol dependency. Course co-directors are Dr. Fischer and Dr. William L. Hildebrand, assistant professor of family medicine.

PROGRESS REPORT ON PARKING

The I.U. trustees have awarded architectural contracts for three parking garages on the Indianapolis campus, plus two contracts to build a parking lot.

The contracts for the three garages, with a projected total capacity of 3,350 cars, are as follows:

-- Michigan Street West Garage, a 600-car facility to be built west of the Union Building for use by employees of the university and the Indiana State Board of Health. Edward L. Barnes of New York City will be commissioned to do the schematic design and Carl Walker and Associates of Kalamazoo, Mich., will be commissioned to carry the project from schematics to completion. Walker and Associates plan to employ Geupel Architects and Engineers, Inc. of Indianapolis as consultants.

-- Michigan Street South Garage, a mound-design garage across from University Hospital would be built in two phases and eventually hold 1,750 cars. The board approved the hiring of Barnes who will employ as consultants Reid, Quebe, Allison, Wilcox, and Associates, Inc. of Indianapolis and Walker and Associates.

-- Michigan Street East Garage, a mound-type facility on the north side of Michigan Street across from the Engineering and Technology Building, also would be constructed in two phases, with a projected capacity of 1,000 cars. The board awarded a contract to Barnes who will employ the Walker and Reid firms as consultants.

Bonding authority for the East and West garages and Phase One of the South parking facility (with an estimated total cost of nearly \$11-million) has been approved by the Indiana General Assembly.

The low bids of two Indianapolis firms were approved for the construction of a paved parking area between Bright and Blackford streets. The new lot of approximately 500 spaces will partially offset parking areas that will be lost when construction of the Business/Public and Environmental Affairs Building begins this summer near Blake and Michigan. Calumet Asphalt Co. submitted the low bid of \$107,439 for construction of the paved parking area, and Commonwealth Electric Co. had the low bid of \$25,357 for lighting the area. Construction will begin soon.
