## OCTOBER CONFERENCE TO FOCUS ON GLOBAL EDUCATION

Rose L. Hayden, director of the American Council of Education's Division on International Education Relations, and Peter B. Martin, executive director of the American Universities Field Staff, will head a conference on global education October 5-6 at the Indiana Interchurch Center, 1100 West 42nd Street.

"Distant Crises: A Conference on the Issues Facing International-Global Education in the 21st Century" is the theme of the conference which is being sponsored by the IUPUI Office of International Programs, Lectures and Convocations Committee and Division of Continuing Studies. Also the Ford International Visitor's Exchange, the International Center of Indianapolis, the Indianapolis Council on World Affairs, the Indiana Council for the Social Studies and the Indiana Department of Public Instruction.

Major issues that have been addressed by Dr. Hayden include the decline in federal support of international exchanges which range from the exchange of high school students between countries to the scholarly exchanges sponsored under the Fulbright-Hays Act, the significant number of foreign students at some public institutions in the U.S. which is posing increasingly serious political problems, and the shift of support from programs designed to help higher education to programs for the rural poor by the Agency for International Development. She will speak at 10 a.m. Thursday, October 5.

That evening at the 6:30 banquet in the Union Building, Martin will give a presentation of the new public television world affairs series entitled "Global Paper" which will air in November, originating from WQED in Pittsburgh. It is being produced by WQED in association with the American Universities Field Staff with initial funding from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting and Exxon Corporation. The series will offer international viewpoints to Americans and bring a sense of immediacy to impending world crises.

Other speakers conducting sessions include Dr. Dennison I. Rusinow of the American Universities Field Staff; Dr. Aklilu Habte, director of education with the World Bank, and Edward Meador, director of the Division of International Education, U.S. Office of Education.

Many members of the Indianapolis community will participate in the panel discussions (which will be open to audience response) during the conference. Among these is James Morton, director of personnel and public relations for Eli Lilly International who is speaking on "Multinational Corporations and the Global Education Process."

The conference is open to the public. A registration fee of \$2 will be charged for those attending the sessions. Those interested in reservations or more information should contact Joseph Farah, Ext. 7294, at the Office of International Programs.
