AMERICAN COLLEGE OF SPORTS MEDICINE WILL LOCATE HERE

The American College of Sports Medicine, located in Madison, Wis., since its founding in 1954, will move to Indianapolis in August with temporary headquarters in office space in the new natatorium on the IUPUI campus. A new headquarters building will be constructed by 1984 near the Girls' Club National Resource Center at West and Michigan streets. Lilly Endowment has made a \$500,000 gift to the college for development of the structure. The college also will hold its 1986 national convention in Indianapolis.

The announcement was made at a Jan. 14 press conference by Indianapolis Mayor William H. Hudnut and College Executive Director Tom Miller. At the conference Dr. Steven C. Beering, dean of the I.U. School of Medicine, reported the possibility that the International Federation of Medicine in Sports also may move here from its base in Stockholm, Sweden.

The American College of Sports Medicine was established to serve as the professional voice for those engaged in the broad discipline of sports medicine. It has grown to be a prestigious international organization with a membership roster of more than 10,000 persons. Included in that roster are many world authorities on the prevention and treatment of sports-related injuries.

"This announcement is another feather in the city's amateur athletic cap," the mayor said during the announcement. "It should be apparent by now that Indianapolis has come a long way in a very short period of time in its efforts to become the amateur sports capital of the nation." He thanked Bruce Brown, Jim Morris of Lilly Endowment, Dr. Beering, and William Stokely of Stokely-Van Camp for their efforts to bring the college to Indianapolis.

CARTER SUPERINTENDENT NAMED

Dr. Clare M. Assue, professor of psychiatry at the I.U. School of Medicine, has been named superintendent and medical director at Larue D. Carter Memorial Hospital, it was announced recently by Dennis R. Jones, commissioner of the

Indiana Department of Mental Health. She assumed her new duties in the middle of January.

Dr. Assue replaces Dr. Donald Moore, who retired from the position a year ago. Dr. Iver Small, also an I.U. professor of psychiatry, has been acting superintendent.

The new superintendent has been a staff psychiatrist at Carter Hospital since 1958, serving as chief of the Male Services from 1960 to 1977. Since 1977 she has been the Director of Medical Education at Carter. She also has been director of the Psychiatry Residency Training Program for the School of Medicine. She serves on the Continuing Medical Education Committee, the Undergraduate Curriculum Committee, and has been the coordinator for clerkships for junior medical students for the school.

INTERIM COACH NAMED

Ed Schilling, an assistant professor in the School of Physical Education and former basketball coach at Marian College, has been named interim basketball coach for the IUPUI Metros. He will be filling in for coach Mel Garland, who is ill and in University Hospital.
