

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FOREIGN AFFAIRS ISSUES TO BE DISCUSSED

Six IUPUI faculty members will discuss various aspects of world affairs in the eight-week Great Decisions '82 program developed by the U.S. Foreign Policy Association and sponsored locally by the International Center of Indianapolis, Inc., and the Indiana Council on World Affairs at 7:30 p.m. Tuesdays beginning this week (the last session will be on Monday, March 29) at the International Center, 1050 West 42nd Street. (Telephone 923-1468)

A 96-page Great Decisions briefing book, published this January by the Foreign Policy Association (a nonprofit educational organization), provides background and analysis of each of the eight topics. These books may be purchased at the door this Tuesday when registration also will be held.

Purpose of the program is to increase the knowledge and interest of Americans in international affairs as well as to provide a mode by which public opinion can be assessed and forwarded to policy makers.

IUPUI speakers and their topics will be: Dr. Richard A. Fredland, chairman, Political Science Department, "Western Europe and the U.S.: Frictions Among Friends"; Dr. Victor Childers, associate professor, International Business, "Global Inflation: Is There a Cure?"; Dr. Gerald Zimmerman, assistant professor of physiology, past chairman, Natural Resources Committee, League of Women Voters, "Protecting the World's Resources: Is Time Running Out?"; Dr. Bryan Vargus, associate professor of sociology, "Japan: Strategic Ally, Economic Rival"; Dr. Charles Winslow, assistant professor of political science, "The Palestinians: History, Politics, and Conflict"; and Dr. Thomas Fedor, director of International Programs and associate professor of geography, "The U.S.S.R. and Poland: Troubles in the Workers' Paradise." Dr. Fedor recently returned from two years in Poland.

Two additional topics and the speakers presenting them are "America's Defense: What Price Security?" by Capt. Ronald Levin, USAR and former war time contingency plans officer for the Second Support Command, Southern Germany, and "Central America: Fire in the 'Front Yard'?" by Dr. Thomas J. Liggett, president of the Christian Theological Seminary, formerly for many years a missionary to South America.

OPEN LETTER

To: Students, Faculty, and Staff

We want to thank you for your patience, courtesy and cooperation during the recent extreme weather conditions.

There are a few statistics which we thought might be of interest. University grounds crews and a private contractor began snow removal before 7 a.m. Sunday, Jan. 31, and were still working the morning of Tuesday, Feb. 2. They used 15 machines, compiling over 600 machine hours and over 800 man hours to complete the job. An estimate of overtime and contract expenses for this is \$23,000.

Workers had the awesome task of cleaning nearly 12,000 parking spaces, amounting to approximately 77 acres of surface, in addition to about five miles of streets and more than 20 miles of sidewalks. More than 10,000 tons of snow were cleared.

The snow removal was slowed considerably by a layer of ice under the snow, making it difficult for the equipment to get traction. The same problem plagued students, faculty and staff members whose cars became disabled in the streets and parking areas. University police officers, members of the grounds crew, and private wreckers contracted by the University were used to assist more than 200 vehicles.

Weather conditions over the past few weeks have placed an unusual and difficult burden on everyone. We appreciate the understanding of the university community and pledge that our departments will continue to make every effort to accommodate the needs of students, faculty and staff members.

High Blood Pressure? -- Men and women between the ages of 21 and 65 who have blood pressure greater than 140/90 mm Hg are needed to participate in studies of new, experimental medications being conducted by the Hypertension Research Center. Those eligible receive free chest X-rays, electrocardiograms, laboratory tests, medication, and blood pressure follow-up for the duration of the study. All medical costs are paid for by the pharmaceutical company sponsoring the program. Visits are necessary every week or two weeks. The patient's work schedule will be considered, and in some cases evening or weekend visits may be possible. This is a low-cost alternative, providing the latest in drug therapy for patients with high blood pressure. Those interested should call Miss Adkins or Mr. Wagner at ext. 8153.

HONORS & ACCOLADES

Dr. Ralph W. Phillips, associate dean for research at the School of Dentistry, is the author of the 8th edition of the text "Science of Dental Materials," just published by W.B. Saunders Co. Dr. Eugene Skinner wrote the first four editions, and Dr. Phillips joined him as co-author for the 5th and 6th editions, becoming author for the 7th and 8th editions following Dr. Skinner's death. Major contributions to this 700-page text, most sweeping of any of the revisions, were made by members of the dental materials department and other dental school faculty members. The previous edition was translated into five languages.
