Some 32 leading academicians from Indiana and across the country have been selected as Indiana Committee for the Humanities (ICH) Scholars to provide major commentary on the papers being presented this month during the national conference on "Generations -- The Family in American Life." They will join other scholars, community respondents (including IUPUI faculty members), plus an "audience of citizens" to engage in a dialogue about myriad aspects of American family life. Scheduled for March 25-27, the conference will be headquartered at the Sheraton Meridian Hotel (formerly Stouffer's) with many activities at the Children's Museum.

A matching grant from the Indiana Committee, in cooperation with the National Endowment for the Humanities, has made it possible for the conference to invite these ICH Scholars as resource persons. Their main responsibility will be to carry the discussions forward by clarifying issues raised in the papers and to talk about how current research in other disciplines bears on these issues.

DENTAL RESEARCH PARTICIPANTS NEEDED

Approximately 30 participants are needed for a study of the effects of various foods on dental plaque. Those enrolled in the four-week study will be required to visit the Oral Health Research Institute for approximately 1½ hours twice each week for plaque pH measurements. Participants will have their teeth cleaned and be given a fluoride treatment at no charge upon the conclusion of the study.

ALPHABET SOUP

The I.U. retirement plans, TIAA/CREF and PERF, are working toward offering the QVEC (Qualified Voluntary Employee Contributions) option. QVEC is an alternative to IRA (Individual Retirement Account). It permits employees to make tax-deductible voluntary contributions to their employee-sponsored retirement plan if the employer amends the plan to accept them. Employee contributions are tax-deductible up to an annual limit of \$2,000 for each individual and interest earnings accumulate tax free and are taxable when received as withdrawals or annuity income.

Voluntary tax-deferred annuities, through use of the salary-or-annuity option with TIAA/CREF, are already available to Indiana University faculty and staff members. However, this does not prevent participation in an IRA or a QVEC.

GET SET PRAISED

IUPUI's Get SET Program (Skills for Employment and Training Program), housed on Fort Wayne Avenue, recently received the stamp of approval of the private Upjohn Institute for Employee Research. After an in-depth study, Upjohn states in a lengthy report that "Get SET is a very well designed and executed program." What that means for its mostly black, mostly poor and uneducated "clients" is that many of them get jobs and keep them, get GED diplomas, gain enough courage and self-esteem to better themselves and enough basic instruction to go on to more training.

Director of Get SET, Rose Konare, and her staff did not go unnoticed. "The program clearly is staffed by dedicated and competent personnel," the report stated. "The dream of this program was to teach young people ways to survive," said Paula Schneiderman, project designer and manager and assistant director of the

IUPUI Office of Learning Resources. According to the Upjohn study, that objective is being met.

HONORS & ACCOLADES

Dr. George Weber, professor of pharmacology and director of the Laboratory for Experimental Oncology of the I.U. School of Medicine, is the only foreign honorary member of the All-Union Biochemical Society of the USSR. The citation informing him of the appointment states: "We wish to pay tribute to your outstanding scientific achievements in biochemistry, biochemical pharmacology, and theoretical medicine" and mentions the possibility of a representative from Russia participating in the Annual Conference on Enzyme Regulation. (For the past 20 years Dr. Weber has held an annual conference for a select group of world scientists studying and comparing normal and cancerous cells.)

Dr. Nira Ben-Jonathan, associate professor of physiology, gave a seminar on her research to the Department of Hormonal Research at the Weizman Institute of Science, Israel, last fall. She also was an invited participant at the Third International Meeting on Human Prolactin in Athens, Greece.

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
