- * Friday, 4:30 p.m., Children's Museum. Historian Claudia L. Bushman on "History and Historic Preservation: The Family Connection."
- * Friday, 8:30 p.m., Sheraton Meridian. Newsweek editor and author Kenneth L. Woodward on "Grandparents: The Surrogate Generation."

In addition more than 30 discussion sessions Friday and Saturday on every aspect of family life cram the agenda. Nearly 150 visiting scholars and community participants are slated for the discussion sessions. Public participation is invited and encouraged. (There will be simultaneous sessions at the Children's Museum for school-age children.) The academic agenda is supplemented by a Friday afternoon option program: A visit to the Indiana State Library for a genealogy session or a tour to the Conner Prairie Pioneer Settlement.

GENETIC ENGINEERING TO BE DISCUSSED

A lecture, "Molecular Genetics of Herpes Simplex Virus," by Dr. Priscilla A. Schaffer of Harvard University, and a symposium, "Genetic Engineering," will be the highlights of the annual spring meeting of the Indiana Branch of the American Society for Microbiology to be hosted Saturday, April 3, by the Department of Microbiology and Immunology of the I.U. School of Medicine.

The meeting starts with registration in Room 255 of the Medical Science Building at 8 a.m. Contributed papers will be read from 9 to 11 a.m. in Room 205 of the Medical Science Building and in Emerson Hall auditorium. Dr. Schaffer, ASM Foundation Lecturer, will give her lecture at Emerson Hall at 11:30.

After the annual business meeting from 1:30 to 2 p.m., the genetic engineering symposium will be held in Emerson Hall with Dr. Steve Larsen, I.U. School of Medicine, as convener. Dr. Paul Burnett of Eli Lilly & Co. will speak on "Biosynthetic Human Insulin"; Dr. Michael Fennewald of Notre Dame University will speak on "Transposons and Insertion Elements: Mechanism of the Spread of Antibiotic Resistance Genes," and Dr. Stanton Gelvin of Purdue University will present "Agrobacterium-mediated Gene Transfer in Higher Plants."

DeCrow is a staunch feminist and former president of the National Organization for Women, which is pushing for passage of the ERA.
