## HIGH RISK FAMILY PROBLEMS DISCUSSED

Dr. Marshall Klaus, internationally known author and speaker on the newborn, will headline a Neonatal Multidisciplinary Conference focusing on the problems facing families of high-risk infants to be held April 29 and 30 at the Downtown Hilton Hotel by specialists from the Indiana University School of Medicine, Methodist Hospital and Compassionate Friends.

Professor of pediatrics at Case Western Reserve University and co-director of the Premature and Newborn Nurseries at University Hospitals of Cleveland, Dr. Klaus has been honorary lecturer to the International Conference on Infant Studies, the British Pediatric Society, the Swedish Pediatric Society, and the European Perinatal Society. His studies have gained grants and support from national as well as international organizations.

A prolific author on all aspects of health care in infancy and early childhood as well as the effect of familial relationships on the newborn, Dr. Klaus has most recently written on parent-infant bonding and what happens when this important aspect of family development is affected by the loss or separation of the newborn from its parents. His talk is at 9 a.m. Thursday, April 29, and will focus on the responsibilities of the health care professional to the high-risk family.

Other specialists will conduct workshops at 1 and 3 p.m. April 29 and again at 10:30 a.m. and 2 p.m. April 30, dealing with subjects such as the ramifications of letting babies die, parental acceptance of the handicapped infant, community support following the death of a child, and breast milk and the sick newborn.

The conference is sponsored by the Newborn Intensive Care Unit at Riley Hospital for Children and the I.U. Hospitals' Nursing Services for Children and Social Work Department.

## INTERNATIONAL HEALTH CONFERENCE AND BANQUET SET

Dr. John C. Shaw, M.D., orthopaedic surgeon from Louisville who has had extensive medical experience in Korea, will discuss "Rehabilitation of the Handicapped in Developing Countries" at an International Banquet to be held in the Union Building at 7 p.m. Thursday as the climax to a day-long Conference on International Health. The banquet will feature foods from Brazil, China, Honduras, India, Malagasy, Mexico, Sri Lanka and Vietnam. There will be international entertainment.

The banquet will be preceded at 6 p.m. with a "friendship hour" during which attendees are invited to meet and mingle with international students at IUPUI.

The health conference will open at 8:30 a.m. with registration. The first of its kind for this campus, it will dwell on various issues facing Third World

countries, from drug abuse to smallpox eradication. All sessions will be in Room 103 of the School of Nursing. The conference is open to everyone with no registration fee. #### NOTICE FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT

Professional organizations have, on occasion, requested that their membership dues be deducted from payroll checks. Indiana University has honored such requests for non-academic staff for several years. This practice is also available for faculty organizations. For the employee's convenience, individual faculty members may request payroll withholding for dues to organizations in which membership is held for reasons of professional interest, including unions. Payroll programs within this category cannot be initiated for an organization without participation of 100 of those eligible to vote in the IUPUI Faculty Council election and will be discontinued if the number of participants falls below 75. Each payroll withholding program may be discontinued by the University administration (1) if a request cannot be accommodated within existing withholding procedures, or (2) for other reasons deemed sufficient by the Indiana University Treasurer.

The faculty member must submit written authorization for payroll withholding and may terminate the deduction by giving notice in writing to the Payroll Department.

#### WEAVER TO SAY FAREWELL

Professor Robert E. Weaver will bid farewell to Herron School of Art faculty members, students and staff when he retires from his 36-year teaching career

at the close of the 1982 Spring Semester. The Herron School of Art Alumni Association will pay tribute to him with a special "Weaveroast" from 3-7 p.m. next Sunday, April 25, at Herron.

The "Weaveroast" will carry a circus theme, selected because of Mr. Weaver's life-long affection for the circus. (He designed and supervised construction of the circus wagon that houses I.U.'s calliope.) Born in Peru, Ind., he was friendly with many great circus personalities and he knows circus life intimately. (For many years Peru was the winter home for major circuses.)

Mr. Weaver received a bachelor of fine arts from Herron in 1938. Among his many accomplishments are two medals from the Beaux Art Institute of Design in New York City for outstanding performance in mural design, and the John Armstrong Chaloner Award -- known as the Paris Prize -- for three years of study abroad.

After serving in the Navy during World War II, Mr. Weaver joined the Herron faculty in 1946. He has taught painting, mural design, drawing and illustration, and highlights of his teaching career are the many competitions in which his students have won awards. He has maintained an active painting and exhibition schedule which he intends to expand during his retirement. In 1981-82 one of his large pastel drawings, "Butterfly Ladies," was chosen for "Center Ring: The Artist," a traveling exhibition which focuses on 200 years of circus art. This exhibition, organized by the Milwaukee Art Museum, opens at the Corcoran Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C., on April 24.

In his retirement, Mr. Weaver and his wife, Betty, will move to Tarboro, N.C., where his son Matt plans to open a gourmet restaurant. Mr. Weaver will operate an art gallery in the same building.

High Blood Pressure? -- Men and women between the ages of 21 and 65 who have blood pressure greater than 140/90 mm Hg are needed to participate in studies of new, experimental medications being conducted by the Hypertension Research Center. Those eligible receive free chest X-rays, electrocardiograms, laboratory tests, medication, and blood pressure follow-up for the duration of the study. Visits are necessary every week or two weeks. The patient's work schedule will be considered. This is a low-cost alternative, providing the latest in drug therapy for patients with high blood pressure.
