



THIRTEENTH IUPUI COMMENCEMENT TODAY

A total of 3,684 degrees will be awarded by Indiana University and Purdue University for the 17 schools and divisions on the Indianapolis campus at the 13th annual commencement for IUPUI to be held at 3 p.m. today at the Indiana Convention-Exposition Center. Among the larger classes will be almost 300 degrees in medicine, more than 400 in engineering and technology and more than 300 in business.

Dr. Daniel X. Freedman, Chicago, an internationally acclaimed leader in psychiatric medicine and research, will be awarded the honorary Doctor of Science degree, and the honorary Doctor of Laws degree will be awarded to Dr. W. Bruce Welch, Richmond, Va.

Bestowing degrees earned from the Purdue schools at IUPUI will be R. Joseph Rudolph, executive director of the Purdue Alumni Association. Richard B. Stoner, president of the board of trustees of I.U., will induct I.U. graduates. Student representative for the Purdue graduates is Patrick Annin Therrman who is receiving a bachelor's degree in engineering and technology, and David Wayne Craig, president of the IUPUI Student Assembly, will represent the I.U. graduates. He is receiving a bachelor's degree in business.

With this commencement, the number of persons who have been graduated from the Indianapolis campus will pass the 37,000 mark.

No speeches are scheduled, just introductions and the academic rites. Most of the schools will have post-commencement meetings to sort out diplomas and conclude the final business of graduation.

Dr. Freedman, a native of Crawfordsville, holds a degree in social relations from Harvard University cum laude, the M.D. from Yale, and was graduated from the Western New England Institute for Psychoanalysis. He has continued to make important contributions to medical research for 30 years while functioning as a dedicated teacher. He presently is chairman of the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Chicago. Under his guidance the department enjoys international stature.

Dr. Welch is professor of psychology at Virginia Union University, Richmond, where he organized and served as head of the Department of Psychology and was director of the School of Education and Psychology and vice president for academic affairs. His distinguished career as an educator and psychologist has been marked by a commitment to the disadvantaged. He received the A.B. degree from Livingstone College in North Carolina and the M.S. and Ed.D. degrees from I.U.

SUZANNE KNOEBEL ASSUMES PRESIDENCY OF ACC

Dr. Suzanne Knoebel, assistant dean for research at the I.U. School of Medicine, was installed last month as president of the prestigious 11,000-member American

College of Cardiology at the organization's annual scientific session in Washington, D.C.

Also Herman C. and Ellnora D. Krannert professor of medicine and associate director of the Krannert Institute of Cardiology, Dr. Knoebel is actively involved in the three primary missions of the School of Medicine and the Medical Center -- patient care, research, and teaching. She has led the development of extensive new clinical programs in cardiology at I.U. as well as Wishard Memorial Hospital and the Krannert Institute.

Dr. Knoebel was among the first American heart specialists chosen to visit China to observe medical practice there at the invitation of the government of the People's Republic. American Sponsors of that trip were the American College of Cardiology and the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs of the U.S. State Department.

MAY 7 BOARD OF TRUSTEES ACTION

Inclusion of dependent children among those eligible for fee courtesy was approved by the Board. Dependent children of full-time faculty and full-time staff employees on appointment prior to the beginning of a semester or summer session will be entitled to a fee courtesy consisting of the credit of one-half of the resident undergraduate fee rate at the campus where the child enrolls. The policy becomes effective beginning the Fall semester, 1982-83.

New I.U. Budget Approved

Budget of more than \$673 million for the second year of the present biennium shows an increase of about \$44 million over the current year. Students' share of the general education fund rose from 29 to 34 percent. This change and a slight increase in enrollment almost entirely made up for the decrease in tax dollars.

In presenting the budget, vice president Edgar Williams explained that student fees will generate \$16.8 of the \$18 million increase in the general education fund. He said particular emphasis had been placed on increasing salaries and benefits, student assistance, library acquisitions and academic computer capacity. Student assistance will increase about 17 percent over the current year, he said. The general education fund in Indianapolis will be increased by 5.9 percent.

"Population in the Third World" will be the focus of the second IUPUI Third World Study Series Workshop to be held from 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon weekdays from June 28 to July 14 in Room 108 of the School of Nursing Building. The topic will be discussed from various viewpoints by outstanding faculty members who are specialists in the areas of economics, education, political issues, cultural issues, communication and health problems. Population impacts upon the third world individual and society will be highlighted.
