


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ANOTHER CALL FOR PAPERS

Papers dealing with any area of nursing practice are being solicited for the Ninth Annual Patient Care Research Colloquium to be held Nov. 23 by the Patient Care Research Seminar, Indiana University Hospitals, I.U. School of Nursing and Sigma Theta Tau, nursing honorary.

Papers may be presented either at the general sessions or in a table session. The deadline for receipt of abstracts is Sept. 20. Abstracts should include a statement of the problem, subjects used, design, procedures for data collection and analysis, major results and conclusion. Include presenter's preference for presentation at the general sessions or the table sessions, and a copy of the presenter's vita. Papers selected for general presentation will be limited to a total of 30 minutes, which is to include at least 10 minutes of discussion. Authors will be notified of the decision about selection by Sept. 27.

Symposia which focus on a variety of research topics also are planned.

DEATH AND DYING WORKSHOP

A three-credit workshop on death and dying is being offered to teachers, school personnel, professionals in the health field and all interested students from June 21 to July 2 by IUPUI Continuing Studies. It will meet from 8 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in the School of Nursing Building.

William L. Yarber, associate professor of health education at Purdue University, will teach the workshop, an education course in Social Studies (M514). Topics will include the processes of death and dying, the death of a relative or friend, grief and bereavement, funeral practices and body disposal, suicide and self-destructive behavior, death and the law, children and death, and death education.

MORE ON MATCHING TEACHING AND LEARNING STYLES

As an extension of the popular presentation at the annual Learning Resources Symposium, Charles Yokomoto (Engineering and Technology), along with Ron Britton

(Education) and Roger Ware (Psychology) are offering a workshop to present an in-depth look at the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator (MBTI). Participants will have the opportunity to complete the inventory, learn to score it, interpret it, and relate it to brain dominance research. Group exercises will help participants experience the four scales of the MBTI. No prior experience with MBTI is necessary.

The workshop will be held Thursday, June 17, from 2 to 5 p.m. in Cavanaugh 139. Advance registration is essential. POPULATION IN THE THIRD WORLD

"Population in the Third World" will be the focus of the Second Annual IUPUI Third World Study Series Workshop to be held June 28 through July 14 in Room 108 of the School of Nursing Building. Thirteen outstanding faculty members who are specialists in economics, education, political issues, cultural issues, communication, and health problems will discuss the topic. Population impacts upon the third world individual and society will be highlighted.

The workshop meets from 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon on weekdays. It is sponsored by the IUPUI Office of International Programs and the Division of Continuing Studies.

The Third World encompasses more than 100 developing countries of Asia, Oceania, Africa and Latin America; more than half the world population; and more than half the world land mass.
