


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THE SPORTING LIFE AT IUPUI

Our campus is about to become a mecca for summer sports fans who will witness some of the finest events in the country here -- the USA-USSR dual track meet July 2-3, the National Sports Festival July 23-31, and the U.S. Open Clay Court Championships Aug. 1-8.

We should be proud to have thousands of visitors on campus to see some fine athletic competition, to have a national audience via TV coverage, to "experience" our brand new sports facilities and, not too incidentally, to learn what an IUPUI is. All this, of course, means a vast increase in traffic and, somewhere in the back of many minds is probably lurking the concern: Where am I gonna park?

Not to worry.

The folks in the IUPUI Police Department and Parking Services have plans to minimize any inconvenience. Here are some guidelines:

1. At all times during these events, faculty and staff members and students may park in any lot for which they have a valid permit. (Don't forget that 1982-83 parking stickers should be on your cars in July.)
2. Invariably, there will be times when traffic is heavy for certain events. (During the sports festival, however, it is estimated that the heaviest traffic will come on Friday evenings and weekends, times which should not affect that many IUPUI-ites.) At any rate, during these heavy-traffic times, certain parking lots will be restricted to IUPUI personnel. These lots are: #77, east of the Engineering and Technology Building; #78, east of the Business/SPEA Building; #86, west of the law school; #75, west of Cavanaugh Hall; #80, west of the Lecture Hall; #81, south of the Lecture Hall.
3. These and some other lot entrances will be closed during certain scheduled events. This will permit University Police and Parking Services personnel to restrict parking in these lots to IUPUI faculty and staff members and students only.
4. In general, festival traffic entering the campus on Michigan and New York streets will be directed to park in lots between those streets. Except for the East Garage, sports traffic will not be permitted to park north of Michigan Street, i.e., in the Medical Center area. Sports traffic will be urged to enter the IUPUI campus westbound from Michigan and West streets, and eastbound from New York Street and White River Parkway, and then to follow police signs and directions to available parking lots.

As mentioned before, most of the heavily attended events will be held on Friday evenings and weekends and will not interfere with normal university parking. Traffic will be monitored continuously to maintain adequate parking for IUPUI personnel. If questions, call Parking Services, ext. 4637.

USA VS. USSR DUAL TRACK MEET

Who: Each country's finest men and women athletes competing in 36 different events.

What: The USA vs. USSR Dual Track Meet, The Lite Summer Games presented by Indiana National Bank and The Athletics Congress.

When: July 2, 6:30-9:30 p.m., including opening ceremonies, Up With People program; July 3, 9 a.m.-6 p.m., closing ceremonies, including Up With People program.

Where: I.U. Track and Field Stadium-Indianapolis (IUPUI).

Why: The finest in world-class athletics.

How Much: Reserved seats are \$10/day, \$20/weekend. General admission is \$7/day, \$14/weekend.

How To: Tickets on sale at all outlets of Ross & Babcock, all L.S. Ayres locations and Hilton Hotel on the Circle. You can get coupons good for \$1 off the single ticket price at all INB branches.

NATIONAL SPORTS FESTIVAL

Who: 2,600 athletes, more than 800 coaches and trainers, 3,000 volunteers, national media -- all converging on Indianapolis, IUPUI included.

What: The National Sports Festival, an activity of the U.S. Olympic Committee.

When: July 23-31.

Where: At 19 sites throughout Indianapolis, including the new School of Physical Education/Natatorium Building, the Track and Field Stadium and adjacent Athletic Fields on the IUPUI campus. (Competition in eight sports will be held at IUPUI.)

Why: To see a preview of the Americans destined for the 1985 Olympics in Los Angeles.

How Much: Prices vary from \$2.50 to \$8 for an event. For information about the National Sports Festival, call 634-1982.

How To: Tickets can be ordered by calling 639-4444 and charged to either your VISA or MasterCard. Also, you can buy tickets at Market Square Arena; Ayres in Lafayette Square, Greenwood, Glendale, Washington Square and Downtown; Ross & Babcock in the Hilton Hotel on the Circle. Tickets, while still available, will also be sold at all competition venues on the day of an event. Only selected events at MSA and the Convention Center will have reserved seating; all other sites will have general admission seating. Any ticket bought for an event at Eagle Creek Park will allow you to see any other event held there that particular day.

What: The 1982 All-Star Music Festival.

When: June 26-July 2, performers appearing each night in order listed above.

Where: Indianapolis Sports Center, 725 West New York Street.

Why: Summer fun.

How Much: Ticket prices range from \$7 to \$15 per performance.

How To: Order tickets by calling 925-5211. Buy single performance tickets at the Symphony Box Office at Clowes Hall, Ross & Babcock at Hilton on the Circle, all L.S. Ayres stores, and -- starting June 21 -- at the Indianapolis Sports Center Box Office.
