



TENNIS, ANYONE?

Guillermo Vilas of Argentina, ranked Number 2 in the world, has joined the list of tennis stars competing for the Clay Court Championship title . . . the one title on clay that has eluded him. Defending champion and fellow countryman Jose-Luis Clerc will attempt to become only the third man ever to win the title three years in a row. Others in the tournament at the Indianapolis Sports Center Aug. 1-8 include Swedish sensation Mats Wilander, Italian Open Champion Andres Gomes of Ecuador, Jose Higuera, Eddie Dibbs, Mel Purcell, and Wimbledon doubles champions Peter McNamara and Paul McNamee of Australia.

The women's draw will be filled with an extensive international field including West Germany's Sylvia Hanika, the only player to beat Wimbledon Champion Martina Navratilova this year. Others entered include last year's runner-up, Virginia Ruzici of Romania, and Ann Smith of the U.S.

Qualifying rounds for women start Friday (July 30). Men's qualifying rounds start Saturday. There will be no charge for seeing these first two days of the qualifying rounds. Over-the-counter ticket sales are at the Sports Center. Advance sales for the \$450,000 tournament are said to be going well, with the entire South Stands already sold out.

New Service -- Campus mail is offering a new free service to all IUPUI departments. Your outgoing first-class letter mail will be picked up by your campus mail carrier, run through a postage meter, sorted by zip code, and taken directly to the U.S. Post Office sorting room. All this costs nothing except the postage used -- plus, all your Indiana first-class letters will receive a 1¢ per piece discount. Call for Proposed Papers -- The Indiana University Committee for the Bicentennial of the Federal Constitution of 1787 has issued a call for proposals for papers on topics having themes in the living Constitution or in the constitutional development of the country from the late eighteenth century to the present. These papers will be presented in a series of lectures from Fall 1982 through Fall 1987. An honorarium of \$4,000 will be awarded to each successful applicant. Celestial Navigation -- For the first time, this course to prepare boaters for offshore navigation and world cruising will be offered to the general public in Indianapolis. It can be taken for engineering credit or audited. The course starts with the celestial coordinate system and a review of the earth's coordinate system. It develops the theory of the navigational triangle and the projections from celestial to terrestrial systems. The altitude intercept method is presented and its use in determining position. A description of and technique for using the marine sextant is included. Sight reductions and complete solutions to navigational problems will be evolved for both the nautical and air almanacs. Electronic equipment including gyrocompasses, loran, omega and other navigational aids will be discussed. The course meets at the Krannert Building on the 38th Street Campus from 5:45 p.m. to 7 p.m. Thursdays starting Aug. 26. For further information call Prof. R. C. Eggleton at ext. 4386.

Canal Treasure -- A cash register, a safe, part of a car with "lost" identification numbers, a motorcycle and bicycles are part of the artifact collection retrieved from the downtown portion of Central Canal amid more than 360 cubic yards of rubbish during a clean-up operation in July sponsored by the White River Park Development Commission in an effort to begin improving the canal's operation and appearance from 17th Street south to Military Park. Contractors also installed a bypass culvert on the southeastern corner of the park to improve water flow and enlarge the water capacity of the canal as it enters an underground channel. The clean-up project cost \$38,748. Letters will be sent to nearby residents and businesses adjacent to the waterway to seek volunteer assistance in better maintaining the canal.

Chemistry of Heterocyclic Compounds -- The IUPUI Department of Chemistry will offer a graduate course in modern heterocyclic chemistry to meet from 7:15 to 8:30 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday in Room 259 of the Krannert Building, 1125 E. 38th St., during the fall semester. This course in conjunction with the recently announced symposium -- Pyridine Chemistry: New Synthetic Methods and Industrial Applications -- offers Indianapolis area chemists an exceptional opportunity to become cognizant of significant new developments in the field of heterocyclic chemistry.
