



## EXPANSION PLANNED AT IUPUI COLUMBUS

A fund raising drive now is in progress for a major building program at IUPUI Columbus which will involve a 50 percent expansion of classroom and laboratory space, several new programs and a shared campus with Ivy Tech at Bakalar Municipal Airport.

Proponents of the plan expect that Columbus will have a college campus with about 3,000 students by 1985. The fund raiser will be the largest such project in Columbus since 1954.

Highlighting the kick-off of the \$900,000 campaign was the announcement that the city of Columbus has decided to give the former administration building at Bakalar Municipal Airport to Indiana University for a permanent home for IUPUI Columbus. (Since 1971 the building and grounds have been leased to IUPUI by the city.) Estimated value of the building is \$2.9 million.

Plans have been completed for major corporate and foundation supporters to match all private contributions three times over a two-year period. That means that a gift of \$25 in each of the two years from an individual will bring in a total of \$200 for the fund drive. Based on the tax write-off, the \$25 gift would cost the contributor about \$8.

Community members heading the project hope that the gift of the building by the city and the successful \$900,000 campaign will persuade the legislature to provide another \$1 million to add classrooms and equipment to IUPUI Columbus, enabling the university to add new classes to its business, engineering, nursing and computer technology programs. The addition would provide another 20,000 square feet of space. Ivy Tech already is building a new facility across the street from IUPUI Columbus. Promoters feel that the two institutions sharing the same campus will improve the city's chances of attracting new industry. Co-chairmen of the fund drive are Henry B. Schacht, chairman of the board of Cummins Engine Co., and James K. Baker, president of Arvin Industries. Dr. Paul Bippen is director of IUPUI Columbus.

REMEMBER TO GIVE BLOOD TUESDAY

You may give the gift of life itself by donating blood any time between 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. Tuesday (Sept. 14) in Room 2126 of the Education/Social Work Building. Make arrangements ahead of time with your supervisor. Note: The date was wrong in last week's calendar.

The blood solicitation is being made by the Central Indiana Regional Blood Center, the source of much of the blood used for transfusions at the Indiana University Hospitals. The expanded donor program will help meet the growing needs of the I.U. Medical Center, according to Donald R. Franklin, executive director of the Blood Center. Donors must weigh at least 110 pounds, be between the ages of 17 and 65 and be in good health. They must pass a brief health check-up and medical history interview to ensure the well-being of the donor as well as the recipient. Donors are asked to bring identification with signature and proof of age.

DENTAL RESEARCH VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Volunteers over age 21 for a study to compare different clinical examination procedures for detecting hypersensitive teeth (teeth that become uncomfortable when exposed to hot or cold air, foods or beverages) are needed by the Oral Health Research Institute. Participants will have their teeth cleaned at no cost and will receive all toothbrushes and toothpaste necessary for home use. The hypersensitivity must be associated with gum recession, erosion, or abrasion. It cannot be related to the presence of cavities, large fillings, or gum disease.
