

## RONALD McDONALD HOUSE TO OPEN

**G**rand opening ceremony for the Ronald McDonald House will be held at 10 a.m. Thursday at the house, 1235 West Michigan Street, across from Ball Residence. It will be open for touring from 7:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. Friday, and from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday.

The \$1.6 million Ronald McDonald House was designed to meet a pressing need for a geographically convenient, comfortable and affordable place for parents to stay while their child is in the James Whitcomb Riley Hospital for Children, especially infants in the Newborn Intensive Care Unit and older children in the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit. In addition to providing a place to rest, this new facility will help keep the family together and enhance the support they may obtain from other parents during a time of great stress. In addition to this priority use of the house, families may be accommodated while their child is being provided ambulatory care at Riley, or care at other hospitals in the city.

The house is an extension of the Riley philosophy of care, according to Dr. Morris Green, physician-in-chief at Riley and director of pediatrics. "Parent participation plays a preeminent role in our hospital for children," says Dr. Green. "This splendid home away from home is in the tradition of the Baxter Parent Care Pavilion, the Parent Education and Participation Unit and the practice of encouraging parents to be with their children during hospitalization at Riley."

Unusual in that it represents a partnership between the McDonald Corporation, volunteers and private donors, and the I.U. community, the house includes 24 bedrooms, great room, kitchens, complete manager's apartment, laundry, quiet rooms, library/reading room, TV/recreation room, music room and outdoor play area. Archonics, Inc., is the architect, and Construction Management Services, Inc. has been the construction manager.

Lona Damron, a member of the staff of the School of Medicine dean's office, has been appointed house manager.

Responsibility for making the dream come true must be shared by a group of parents (most of whom have had children treated at Riley), physicians, and McDonald's restaurant operators throughout Indiana, joined by thousands of contributors and volunteers who designed, built, furnished and will support the house. The nucleus group established a non-profit corporation, Our House, Inc., to direct the project. Cost of the house will be met through fund-raisers by McDonald's operators and from contributions of materials and services -- furniture, appliances, toys, etc. Operating funds to maintain the house will come from a modest fee charged to those using it.
