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HERRON ARTIST REPRESENTED IN WHITE RIVER STATE PARK

Herron School of Art Graduate Rinaldo Paluzzi, internationally known artist, has designed a 33-foot piece of stainless steel sculpture called "Totem" which will become part of the White River State Park when it is dedicated in a ceremony to be held at 4:20 p.m. Tuesday (Nov. 9) where it will be installed, northeast of the Pumphouse Visitors Center, 801 W. Washington St.

The 10,000-pound sculpture will be set into a 40-foot diameter concrete base, to serve as a sundial, with a light for night illumination. It was fabricated locally by Mitchum-Schaefer, Inc.

The White River Park Development Commission accepted the privately commissioned Paluzzi sculpture at the recommendation of its Arts Council last spring. The artist, who presently resides in Spain, once was an art instructor at Seccina High School. The award-winning Seccina band will play at the dedication.

NOBEL PRIZE WINNER TO SPEAK

Dr. Charles B. Huggins, who won the Nobel prize in physiology and medicine in 1966 for proving that chemicals can be used successfully in the treatment of cancer, will speak on the subject of breast cancer at 8 p.m. Monday (Nov. 8) in the Lecture Hall. The first in IUPUI's 1982-83 Distinguished Lecturer Series, his lecture is co-sponsored by the Department of Experimental Oncology of the School of Medicine.

The series, that also will include Stewart Udall, Ashley Montagu and Gwendolyn Brooks, is free and open to the public.

A native of Nova Scotia, Huggins earned his M.D. degree at the Harvard University School of Medicine and has since worked at the University of Chicago where he was director of the Ben May Laboratory for Cancer Research for many years.
