ENGINEERING AND TECHNOLOGY ADDS COMPUTERS

The School of Engineering and Technology is among the first few schools nationwide mounting an ambitious computer-aided engineering and technology education program.

The school presently is providing desk-top computer terminals to all of its 50 faculty members because it is "essential that engineering schools reinforce research and teaching with the latest in technology," says R. Bruce Renda, dean of the school. And, since any "faculty member older than 30 probably went to college before the advent of the computer age, each is being given the opportunity to learn about, and work with, computers. Anything short of this kind of approach in today's computer-oriented society would be disastrous."

All computer hardware and software at the various sites and campus locations within the I.U. system will be tied together through an eventual two-phase "computer communications system and network," Renda said. Phase I presently provides linkage for the terminals to Computing Services on West Michigan Street and to the East 38th Street campus. By next fall, the computer system will tie into the entire IUPUI data communications network.
