

## GOODWILL HONORS IUPUI

**G**oodwill Industries of Central Indiana recognized the many cooperative relationships it has with Indiana University-Purdue University at Indianapolis at its 53rd Annual Meeting and Awards Program on April 12. At the ceremony, Dr. Glenn W. Irwin Jr., I.U. vice president for Indianapolis, a valued member of Goodwill's board of directors, accepted an award which expressed Goodwill's gratitude for the many benefits it derives from its neighbor. (Goodwill Industries headquarters is at 1635 West Michigan Street, just across the river from IUPUI.)

Goodwill has had interns from the Schools of Business, Social Work, and Physical Education, as well as from the Department of Psychology in the School of Science. Other students have served as volunteers to read for some of the blind trainees. The IUPUI Continuing Studies Division has conducted word processing classes at Goodwill.

Trainees in Goodwill's custodial training program perform custodial work for the Ronald McDonald House, and trainees from the food services program are receiving on-the-job training at I.U. Hospital. Several Goodwill graduates have been employed by IUPUI, and plants grown in Goodwill's greenhouse have been offered for sale at various locations on the campus. Several faculty and staff members serve on some of Goodwill's advisory committees or have conducted training sessions for Goodwill staff.

Goodwill Industries of Central Indiana, with rehabilitation centers in Indianapolis and Muncie, provides vocational and rehabilitation programs and services to handicapped and disadvantaged persons throughout central Indiana.

## TRUSTEES APPROVE PERSONNEL CHANGES

I.U. Trustees approved several personnel changes for faculty and staff members at IUPUI at a meeting held in South Bend on April 9.

Dr. Carl W. Newton, associate professor of endodontics in the School of Dentistry, was named chairman of the department effective April 11. He had been acting chairman.

Dr. Stuart A. Kleit, professor of medicine, was given the additional title of assistant dean for clinical affairs in the School of Medicine effective April 15.

Kristin A. Froehlke, who has been acting director of academic computing at IUPUI, was named director effective April 15. She also is an adjunct lecturer in computer and information science for the Purdue University School of Science at IUPUI.

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In other action, the Trustees approved leasing space in the I.U. Natatorium to United States Synchronized Swimming, Inc., for the organization's national headquarters. The swimming group, which will relocate its headquarters from Arizona, will occupy offices at the south end of the concourse level. A similar agreement was approved by the Trustees last October for U.S. Diving, Inc.

#### DENTAL HEALTHCARE ENROLLMENT OPPORTUNITY

If you were enrolled in healthcare assistance plan prior to July 1, 1982, and declined enrollment in the dental option at its initial offering effective July 1, 1982, your next opportunity to enroll will be for an effective membership July 1, 1983. Such enrollment, if desired, must take place in the Personnel Benefits Department on the first floor of the University Services Building before June 15, 1983. Those who are on a 10 month appointment should give special attention to this need.

#### UNIVERSITY RELATIONS INTERNSHIP OFFERED

A 12-week minority internship is being offered by the IUPUI Office of University Relations during the coming summer. It is open to minority students who are majoring in journalism, public relations, or English, at the undergraduate or graduate level at any of the public university campuses in Indiana. Only Indiana residents may apply.

The internship will be 20 hours per week at the minimum wage. The intern will receive experience in public relations, community relations, news media relations, hospital relations, and publications. Beginning and ending dates will depend on the availability of the intern.

#### GOVERNOR PROCLAIMS OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY WEEK

DO YOU NEED HELP IN LOWERING YOUR SALT INTAKE?

If your doctor has advised you to lower your salt intake and you have experienced difficulty in doing so, I.U. investigators may be able to help. Dr. Friedrich C. Luft, professor of medicine, and his colleagues are studying the usefulness of a test stick that tells the amount of sodium in your urine. If your diet is unsuccessful, the stick will tell you so immediately.

The program is coupled with a detailed course of instruction on how to lower the salt in your diet, which is conducted by Ms. Cathy Lang, a dietician who is an expert in the field.
