

IUPUI HOSTS FIRST PSYCHOLOGICAL ABUSE CONFERENCE

The first-ever International Conference on the Psychological Abuse of children and Youth will be held at IUPUI Aug. 8-11. Between 100 and 150 persons from throughout the world are expected to attend the conference, which is being sponsored jointly by the I.U. School of Education at IUPUI and the National Association of School Psychologists through the office for the Study of the Psychological Rights of the Child located at IUPUI. Grants from Lilly Endowment and NASP have provided funding.

The conference is designed to investigate and compile data on the problem on a large scale through the participation of concerned helping professions (psychology, psychiatry, social work, education and law), lay and religious advocacy groups and others. While it is almost impossible to document and difficult to define, the problem of the psychological or emotional abuse of children and youth is believed by experts in the field to be more widespread and possibly more damaging overall than physical abuse and neglect.

According to Stuart N. Hart, conference project director and project director of the Office for the Study of the Psychological Rights of the Child, eight major areas of psychological abuse of children will be under scrutiny. They are mental cruelty, sexual abuse and exploitation, living in dangerous and unstable environments, drug and substance abuse, influence by negative and limiting models, cultural bias and prejudice, emotional neglect and stimulation deprivation, and institutional abuse.

Hart, an expert in psychological development, is outgoing president of NASP, associate professor of educational psychology at IUPUI, and adjunct professor of psychology at the Purdue University School of Science here. Dr. Edward C. Most recently acting dean for academic affairs at I.U. Kokomo and special assistant to I.U. Vice President Glenn W. Irwin Jr., Dr. Moore served as executive dean and dean of the faculties at IUPUI until his retirement from that post last year. He also served as a professor of philosophy and director of the Peirce Edition Project, a 20-volume collection of the writings of the pragmatist-philosopher Charles S. Peirce.

RIVERPOINTE OFFERS HOUSING FOR FAMILIES OF PATIENTS

Riverpointe Suites, high rise apartment and motel facility across the river from the Medical Center (1150 N. White River Parkway, West Drive), has a program for families of patients in the I.U. Hospitals needing overnight accommodations.

Riverpointe will provide housing in its two-and three-bedroom suites, in a rooming house fashion (e.g. two ladies or gentlemen in a two-bedroom suite) for \$15 per person per day. If a family would like an entire suite, one will be provided for \$35 per day. Some suites are capable of sleeping up to six persons. Each suite has one, two or three bedrooms; living room with dining area; fully equipped kitchen; service bar; complimentary continental breakfast; message service; complimentary local telephone service; cable TV; valet; on-premise parking; housekeeping services; security services; on-premise convenience store. To qualify for these rates the patron must have a Riverpointe Suites card, which may be picked up at the Emergency Admitting Room desks in University, Riley, V.A. and Wishard Hospitals.


