



## FACULTY CHALLENGE AIDS WIAN

**F**our School of Education faculty members-- Mike Cohen, John Harris, Ruth Holland and Terri Jump--are challenging faculty members of other IUPUI schools to join them in helping the WIAN public radio station fund drive.

The four are donating autographed copies of their most recent books: "Children in Peril" by Holland; "INWAYWIN" Indian Viewpoint" by Jump; "Student Discipline: Legal, Empirical and Educational Perspectives" by Harris, and "Expanding Children's Thinking through Science" by Cohen.

## SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM OUTLINED

The Upperclass Outstanding Scholarship Program again will be conducted at IUPUI. So far 31 outstanding students have received scholarships worth \$1,000 each.

We wish to see that all eligible students take advantage of this program. We hope that you will advertise it among the students in your school and nominate up to three candidates to Barbara Thompson, Upperclass Outstanding Scholarship Program, IUPUI Scholarship and Financial Aids Office, by March 2. Criteria for Upperclass Outstanding Scholars are:

- \* Completion of 26 credit hours at IUPUI by end of semester in which nominated with a cumulative grade point average of 3.5,
- \* potential for two remaining semesters in normal course of academic progress,
- \* must be full-time student for duration of scholarship tenure,
- \* three letters of reference reflecting academic excellence; commitment to scholarly inquiry that is reflected in activity beyond the usual bounds of classwork,
- \* breadth and depth of academic activities; range of classes, extracurricular and community activities reflecting intellectual involvement, significant and nature of community involvement,
- \* if a transfer student, consideration of quality of academic work at previous institutions as reflected in transcript,
- \* students who already have received a baccalaureate degree are not eligible.

The Scholarship is renewable for a maximum of three years provided the student maintains a minimum GPA of 3.5. Financial need is not considered in making these awards. A student may not concurrently receive both an Outstanding Upperclass Scholarship and a renewal of an Outstanding Freshman Scholarship.

#### EDUCATION LECTURE SERIES SET

Kenneth S. Goodman, professor of Education at the University of Arizona and a well known applied psycholinguist, will be the featured speaker at an I.U. School of Education Lecture Series in the Lecture Hall on Feb. 13.

Goodman will discuss "Tests as the Principal Instrumental Device for Discrimination" from 2 to 3:30 p.m. in Room 103 followed by a question and answer session. The second session, "A Profession at Risk or Why Everyone Dumps on Teachers," will be from 7 to 8:30 p.m. in Room 102. After a question and answer period there will be a reception at 9 p.m.

Goodman is an expert in understanding reading and other language processes in order to contribute to the improvement of teaching and learning. He has developed a theory of miscue analysis, characterizing the process of learning to read as a psycholinguistic guessing game. His ideas have stimulated wide discussion in the field of education.

#### NICOTINE GUM APPROVED

Cigarette smokers who really want to break the habit may find help in a nicotine

gum recently approved by the Federal Drug Administration. Dr. Arden Christen, associate professor and chairman of the Department of Preventive Dentistry at the I.U. School of Dentistry, led the study that was instrumental in getting the FDA approval.

"While it's not a cure-all, the new product will be dynamite for those who wish to quit," Dr. Christen said. One of the surprising results of the study done at the Oral Health Research Institute is that the gum is most effective for heavy smokers--those more addicted or dependent on nicotine.

Available only by prescription and marketed by Merrell Dow Pharmaceuticals of Cincinnati, the gum should be available by March.
