

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IUPUI AWARENESS CAMPAIGN BEGINS

IUPUI is about to embark on a project that may help make this campus even more of a household word. It is, for want of a better title, an EXPERTS LIST.

Over the past few years it has become evident to many in the news media that academic institutions are tremendous reservoirs of information on about every subject. We in the News Bureau have talked with many of you, eliciting your comments on wide ranging issues or putting you in touch with reporters. The response of the faculty and staff members has been terrific, and your willingness to talk to the media has played an enormous role in "putting a face" on this campus.

Also, it has become apparent that the media's desires for the opinions of experts are not going to die down. In our increasingly complex world, these desires will only expand. Almost at the same time, members of the IUPUI faculty and staff have expressed an eagerness and enthusiasm to make this campus even more "visible." Those who attended last fall's Community Service Symposium can attest to such interest from both members of the media and the university community.

So, with the encouragement of faculty and staff members, the News Bureau is undertaking the compilation and publication of an Experts List covering the entire campus here. Our aim is to canvass the faculty and staff this spring--primarily through the Green Sheet list, but also by personal inquiries (and whatever else it takes)--to computerize and compile the list over the summer and publish it next fall. Its receivers will be the news media, locally, regionally and nationally.

VERY SOON--either with the Green Sheet or under separate cover--you will be requested to let us know your areas of expertise--generally and specifically. Please keep in mind that members of the media do not need to talk with Nobel Laureates in any subject; they do want to talk to people who are intelligently informed on subjects and who can speak "in English." Such an Experts List will give them not only such sources to comment on existing stories, but also will give them ideas for stories of their own.

It cannot be stressed enough that this project--if it is to succeed--will need your active cooperation and, indeed, enthusiasm. If at any time you have questions or suggestions, please feel free to call me or any member of the News Bureau staff--Pam Perry, Shirley Rogers, Charlotte Hughes Wright, Jim Grim--and we will be delighted to help. Also, we would be glad to come and explain this further before any group of interested faculty or staff members, such as a departmental meeting or any assemblage of faculty and/or staff. We--and a number of you--think that this is an exciting project that can have positive results for us all.

ASSISTANT AFFIRMATIVE ACTION HEAD NAMED

Ceilia Grace Hawkins has been named assistant director of the affirmative action program at IUPUI. She succeeds Deborah Hamilton, who now is University director of affirmative action for Indiana University.

Ms. Hawkins received her B.A. degree in psychology from Fisk University at Nashville, Tenn., and a master's degree from I.U. in college student personnel administration. At present she is working on a doctorate degree in higher education administration. Her work experience includes serving as assistant manager of the Summer Youth Employment Program for the Indianapolis Public Schools System, instructor for the college life seminar at IUPUI, specialist with the Race Desegregation Training Institute of I.U., state coordinator of the Reduction of Sex Bias of the Indiana State Board of Vocational and Technical Education, assistant state coordinator of the Comprehensive Employment Training Act Vocational Service and job developer for the Indianapolis Skills Center. She has done extensive consultation work and counseling with various school, youth and civil rights groups.

NORTHBOUND WEST STREET CLOSED

An eight-block section of West Street between Eleventh and New York Streets will be one-way south beginning March 20, according to the Indianapolis Department of Transportation. The northbound lanes will be closed. The section is scheduled to reopen for northbound traffic in October, but completion could be delayed.

The closing of the northbound lanes of West Street is a result of reconstruction of the street into a four-lane divided highway. Construction also includes storm drainage, left-turn lanes, new traffic signals and other work.

DOT plans to reroute northbound traffic east on New York Street to Senate Avenue.

AN INVITATION FROM THE ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

H.E. Francis, distinguished writer and teacher, will be the guest of the IUPUI English Department for three days, March 26, 27, and 28. As a teacher, Francis has won four Fulbright Awards. He also has had an award winning career as a writer. His stories have appeared in innumerable magazines and have been widely anthologized. In 1977, the American Film Institute made a movie of his story, "A Chronicle of Love."

A 1935 trial of a black man accused of raping a white woman in Alabama is the focal point of a Listeners' Theater production to be presented at 8 p.m. March 23, 24, 30, and 31 in Room 108 of the Mary Cable Building. Mike Scott, director and writer of the interpretation of the story based on excerpts from the Pulitzer Prize novel To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee, said the performers will place a heavy emphasis on vocalizing the story rather than acting.
