



MODERN TO PROVIDE MANUAL FOOD SERVICES

«Big improvement--real nice," "I like it." These were but two of the pleasant reactions from staff, faculty and students in the School of Dentistry lower lounge when they inspected a new "reach-in" food service installed recently by Modern Food Systems, Inc. An affiliate of the Indianapolis-based Modern Vending Co., Inc., Modern Food Systems has contracted with IUPUI to provide all non-hospital manual (non-vending type) food services on campus. Modern Vending President Elliott Nelson said last week that the change from university- to Modern-operated service will be smooth, and "The campus community can expect quality food served in sanitary, esthetically nice surroundings--and at competitive prices."

The new operation in the dental school was installed over a weekend and is a 45-foot bank of colorful food service modules. The menu includes a salad bar, hot and cold sandwiches, fresh soup and three entrees daily. Modern has also begun manual service in the cafeteria and delicatessen at the Union Building and in the lounge area of the University Library. The Hoosier Room in the Union Building will remain closed until a study for the type of service to be offered is complete. Manual food service will remain separate from vending services, which Modern has operated on campus for eight years. Catering of food for all functions on campus must go through the Union Building Catering Office (Ext. 7358) and catered by Modern, according to the contract.

Overseeing operations from offices in the Union Building are Modern Vending executives David Szymanski, corporate director of food services, and Ray Trotta, on-campus food service director. Szymanski has extensive experience including food administration at the University of Missouri and food service director at L.S. Ayres & Co. Trotta has 30 years' experience in food service and is a graduate of the hotel and restaurant management program at Cornell University. He was also director of food service at Ayres.

In an agreement with IUPUI, Modern accepted employment applications from all IUPUI food service personnel and, while some opted not to work for Modern, "a preponderance of our staff here are the same people who worked for IUPUI," Nelson said. Those who were in food management with IUPUI, and are now with Modern include George Hart, cafeteria manager; Mary Heffner, manager of catering and concessions, and Mary Compton, supervisor in charge of cafeteria food production.

LAW SCHOOL GETS \$90,000 LSC GRANT

"A prototype for the I.U. School of Law-Indianapolis equal to a 'teaching hospital' will begin soon," announced Dean Gerald Bepko, following a \$90,000 grant to the school from the Legal Services Corporation in Washington, D.C. The law school was one of eight nationwide to be given the grant that is intended to support a research project conducted by the LSC that is designed to test the effectiveness of law school clinics in delivering civil legal services to poor individuals, said LSC President Donald P. Bogard, 1971 alumnus of the school. The grant will also enhance the school's civil practice clinic which provides hands-on experience for students and will increase greatly the numbers of poor to receive civil legal services. Project director is Professor William Marsh, who prepared the grant, along with assistance from Academic affairs Dean Jeffrey W. Grove.

CAPTAIN KANGAROO KICKS OFF CONTEST

"Captain Kangaroo," Bob Keeshan, and Dr. Dorothy Webb, were keynote speakers at a luncheon last week that kicked off a national children's theater playwriting competition, sponsored by the IUPUI Children's Theatre, which Webb directs. The competition is made possible in part by a grant from Melvin Simon & Associates, Inc., which also sponsored the luncheon and press conference. Awards will include a first place prize of \$2,000. In an eloquent address that stressed the importance of good theater for children, Webb said, "This playwriting competition is designed to encourage both established and emerging playwrights to turn their talents to creating outstanding dramatic literature for children. Without good dramatic literature, we have no foundation on which to build artistically meaningful theater for young audiences." Deadline for entry forms is Sept. 1, and for manuscripts, Nov. 1 A full production of the winning play and staged readings of the semi-finalists will be the centerpiece of a March 1985 major children's theater symposium at IUPUI.

VOGEL IN CHINA WITH PROJECT HOPE

Elizabeth Vogel, assistant director of the I.U. Hospitals, is on a two-month tour of duty with Project Hope in Xian Province, China. One of six administrators in the nation to participate in the project, she will be teaching practicing administrators and educators principles of ambulatory care management, hospital administration and quality assurance. She will also lead an inventory of ambulatory care services provided at the Xian Medical College. She will return late August or early September.
