

Raboteau, author and professor of religion at Princeton U., speaking on "Martin Luther King and the Tradition of Black Religious Protest", Sept. 27, 2:30 p.m. in Lecture Hall, Rm 104, and Richard L. Bushman, professor of history at the University of Delaware, speaks on "Religion and the Self: Christianity and Gentility in 19th Century America," on Sept. 27 at 8:15 p.m. in Cavanaugh Hall, Rm. 237. ### HUNDREDS TO HEAR NEWEST ON HEART EXAMS

About 300 physicians and technicians from across the country will attend the 10th annual symposium of the largest national meeting on echocardiography, ultrasound heart examination, on Oct. 1-3 in Indianapolis. Sponsors are the American College of Cardiology, the I.U. School of Medicine and the Krannert Institute of Cardiology at the Medical Center. Two experts in the field, Dr. Harvey Feigenbaum, distinguished professor of medicine, and Dr. James Dillon, associate professor of medicine, both of I.U., will present their latest developments in this non-invasive technique of heart visualization.
