

HARVARD'S LEDER IS FIRST BEERING AWARD WINNER

When Dr. Steven Beering resigned last year as dean of the I.U. Medical Center to become president of Purdue University, the faculty and alumni decided to establish a continuous award in his honor, and the first recipient is Dr. Philip Leder, professor and chairman of the department of genetics at Harvard Medical School. The endowment that each year will award \$10,000 to an outstanding scientist who has made significant contributions to science on the international level came from private gifts--the majority from faculty within the medical school here. Dr. Leder is in the vanguard of molecular biological research, especially in the field of research on oncogenes--genes involved in the development of cancer. On Oct. 17, at 8:30 a.m., in Emerson Hall, Dr. Leder will receive his gift and a medal from Dr. Walter J. Daly, dean of the medical school. Dr. Leder will lecture before the presentation on, "Misplaced Oncogenes: A Molecular Basis for Malignancy," to faculty, staff and students. Dr. Eugene C. Klatte, distinguished professor and chairman of the department of radiology at I.U. is chairman of the award selection committee.--PP

The I.U. 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University Writing Center Workshops

Fall Semester 1984

All workshops are in the Writing Center, Cavanaugh 427, (264-2049). Any faculty member, staff, or student is welcome.

- Thursday, September 20 2-3 p.m. Using Your Journal Productively
This workshop distinguishes between diary and journal writing and focuses on the journal as a source of ideas for writing essays.
- Wednesday, September 26 12:30-1:30 p.m. Verb Formation for ESL Students
This workshop focuses on verb tenses, forms, and choices for students whose English is a second language. Idiomatic uses of prepositions after verbs are also discussed.
- Thursday, September 27 10-11 a.m. Overcoming Writer's Block
This workshop is for students who are overwhelmed with writing those first words on a sheet of paper. Students discuss how to manage their own writing environment and how to apply unblocking techniques for each stage of the writing process.
- Monday, October 1 12-1 p.m. Writing Strategies for Discovering Ideas and Planning Papers
Students learn about, practice, and evaluate several strategies to help get through the early stages of a writing assignment.
- Thursday, October 4 10-11 a.m. Using Wordstar on the IBM PC
Participants are introduced to a simplified version of Wordstar for composing and revising. Participants have priority for individual practice within the following week. (Workshop limited to ten participants.)
- Wednesday, October 10 11 a.m. - Noon Essay Exam Preparation
How do students unravel those seemingly endless test questions created by an instructor? What can students do when writer's block attacks - just as they are handed an essay exam? This workshop, open to students of all disciplines, is designed to answer such questions and ease students through pre-exam jitters.
- Thursday, October 11 1-2:30 p.m. Problems in Composing Business Letters
Workshop participants review basic guidelines for succinct, clearly worded, well organized letters and then focus on specific problems faced by group members. Participants should bring copies of problem letters they have received, written, or may be in the process of writing. (This session is restricted to Personnel Training Participants.)
- Wednesday, October 17 10-11 a.m. Writing About Literature
This workshop designed especially for students enrolled in L115 emphasizes critical analysis of literature. Students explore frequent problems and solutions to carrying on literary discussion.

- Friday, October 19 11 a.m. - Noon Using Wordstar on the IBM PC
Participants are introduced to a simplified version of Wordstar for composing and revising. Participants have priority for individual practice within the following week. (Workshop limited to ten participants.)
- Monday, October 22 1-2 p.m. Moving from Draft to Final Product
This workshop demonstrates how a writer moves from a messy rough draft to a polished final product. Students are encouraged to bring a work-in-progress.
- Tuesday, October 30 2-3 p.m. Being a Reader of Your Own Writing
Students examine techniques for critiquing their own writing and learn how to make a plan for revising their essays. Students should bring their own writing samples for analysis.
- Wednesday, November 7 Noon - 1 p.m. Revising Strategies
Revision covers a wide range of activities, but it starts with re-seeing a paper - gaining some distance from the creation of brain and pen. Participants learn new techniques for making a paper say what its author means. Also included are editing and proofreading tips.
- Thursday, November 8 10-11 a.m. Being Specific
Participants analyze student papers illustrating the contrast between specific writing and that which over-generalizes. They discuss concrete versus abstract word choice and various strategies for adding specifics to their own papers.
- Thursday, November 15 Noon - 1 p.m. Documentation
Students discover reasons for documentation and formats appropriate to their disciplines. Students should preferably bring with them drafts of their research reports.
- Wednesday, November 28 10-11:30 a.m. Basic Grammar Skills
This workshop provides a review of basic grammar and punctuation guidelines. (This session is restricted to Personnel Training Program participants.)
- Monday, December 3 Noon - 1 p.m. Essay Test Preparation
In time for final examinations this workshop emphasizes strategies for analyzing essay exam questions and for approaching test taking.
