


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NEW LAW: OPEN WIDE AND LET ME SEE YOUR NAME

When your dentist asks you, "Which do you prefer on your new teeth--your name or your social security number?" he or she will be complying with a new Indiana law that went into effect Sept. 1. Don't worry however, because if your dentures or partials are marked with a method being taught by Dr. A. George Wagner (director) and Dr. Joe G. White, both professors in complete dentures at the School of Dentistry, your name or social security number will not be apparent when you open your mouth, nor will you be able to feel the markings. The law is not as ridiculous as it may seem at first glance. Dr. S. Miles Standish, a forensic specialist in dentistry at the school, explains. "This will be useful for those in the helping professions such as hospitals, extended care centers and nursing homes who take care of the inform, senile, mentally ill, surgical patients or those who suffer some type of trauma that prevents them from knowing who they are. It is not unusual for disoriented or seriously ill people to mislay their dentures. The identification will help in these cases, and also it will help greatly in identifying persons who have met with foul play or are killed in mass disasters...."-CHW

COURSE ON FAMILY VIOLENCE AHEAD OF ITS TIME

Seven years ago when the course, Violence in the Family, began here and at Bloomington, it was built around new and untested theories that now are accepted. Theories that include the belief that in a family where there is spouse abuse, there is likely to be child abuse and vice versa. Elizabeth Navarre, associate professor of social work at the School of Social Work, teaches the course that has had inquiries from as far away as England. While she believes law enforcement and abuse laws are important, she points out that family violence should be treated wholistically, and that child, spouse or elderly abuse are not separate entities, but a cyclical abuse pattern that may be part of a family's whole dynamics. She also notes happily that attitudes and law are changing toward not permitting abuse against women and children.-SAR

NUMBERS OF FOREIGN LANGUAGE STUDENTS ON THE RISE

There are more teachers of English in the U.S.S.R than speakers of Russian in the U.S. and there are more Japanese businessman in New York City who speak English than Americans who speak Japanese in the entire world, says John D. Barlow, associate dean in the School of Liberal Arts and former director of foreign language programs here. That may be changing as more students in the nation and here at IUPUI opt for learning a second language. We have 29 students of Japanese, 17 students of Russian, 246 students of Spanish and yes, 16, students of Latin. IUPUI also offers Chinese, French, German, Italian, Arabic, Hebrew and weekend schools of Korean, German and Estonian for children and Adults. To evaluate the study of foreign language here, Vice President Glenn W. Irwin, Jr. has formed a foreign language advisory committee that is headed by Richard A. Fredland, chairman and professor of political science. Results should be released sometime in 1985.-J.G.
