


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FREE VEHICLE EMISSIONS TESTS BEGIN HERE

Next Monday (Mar. 31) the largest single voluntary vehicle emissions inspection program in Indianapolis will be launched on campus. Now, through mid-May, students, faculty and staff, in just three minutes, can have their gasoline engine vehicles tested at no charge to determine if the vehicle complies with federal Clean Air Act Standards. Drivers will receive an on-the-spot report on the condition of their vehicles. If there is a problem, they will also receive a list of all Firestone, Goodyear and Guarantee Auto service shops in Indy that are offering discounts on more comprehensive engine analysis tests, which usually cost \$20-25, but will be performed for \$10 for emissions testing participants. Beginning Apr. 1 testing equipment will be located under the Business/SPEA Building, where it will remain. It is expected that the equipment will be made available to Herron and 38th St. some time in the next six weeks. Testing is weekdays, 7:30 a.m.-11:30 a.m. No appointment is necessary. Vehicle engines must be warmed up. Transportation Services personnel and student volunteers will conduct the test.

AGNES ROAD WORK BEGINS AFTER FINALS

You will see some flagmen on Agnes Street between New York and Michigan sometime after finals around May 8. That is when a two-stage road construction project begins. Stage I will involve the west side of Agnes, and traffic will become one-way SOUTHBOUND until it is finished sometime around mid-June. Construction moves to the east side of Agnes for Stage II. While the area will be congested, traffic will be two-way until work is completed around July 21. The service area cut on Agnes at Cavanaugh Hall will stay open through both stages.

Then, around July 31, construction begins on Agnes, north of Michigan. Access to University Hospital will be maintained, and the Agnes/Locke Sts. jog will also remain open. Traffic will be congested but there will be flagmen to help out. This project is expected to be finished by Oct. 17. (See page three for bridge closings east of campus.)

The Telecommunications Project Office announces that now through June 13 Indiana Bell Telephone (IBT) will be transferring special circuit pairs, currently leased from IBT, to the new university cable facilities. Special circuits are circuits used for data transmission, fire or burglar alarm systems, metering systems for clocks, electrowriter systems and any other circuit not associated with a telephone number. It is recommended that system equipment vendors or maintenance contract vendors for systems using special circuits be made aware of the circuit conversion and be available in the event that equipment needs reset, reterminated or reconfigured. Contact people must be identified to work with IBT for circuit testing. These people should be knowledgeable in your system operation and available to work with IBT during circuit transfer.
