


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FAMILIES JOIN HEALTH CARE PEOPLE FOR BROAD LOOK AT ALZHEIMER'S

Dementia of the Alzheimer's type and related disorders will be considered by health care professionals and by family members who care for the victims of the disease in an all-day conference on Mar. 10. "Alzheimer's Disease: Challenges of Comprehensive Care" is sponsored by the Dept. of Psychiatry at the School of Medicine, the IU Center on Aging and Aged and the Indiana Federation of Alzheimer's Support Groups. Morning lectures will focus on the scientific approach--diagnosis, treatment, behavioral management. Medical people and family members will meet for an afternoon session, where the practical aspects of the disease will be considered. Family members will share their experiences in caring for demented patients. Focus will be on the psychological, ethical, economic and legal aspects of care. Featured speakers will include Albert Heyman, M.D., Duke University; Irene Moore, A.S.C.W., University of Cincinnati, and Gary W. Small, M.D., UCLA Neuropsychiatric Institute. Fees are \$25 for health professionals and \$10 for family members of Alzheimer's patients, and they include materials and lunch. Registration deadline is Mar. 4. Call Carol B. IUB OFFICE CAN SAVE ALIENS A LONG, EXPENSIVE TRIP

While it may seem expedient, the direct approach by hiring units to immigration or congressional offices for securing permanent visa status for prospective faculty and other personnel who are foreign nationals can cause expensive and even extremely undesirable complications and obstacles. These problems can be avoided. Securing visas and other immigration-related paperwork and verification can be handled at no charge by the Office of International Services at IUB. In fact, certain immigration-related matters continue to be processed exclusively by that office. For instance, all applications for Alien Employment Certification, submitted on behalf of aliens employed at any IU campus, must bear the signature of the office's director, associate dean Kenneth A. Rogers, or visa specialist Martha Wailes. Dean Rogers points out that some aliens or foreign nationals mistakenly believe they must hire private counsel to make application for employment. "They can spend thousands of dollars doing this, when our department can do it all at no charge. We have a good track record for providing correct application forms and information," he said. TIME TO THINK FULBRIGHT AND OTHERS

Faculty interested in work abroad via Fulbright Scholar Programs or other programs should consider application now. "Even if faculty and graduate students make application on time, too often they learn that the arrangements for leaving the university must be made before May," said Pat Biddinger, program officer, IUPUI Office of International Programs. Materials for applying for the 1989-90 competition for Fulbright Scholar Awards will be available in late April. PROF. JEGEN'S TAX TIPS: GRANTS/SCHOLARSHIPS CAN COUNT AS WAGES

When figuring your taxable income, you can exclude scholarship and fellowship grants only if you are a degree candidate and only then for tuition, course fees, books, supplies and equipment. Otherwise they are taxable and to be treated as income. You may become keenly aware of that even before tax time because if your grant monies come through the IUPUI Office of Research and Sponsored Programs, you will find 20 percent automatically comes out as income tax. Gifts are tax free, but you and your accountant must know the difference between a gift and a scholarship or fellowship grant. You must be able to prove that the donor of a gift was motivated by family or philanthropic reasons and that you are the only recipient. More simply, unless a grant you receive is given by a relative or a charity, you cannot treat it as a gift on your tax returns.

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
