


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CAMPUS TO JOIN IN NATIONAL RACISM TELECONFERENCE

While IUPUI is not one of them, many universities and colleges across the nation are experiencing blatant and more subtle sorts of racism--again. To help prevent problems here and to address the causes, containment and cures for racism, the IUPUI Office of Affirmative Action is sponsoring "Racism on Campus: Toward an Agenda for Action" on Mar. 22 in the auditorium of the University Conference Center, 11:30 a.m.-3 p.m., with a break for lunch. There is no charge and registration is not necessary. Acting Director of Affirmative Action Lillian Charleston urges faculty, staff and students to join her in the live teleconference that will feature faculty, administrators and students who were directly involved in campus racism. Experts in the field of race relations also will be included and there will be a phone hook-up for interaction from this campus. The three-part conference will include an historical and contemporary perspective of racism, case studies of racial incidents and the conditions which precipitate confrontation and the issues surrounding it, with the final focus on successful models and approaches for handling racism and an agenda for action to promote equity education. The program originates live from Wingspread in Racine, Wis., and is sponsored by the Governors State University and The Johnson Foundation. students and white educators most likely to be found counseling them about
higher education. Alvin S. Bynum's 40-year career in education, 10 of it as
dean of University Division at IUPUI, "nagged" him into writing "Black Student
-- White Counselor" from ideas and real situations that have been incubating for
over a decade. Beginning with longhand notes on legal pads and short bursts on
an old typewriter at home, the 117-page compendium was finally written on a computer. A
terse history of blacks in this country and a self-test for bias are included. He warns
that, if we fail to get and keep black students in higher education, they will become a
permanent underclass. Strong advice is given, as is a reading list for academic counselors
and others in higher ed. About the distance between the races, Bynum quotes Martin Luther
King Jr.: "In human relations the truth is hard to come by, because most groups are
deceived about themselves." The book is published by Alexandria Books, Inc., and is
already included in the data bank of the National Clearinghouse of Academic Advising.

PROF. JEGEN'S TAX TIPS: RETIREMENT DOES NOT STOP TAXES

If you are planning to retire in a "timely" fashion, that is, after you are 59 1/2 years old, and you opt to take a lump sum, you can figure your taxes by using the one-time only five-year averaging which, in effect, treats the lump sum as if it were being paid to you over five years. The amount is taxed separately from any other income. When you receive annuity payments from your retirement plan, a portion of each payment reflecting your own contributions on which you have already paid tax is not subject to further taxation. The rest is taxable, so you are taxed when you receive amounts reflecting contributions made by your employer, as well as investment income. Remember, too, that the old three-year-rule under which initial payments from an annuity, up to the total amount of your contributions, could be tax-free, has been abolished.

IAS LOOKING FOR DOZEN GOOD FELLOWS, NO ITINERANT SCHOLARS

A clearer, more centralized mission that will promote high-quality research projects of faculty at all IU campuses is announced by the new director of the Institute for Advanced Study, Henry H.H. Remak. Commending earlier work at the IAS, he notes in a recent letter that the Institute will become more focused and will appoint from 10-12 fellows annually, but will not "chip in on one or two-night stands of visiting scholars, or co-sponsor lectures, meetings or conferences, unless they are an integral part of our mission." It also notes that intellectually outstanding persons of any kind, rank, age or provenance are eligible as fellows, provided they are essential to significant faculty scholarship. He urges joint proposals from Indianapolis, Bloomington and regional campuses. Articulate, well thought-out-proposals are welcome. Faculty can call anytime on SUVON, 6-703-5-8307.


