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## "THE MIRACLE WORKER" OPENS ON CAMPUS APRIL 15

William Gibson's powerful drama, "The Miracle Worker," based on the life story of Helen Keller and her tutor Annie Sullivan, is set for four performances by the University Theatre April 15-16 and April 22-23. J. Edgar Webb, professor and director of IUPUI theater, directs the play which is set in Victorian America in Alabama in the 1880s. It centers on the trials of the Keller family whose young daughter Helen lost sight and speech to illness. Over-indulgent parents and siblings endure the child's animalistic behavior until Annie Sullivan, herself a victim of blindness, arrives to begin Helen's education. Helen is played by Allyssia Wise, Annie by Kate Lawton, Captain Keller by Bradley Brewer and Kate Keller by Peggy Gritt. Performances are at 8 p.m. in the Mary Cable Building Theatre. The performances on April 15-16 will be signed for the hearing impaired by Donna Harris and Joyce Ellinger from the Indiana School for the Deaf. ## NEED HOST FAMILIES IN 10TH YEAR OF SHARING BY FOREIGN SOCIAL WORKERS

In the past 10 years more than 120 social workers from 60 nations have come to Indianapolis to work in the community and to learn about America from families, many from IUPUI, who volunteered to house and befriend them. This year the School of Social Work-Council of International Programs (CIP) international exchange welcomes 13 people from such countries as Ethiopia, Ghana, Mexico, Peru, Austria and Iceland. Director of the IU-CIP, David Metzger, associate professor, invites everyone to participate in the program. Host families are needed for two periods--May 1-June 10 and June 11-Aug. 7. Host families will provide the foreign guest with a private room, weekday morning and evening meals, weekend meals and transportation. The visitors will be working in hospitals, social agencies and other social areas and will be encouraged to use public transportation when possible. Individuals can also volunteer to share in this important cultural exchange by becoming involved in activities with the guests such as sharing a family outing, a cultural event, a camping trip, or to lend an ear or provide transportation. The group arrives on campus Apr. 27 and will spend three days in an orientation retreat at McCormick's Creek State Park. ## YOUNG FEMALES AWAIT FUTURE PRINCE CHARMING

Despite changes in women's roles in the past two decades, girls and young women of the '80s suffer from "Cinderella Syndrome," the misguided belief that they will marry a man who will take care of them and their children for the rest of their lives. These findings and others are among the data in a study done by Linda L. Haas, associate professor of sociology and director of the women's studies program at IUPUI. She and Mary Hiers, a graduate student in the School of Social Work, questioned and studied the responses of 347 randomly selected Indianapolis females, ages 6-24, about their expectations toward role-sharing. Their findings were among the presentations at the national conference on campus, "Women in the Year 2000", held last week. About the traditional attitude, Haas said, "Culture is saying women's most important role is in the home, and the girls reflect what culture is saying." She notes that because of economics and their own preference, today's young women, like 70 percent of young mothers today, will work outside the home. Yet 70 percent of young women say they will stop working when they have children. "They want it all. They want to go to college, get a job, get married in their mid-to-late 20s, then stay home and raise their children. Some are in for a rude awakening."--J. Grim

### STOKES IS '88 HINE MEDAL WINNER

The "unique and significant contributions to I.U. at Indianapolis" have earned Lillian Gatlin Stokes the I.U. Alumni Association's annual Maynard K. Hine Award. An associate professor of nursing, Stokes was described by her dean, Elizabeth Grossman, after an earlier award as "a positive, caring and outstanding teacher and contributor to the school and the community." The medal will be presented during an invitational reception and dinner on April 13 at the Columbia Club. Stokes serves on many university committees and is active in her school's alumni association. She has co-authored two books and has published numerous other academic works. She has many awards for service and teaching and is listed in Who's Who Among Black Americans and Who's Who Among American Women. The Hine medal was struck in 1974 as a tribute to Dr. Hine, the first chancellor of IUPUI, who has dedicated most of his life to expanding educational opportunities at this campus.
