

NEW NATIONAL GROUP JOINS PHILANTHROPY CENTER

Spurred by recent changes in tax codes and increasingly complex economic relationships, a group of fund raisers and financial advisers has formed a new organization, the **National Committee on Planned Giving (NCPG)**, and has established headquarters on campus, in conjunction with the year-old I.U. Center on Philanthropy at IUPUI. Organizers will work to further education and training of the planned giving community and allied professionals and to establish effective communication among the independent organizations of these professionals. They believe the new group will strengthen the "bridges into the future" that not-for-profit organizations can provide American society through planned giving. The NCPG is a federation of 27 chapters of local and regional planned giving councils representing charitable organizations, universities, hospitals and community organizations throughout the country. President David Clough, director of planned giving and special gifts for the Rutgers Foundation, believes the membership will double in the first two years. A major project of the NCPG is a national conference Oct. 31-Nov. 2 at the Center for Philanthropy, which will focus on current economic, tax and marketing information vital to effective planned giving programs and on techniques for organizational planning and development with allied professionals. TOP CANCER RESEARCHERS CONVENE HERE FOR IMPORTANT CONFERENCE

The medical and personal issues surrounding leukemia in adults and children and bone marrow transplantation will be the focus of a conference of national significance, Apr. 28-29, at the University Conference Center. Sponsors are the I.U. Bone Marrow Transplantation Program and the Leukemia Society of America, Indiana Chapter. Faculty and researchers from the I.U. Medical Center and other top cancer research institutes such as Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center and Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine will focus on unrelated donors to successful bone marrow transplantation programs, the success of bone marrow transplants in treating acute leukemias which are most common in children and chronic leukemias which are most common in adults, and how advances in genetic engineering can change the future of the program. Experts in cancer-related research and health care will focus on ethical issues and the anxiety, social adjustment and isolation of patients and families and of their grief and suffering when a transplant fails.--P. Perry.

RESEARCHERS NEED MEN AND WOMEN IN THREE SEPARATE STUDIES

Caucasian women 40-60 years old, who have not had a period for one-six years, who are not on estrogen therapy and have not had a hysterectomy, are needed for research of a non-estrogen experimental drug to reduce bone loss. Requires visits every three months for two years; includes tests for bone density, metabolic blood, and other important factors in osteoporosis. Participants will be paid. Healthy women 50-70 years old who are post-menopausal and not on estrogen therapy are needed for a 16-day study of a new drug to stimulate bone growth. Clinical and biochemical exam will be performed on day one, an injection will be given on day two, and participants will be seen 10 mornings (no weekends) for an hour or less. Blood and urine samples required. Subjects completing study will receive \$150. Call Susan at the number above.

People 18 years and older with high blood pressure are needed for out-patient studies of two FDA-approved drugs that are on the market. All visits, blood pressure medication, lab studies and EKGs are free for duration and long-term follow-up is available free on request. Visits are brief and can be scheduled around work. JEGEN'S TAX TIPS: IRS RE-EXAMS TREATMENT OF STIPENDS AS INCOME

The IRS recently instructed district and service center examination offices on the treatment of the exclusion of teaching or research stipend income from gross income of graduate students for tax years before 1987. The IRS said that taxpayers who have been assessed taxes as a result of an examination of a stipend exclusion can file a claim for refund or abatement of these taxes. If you were a bona fide grad student in a university or college doing degree requirements no different than others, you probably meet a the three-part test of Revenue Ruling 75-280. Call your tax person and refer to IR-88-65.


