



19TH COMMENCEMENT SWELLS LIVING ALUMNI COUNT TO 70,000

Proud faculty, families and friends will see 4,016 degrees from I.U. or Purdue bestowed in IUPUI's 19th annual commencement, May 15 at 3 p.m. in the Hoosier Dome. Vice president Gerald L. Bepko will preside in ceremonies that also will bestow an honorary I.U. doctor of science degrees on Purdue President **Steven C. Beering**, former dean of the IU School of Medicine and on **Cornelius W. Pettinga**, a retired executive vice president at Eli Lilly and Co., whose research is credited with advancing medical science. An honorary Purdue U. doctor of engineering degree will be conferred on a distinguished 1940 alumnus, **Richard B. DeMars**, chairman of the board of Geupel DeMars, Inc., a leading construction firm in the state. Student representatives for the more than 2,000 black-robed men and women expected to participate in ceremonies are Patricia Brown, social work, for I.U. and Elizabeth Chesnut, science, for Purdue. The last of eight IU commencements this spring, IUPUI's ceremonies have been shortened, and for the first time in many years it does not fall on Mother's Day. The 74th U.S. Army Band will provide music for graduates, friends and families, and they will hear briefly from Lt. Gov. John Mutz and Indianapolis Deputy Mayor John Krauss. John A. Ruby will lead the national anthem and Fr. Jeffrey Godecker from the IUPUI Newman Center will lead the invocation and benediction. President Beering and IU President Thomas Ehrlich will confer 2,952 undergraduate degrees, 504 graduate degrees and 560 professional degrees in law, medicine and dentistry, bringing to about 70,000 the numbers of living alumni who have earned degrees from this campus. IUPUI's 17 schools and divisions are planning separate ceremonies before or after commencement on campus, in the Hoosier Dome or at the Indianapolis Sports Center. Diplomas will be available after commencement. The Alumni Office makes the arrangements for the thousands of students, deans, directors, faculty, staff and guests involved in commencement ceremonies.

JAMA PRINTS IMPORTANT STUDY BY THREE MED CENTER RESEARCHERS

The May 6 issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA) includes a study by School of Medicine researchers Dr. Myron Weinberger, Dr. Stuart Cohen and Judy Z. Miller, Ph.D. The study shows that people who are under medical care and taking prescription medications for hypertension (high blood pressure) can successfully reduce by half their intake of sodium when given structured, individualized dietary instruction, and by doing so can often decrease their need for blood pressure medicines. The study found that people who are severe hypertensives and taking more medications seem to have a stronger motivation to stay on salt-restricted diets than do those taking less medication. Weinberger, professor of medicine and director of the Hypertension Research Program, said, "We believe our study confirms earlier studies showing that, by restricting sodium in the diet in conjunction with pharmacologic therapy, we offer a highly beneficial therapy for hypertension." He stresses that therapy must include intensive counseling with and recommendations of a trained dietitian. Cohen is a professor of medicine and Miller is an associate professor of medicine and of medical genetics.

USA, CANADA, EUROPE SEND TOP MATH MINDS FOR MEETING

A series of talks to reveal new results and techniques in mathematics is planned during a three-day meeting on campus of the Great Plains Operator Theory Seminar (GPOTS) and the Wabash Extramural Functional Analysis Seminar (WABASH), May 7-10. About 100 professors of math from throughout the U.S., Canada and Europe are expected at this international conference. Among the noted speakers will be math professors Ronald G. Douglas, dean, School of Liberal Arts, SUNY at Stony Brook; Gert K. Pedersen, Mathematics Institute, U. of Copenhagen, Denmark, and William B. Arveson, U. of California Berkeley. The meeting is supported by the National Science Foundation, WABASH, IUPUI, IU and the Mathematics Dept. of Purdue. The people from this campus on the organizing committee include Jerome Kaminker, professor; Bernard B. Morrel, associate professor and seminar director, and Neal J. WRITING CENTER SELECTED TO SHARE COMPUTER SUCCESSES

The clicking of computer keyboards by students writing freshman English compositions have been heard above many others by the City University of New York and the Fund for the Improvement of Post Secondary Education (FIPSE). From more than 80 eligible higher ed institutions in the country, the writing program in Liberal Arts is one of 15 selected to participate in a National Project on Computers and College Writing. The three-year project will include a review of composition classes taught with and without computers to see if technology makes a difference, explained Barbara L. Cambridge, director of the writing program here. Results of the first year will be developed into model teaching materials. The project concludes with a conference in New York City. Cambridge noted, "This project gives us recognition on a national level and it will help in getting resources and expertise from others." Her own expertise is also shared, as Cambridge's program annually hosts the Indiana Teachers of Writing Conference, and she will talk about computer-instructed composition at IBM in Dallas in June.--J. Grim

HOOSIER-BORN MAX STACKHOUSE RETURNS FOR PUBLIC LECTURE "RELIGION, MODERN SOCIETY AND THE Independent Sector" on May 12, 8:15 p.m., Lecture Hall 104. The Harvard-educated Stackhouse is the Herbert Gezork Professor of Christian Social Ethics and Stewardship Studies at Andover Newton Theological School, Mass. An ordained minister in the United Church of Christ, he is a graduate of DePauw U., and also studied in Holland. He is a former president of the Society of Christian Ethics and is a prolific writer of books and articles. All are welcome to the lecture, which opens a three-day invitational conference here on "Religion and the Independent Sector in American Culture." Sponsors are the Center for American Studies and the Dept. of Religious Studies at IUPUI.

"FRONT-LINERS" THE FOCUS OF WORKSHOPS HERE ON CHILD ABUSE Churches, child care facilities and schools are the most crucial "front-liners" working with children on a daily or regular basis and therefore play a major role in preventing and reporting child abuse and neglect. The first of three workshops on problems of child abuse and neglect for professionals working in these institutions is set for May 10 on campus. A multidisciplinary panel from IUPUI, public and private social service agencies and people from churches, schools and child care agencies will focus on general issues during three common sessions and more specific and separate sessions on topics for churches, child care and schools. Sponsors are the IUPUI Multidisciplinary Graduate Training Program, the Consortium of Child Abuse and Neglect (CAN) Resources and Information Services, the CAN Council of Marion County and the Indiana Chapter for Prevention of Child Abuse, all in collaboration with the Indiana Council of Churches and the Church Federation of Greater Indianapolis. From an analysis of more than 140,000 child abuse and neglect cases reported in Indiana over the past seven years, the IUPUI training program and the consortium found child abuse to be a complex problem that reflects the dysfunctions of individuals and families, as well as communities. Resolution, the group says, must include cooperation from a broad spectrum of those who deal with children and families. Registration is \$5.
