

IUPUI PARTICIPATING IN NEW PROGRAM TO TRAIN/HIRE OLDER PEOPLE

Deans, directors and department heads have been invited to participate in a new program that is striving to train and possibly hire people 55 years old and older. The Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP) work-training is funded by the U.S. Dept. of Labor and is sponsored by the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP). Participants are employees of SCSEP and can be assigned to work about 20 hours a week at various jobs. The goal is to help people develop their capabilities and get a job. TRUSTEES OK \$1.1 BILLION BUDGET AND FEE HIKES

The lion's share of the \$1.1 billion IU budget for the next fiscal year is for the General Education Fund and IUPUI's share in that department is \$192.5 million, with \$285.2 million for IUB. The trustees approved the 8.6 percent increase at a May 6 meeting. IU President Thomas Ehrlich told the trustees that faculty and staff salaries are a top priority in the new budget, but noted that the problem of adequate employment compensation is not solved and will continue as a top priority. Also approved were instructional fee hikes. For Indiana residents, credit hour costs on this campus will be \$61.45, up \$3.45. Fees at IUB are \$62.90, up \$3.30, and they are \$53 at regional campuses, a hike of \$2.75. The increase is about 6 percent for undergraduates. The increase for resident professional and graduate students is about 10 percent.
