

## LANG, DORSEY AMONG SPEAKERS IN FIRST PHILANTHROPY SYMPOSIUM

Eugene Lang, the man who in 1981 astonished the world and the graduating class at P.S. 121 in East Harlem with the promise that if they would stay in school he would pay them money each year and then give them more to go to college, will be one of the speakers in the first symposium of the I.U. Center on Philanthropy at IUPUI. Entitled "The Problems and Promise of Philanthropy," the symposium will focus on such subjects as ethics, legislative trends and attitudes, and giving and commitment in society. It will be June 8-9 at the University Conference Center. Lang, who fired that famous philanthropy shot from the heart when he threw out a prepared speech, will talk about his "I Have a Dream" program, which now relies on giving by many others and has spread to 17 states. Also speaking will be Eugene Dorsey, president of the Gannett Foundation, who is chairman of the "Give Five" campaign, the challenge to Americans to double their giving and volunteering by 1991. His address, "Daring Goals for a Caring Society," is based on a study of the same name that was funded by the Independent Sector, a nonprofit coalition of 650 corporate, foundation and voluntary organizations, many of which will be represented in the symposium. Vice President Gerald Bepko will open the national meeting of more than 200 scholars and leaders in the field. Howard Schaller, director of the Center, will also give remarks, as will several other scholars. An exhibition of the works of contemporary artists such as Dali, Miro and Vasarely is planned. It is part of the collection given to the I.U. Foundation for the IUPUI campus by Indianapolis attorneys and brothers, Gordon Tabor and Roy Tabor and his wife Candis. Parts of the symposium are open to the public at no charge. However, the mealtime speeches, receptions and some workshops require a fee and registration. ## CENTER FOR LAW AND HEALTH TO STUDY BENEFITS TO ILL AT HOME

The ill and elderly who get their health care at home may be getting grossly shortchanged in Medicare benefits and essential health care because of fiscal and administrative policies that deprive them of both. The Center for Law and Health at the School of Law has received a \$50,000 grant for a nationwide study of Medicare home health coverage from the Andrus Foundation of the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP). The study will use findings from beneficiaries and from 6,000 Medicare-certified home health care providers in the U.S. Chief investigator is Eleanor Kinney, director of the Center and assistant professor of law. Co-investigator is Andrea Ziegert, statistician/economist and assistant professor of public and environmental affairs, and project coordinator is Tim Quigley, paramedic/paralegal and assistant in the Center.

## FIBER OPTICS HANGS UP OLD SUVON, DIALS IN NEW

Lines should be less busy at heavy-use times of day, and service and quality should be much better when the SUVON system is switched entirely to a new fiber optic facility, effective July 9. According to Darylene Blancett, Telecommunication Services, "The result of switching to a new digital electronic communication system will result in improved service and lower costs for nearly everyone involved." The new service requires a few simple changes in dialing, which you will learn about in a mailing at the end of the month. Most importantly, you will not be using special SUVON three-digit prefixes for calling now. For example, to dial off-net, such as a location in downtown Lafayette, you won't have to dial Purdue's SUVON number, but will dial 6 + 1 + area code + the number. And, to call IUB, you will not use the old SUVON 703, but will dial 6 + the seven-digit phone number. Remember, the new system becomes effective July 9.

The liver transplant program at the Medical Center began last month under the direction of Dr. Peter Friend and, in little more than three weeks, performed the state's first liver transplantation. As of June 1, the patient, 31-year-old Gloria Hayden of Indianapolis, was doing well with a donated liver. She was in good condition and was improving satisfactorily a week after the 7.5 hour surgery. Dr. Friend comes to us after several years' experience as a transplant surgeon at the University of Cambridge, England. Joining him in the team of liver transplant surgeons and physicians are Drs. Ronald Filo, Jay L. Grosfield, Stephen Leapman, Joseph Fitzgerald and Lawrence Lumeng.




