



ENROLLMENTS DEFY PREDICTIONS OF FEWER STUDENTS

Even before final registration began last Monday (Aug. 15), enrollment figures were already higher than July of last year, with 14 percent more freshmen and 7 percent more undergraduates. **Richard E. Slocum**, newly appointed associate dean for student affairs, said on Wednesday, "Everything has gone just as predicted--we already have approximately 1,000 new freshmen and undergraduates enrolled and there are a lot more expected." (Slocum continues to handle the duties of registrar, which he has done for nearly a decade, until his replacement is found.) Not all of our students waited until the last minute to guarantee a slot in the course they wanted. More than 19,000 IUPUI students registered during spring or mid-summer registration. Based on figures from Monday and Tuesday, Slocum expected more than 3,500 newly admitted or ongoing students to register. He thinks that rising enrollments here are a result of students thinking that "IUPUI is a good idea. The curriculum and faculty are excellent, costs are reasonable, we are totally open and accessible." By Wednesday, students were getting as much assistance as possible from staff attempting to find any open classes. Slocum noted that in order to accommodate the record numbers expected for the fall term, his office, and the Office of Admissions, directed by **John Krivacs**, and other administrators on campus cooperated in carefully tracking all classroom space and the high-demand introductory courses, typically taken by freshmen. "Some students, especially freshmen, may have to juggle class schedules until there are openings. We are doing our best to accommodate everyone," he said.

COUNSELING CENTER PREPARES TO SERVE FACULTY, STAFF AND STUDENTS

Workshops in stress management, alcohol and substance abuse, parenting, couples communication and more will be offered beginning in September at the IUPUI Non-Academic Counseling Center. Director Donald Wakefield said the goal of the Center is to assist faculty, staff and students with self-understanding, problem solving and personal growth. In most cases, there is no charge for workshops and only a minimal charge for testing or evaluation. CLINIC CELEBRATES FOUR YEARS WITH FREE EYE EXAMS

Just in time for school and to celebrate four years of operation, free vision screening exams are offered at the I.U.'s Walker Eye Clinic, Aug. 15-Sept. 16. The half-hour procedure, while not a complete eye examination, will screen patients for visual acuity, eye coordination and focusing, the need for glasses, high blood pressure, glaucoma, plus evaluate eye health. Houses, Lot Sold--The Talbott III Corp. has paid \$100,000 to buy three houses and an empty lot on Talbott Street, across from Herron, the IU trustees learned at a meeting this month at IUB. The properties, part of the Elizabeth Talbott revised subdivision and the old Herron-Morton neighborhood, were purchased by IU in 1977 from the Indianapolis Museum of Art, along with Herron. The houses were used for classrooms until more suitable space was found last year.

Last Inning--Winning IUPUI baseball coach Craig Clark has resigned his three-year, part-time position as baseball coach. His team posted a two-year record of more than 30 wins in a single season and two years of reaching the NAIA District 21 play-offs. This year the team had 37 wins and 26 losses, a new record for most wins in a single season, and last year's 35-25 season was also a new record. Director of intercollegiate athletics Robert Lovell commended Clark and said, "We will sorely miss his hard work and enthusiasm."

Bidding on a Biggie--The University Place Executive Conference Center and Hotel is joining with the city of Indianapolis to bid on the 1991 World Artistic Championships and the FIG (Federation of International Gymnastics) Congress. NEW FOOD SERVICE OFFERS GREAT MEAL DEALS TO ALL

David Paul, director of campus housing, is happy to tell us that the new university food service contractor, Morrison's Custom Management, is offering two low-cost meal plans to everyone on campus. Formerly available only to students, the plans can save you up to 50 percent or more over a la carte prices. The selections and preparations are all new and you are offered "more than you will probably be able to eat" from a huge selection in the Union Cafeteria for breakfast, lunch or dinner. There also will be a super salad bar and a build-your-own sandwich bar, which you can use as an entree with unlimited access. Briefly, Plan A of 10 meals a week is \$449.50 per semester, or \$2.50 per meal, and Plan B for seven meals a week is \$414 a semester, or \$3.25 per meal. Each plan gives you \$50 each semester for a la carte eating at several places on campus. You can share your plan with an associate, and there's lots more.
