

DR. ROTH OF HOWARD IS BEERING AWARD WINNER

Jesse Roth, director of the Div. of Intramural Research, National Institute of Diabetes, Digestive and Kidney Diseases, Howard University School of Medicine, has been named recipient of the 1988 Steven C. Beering Award for Advancement in Medical Science. Dr. Beering is a former dean of the I.U. School of Medicine and is president of Purdue University. Dr. Roth will present the Beering Lecture at 9:30 a.m. on Nov. 2 in the University Place Conference Center, where the award will be presented. A reception for him follows at 9:30 a.m. The award is presented annually by the School of Medicine to an investigator who has made outstanding and continuing contributions to the advancement of medical science. Dr. Roth is clinical professor of medicine at the Uniformed Services University of Health Sciences and clinical professor of medicine at Howard. He has made fundamental advances in understanding the nature of hormonal activity through research on the insulin receptor. His investigations also have provided critical information on how hormones are secreted. His approach has initiated an entire branch of molecular research which helps scientists identify the molecular events which underlie hormone/cellular interactions.

LIVE TELECONFERENCE FOCUSES ON GROWING IMPORTANCE OF ASSESSMENT

All faculty and staff involved in academic and student affairs are urged to view a live national videoconference, "Assessment to Improve Student Learning and Development: A Shared Responsibility." IUPUI is the only college or university in Central Indiana to carry the broadcast, set for Oct. 7, 1-3 p.m., in room 105, Lecture Hall. We join 200 other universities and colleges across the nation in the teleconference. Your colleagues and associates from other institutions are welcome. Key topics, according to the IUPUI's new Associate Dean of Faculties Erwin Boschmann, will be assessment to improve student learning and development, assessment to assist a diverse student body, strengths and limits of standardized tests and meeting state mandates. He notes that Indiana is not among the 40 states that require assessment in higher education. "This conference can help us design our own assessment criteria before mandates are required," he said. The conference will include panel presentations by experts in the field and exchanges between academic viewers from coast to coast. Discussion will focus on possible directions and strategies for collaborative assessment efforts. Among the invited speakers are K. Patricia Cross, chairman, Dept. of Administration, Planning and Social Policy, Graduate School of Education, Harvard U., and Jacqueline E. Woods, vice president, Programs and Public Policy, Association of Governing Boards of Universities and Colleges. Selected leaders from the sponsoring groups, the American Association for Higher Education, the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators and the American College Personnel Association, also will speak. 
