

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PLANNED GIVING: FIRST OF ITS KIND CONFERENCE HERE

Lawrence B. Lindsey, a Harvard University economist who specializes in the effects of economic policy on philanthropy, will be one of several experts on planned giving, fund raising and estate planning to address the first National Conference on Planned Giving, Oct. 31-Nov. 2 at the University Place Executive Conference Center and Hotel. Other scheduled speakers include: Douglas K. Freeman, Los Angeles attorney; Andre Donikian of Pentera, Inc., Indianapolis; Jonathan G. Tidd of Planned Giving Servies in New York; Ellen G. Estes, planned giving consultant from Connecticut, to name a few. The intensive three-day conference, "Policy and Practices for the 1990s," is expected to attract about 250 planned giving officers, development managers, attorneys and financial experts from across the nation to the Center on Philanthropy on campus. 

NURSING CENTER BREAKS GROUND AS NURSES DO SAME

Groundbreaking ceremonies last Thursday (Oct. 20) marked the beginning of the new home of the \$4 million International Center for Nursing Scholarship and headquarters for Sigma Theta Tau International on campus. The Center is extremely important to the future of nursing and nursing research which has state and national implications. Some nurses from this campus who "break ground" in important research include Victoria Champion at the School of Nursing who has a \$650,000 grant from the NIH to study breast cancer, which will strike one in 10 American women this year--killing 37,000 of the disease. She is beginning a five-year project to determine the most effective methods for convincing women to detect the disease early, which can save the live of millions of women. We also have Joanne B. Martin, assistant professor of nursing, who has a \$252,000 grant from the Indiana State Board of Health for a program called Community Partners in Prenatal Care, a concerted effort to prevent infant mortality and low birthweight in newborns. There also is Beverly Flynn, professor of nursing, who has received a \$464,000 grant from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation for the program, Healthy Cities Project, which will lend support to selected Indiana cities in their efforts to promote a healthier life for citizens. More than incidentally, Angela Barron McBride, associate dean for research, development and resources and professor of nursing here, also is president of the 125,000 member Sigma Theta Tau International.
