



## VON SCHUCHING NUCLEAR LIBRARY OPENS WITH FIRST LECTURE

Susanne Von Schuching, a respected chemist who once worked on campus and who was the granddaughter of the world famous Paul Ehrlich, has had named for her a library/conference/teaching center in the Dept. of Nuclear Medicine. Von Schuching was on the staff in the department for seven years and at her death in 1982 left a significant bequest to the department. Part of the fund has been used to refurbish the nuclear medicine library that will officially bear her name when it is dedicated Dec. 16. Speaking in the first Susanne Von Schuching Lectureship on Radiopharmaceutical Development will be Ismael G. Mena, M.D., director, Division of Nuclear Medicine, UCLA School of Medicine, Harbor - UCLA Medical Center, Torrance, Calif. The presentation entitled "Development of Technetium-99m Isonitriles for Global Ventricular Evaluation: Simultaneous Ventricular Performance and Myocardial Perfusion" will be held in the library in University Hospital, room P-20, 4-5 p.m. Immediately following the lecture, from 5-5:20 p.m., dedication of the library and the presentation of a signed portrait of Paul Ehrlich will be led by Dr. Walter Daly, M.D., dean of the School of Medicine. Activities move to the University Faculty Club, second floor University Place Conference Center, with a reception of light hors d'oeuvres and drinks from 5:30-6 p.m. In the same room, from 6-7 p.m., Bernhard Witkop, Ph.D., chemist, amateur historian, and institute scholar, National Institutes of Health, Bethesda, will present "Paul Ehrlich's Living Legacy." Ehrlich (1854-1915), along with Elie Metchnikoff, was co-winner of the Nobel prize for medicine and physiology in 1908, for his work in immunity. The German bacteriologist was greatly admired by his granddaughter Susanne, who left to the school the oldest known portrait of him which will be hung in the School of Medicine Medical Museum. Sponsors of the dedication and lecture are the Department of Nuclear Medicine and the John Shaw Billings History of Medicine Society, Inc.

During a news teleconference on campus in studio B of the Medical Educational Resources Program (MERP) at the School of Nursing, IU President Thomas Ehrlich, IU Vice President for Finance and Administration John T. Hackett and executives from Bank One, Indiana National Bank and Merchants National Bank and Trust Company made presentations to many reporters from the print and electronic media. The news conference was transmitted through the Indiana Higher Education Telecommunication System (IHETS) to sites across the state and via satellite. ## PERSONNEL DEVELOPS PROGRAM TO DEVELOP PEOPLE

Two new programs, both designed to enhance skills and work opportunities for clerical people at IUPUI, have been initiated by the Personnel Department. Deans, directors and department heads already have been notified of the new programs and will nominate employees to participate. The **Clerical Skills Building** pilot program begins Jan. 31 and is designed to train employees to compete for clerical positions through the CL04 level. This is an effort to "grow our own" at IUPUI, according to Hank Miller, manager of staff training in Personnel. It will begin with a test group of 15 trainees who will receive more than 60 hours of instruction in typing, word processing, English/grammar review and other areas. The second program, **Secretarial Skills Building**, will begin after the clerical program has been completed and evaluated, and is designed to train people with secretarial skills to achieve higher secretarial positions. Development of the new programs is the joint effort of reps from Personnel, Continuing Studies, the Adult Education Coordinating Center and the IUPUI Staff Council.
