Taylor Symposium, "Democracy's Handmaiden: The Urban University and the American Dream," Apr. 13-15 in the Conference Center. Everyone on campus is invited to attend a luncheon Apr. 14 at noon where Joe Taylor, pictured left, will be honored. He was IUPUI's first dean of liberal arts and was a driving force in the 1969 campus merger of I.U. and Purdue Universities at Indianapolis. Keynote speaker at the lunch will be

Bernard Harleston, president of City College of New York, speaking on "Turning Failure Into Excellence: The Challenge of the Urban University/Public School Partnership." Other outstanding speakers will be among the 200 higher education professionals attending the Taylor symposium that is expected to become an annual event. **Arnold B. Grobman**, chancellor emeritus at the U. of Missouri-St. Louis and author of Urban Universities: An Unfinished Agenda, will lead off the symposium at 1:30 p.m., Apr. 13, with "A Challenge for America's Urban Universities and Colleges." Coordinator of the symposium is Monroe H. Little, director of Afro-American Studies and assistant professor of history. 

OSCAR-WINNING "RAIN MAN" WRITER BARRY MORROW TO SPEAK HERE APRIL 24

Barry Morrow, who last month won an Oscar for best "screenplay written for the screen" for "Rain Man" during the 61st annual Academy Awards ceremony, will speak at IUPUI Apr. 24, 7:30 p.m. in the Conference Center auditorium. Earlier this year, Morrow won a Golden Globe award for "Rain Man," the compelling story of an autistic savant and his brother. Morrow, a Minnesota native, also wrote television scripts "Bill" and "Bill on His Own," both starring Mickey Rooney. They were autobiographical tales based on Morrow's experience with Bill Sachter, a mentally handicapped man who became part of Morrow's family. His other recent TV writing credits include "The Karen Carpenter Story" and "Quiet Victory." "Barry Morrow is one of the talented few who have been able to write successfully about the problems of those who face special obstacles--physical or mental--in this world," said Sheldon Siegel, dean of the School of Social Work, one of the sponsors of Morrow's appearance. Other sponsors include the Association of Retarded Citizens of Indiana, the Dept. of Theatre and Drama at IUB, the Stone Belt Association of Retarded Citizens and the Developmental Training Center of I.U. SOCIAL WORK TO SHOW USA TO SIX FROM JAPAN

The School of Social Work is using a recent special projects award from the Council of International Programs in Social Welfare to provide orientation to the U.S.A. and local services for the disabled to six Japanese specialists who work with disabled people. During the visit, Apr. 1-15, the Japanese will be introduced to Middle America through interaction with individuals, families and community leaders in the private and public sectors. The visitors are sponsored by the Shimizu Foundation Overseas Study Program. Dave Metzger, associate professor of social work and director of the Council of International Programs at IUPUI, said as the Japanese benefit from the project, so will local professionals who work with disabled people.--M. Pons received international attention when he announced his discovery Mar. 23, and attracted local and international media here, including the Boston Globe, Scientific American, the BBC, and Science. His lecture here was arranged by Frank Schultz, professor of chemistry, long before Pons came into the limelight with his recent discovery. Co-researcher on the project is Professor Martin Fleischmann, University of Southampton, England. A paper on their electrochemical process for initiating nuclear fusion is expected soon in the Journal of Electroanalytical Chemistry.

FELLOWSHIPS WILL HELP ATTRACT TEENS TO DENTISTRY

Minority student services in the School of Dentistry will use recent awards of \$68,500 to attract high school students to a career in dentistry and to assist enrolled students at the school. Dr. LaForrest D. Garner, director of minority student services, said three of the awards of \$1,500 each will fund high school student research apprentice fellowships during an 8-10 week program for area teens interested in a career in dentistry. Also, four Patricia Roberts Harris Fellowship awards of \$16,000 each will fund study for two current fellows and two beginning dentistry students this fall. "The faculty and administration in the school have an aggressive program to attract minority students because we need more ethnic specialists to serve diverse groups," said Dr. H. William Gilmore, dean of the school. He added, "Health care centers need ethnic specialists especially to help open communication for patients about available services and to establish trust between the patients and the practitioners themselves." 
