


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IUPUI CAPS SECOND DECADE BY CONFERRING MORE THAN 4,000 DEGREES

Honorary and other degrees ranging from associate to Ph.D. will be bestowed on 4,104 new I.U. and Purdue graduates during IUPUI's 20th annual commencement May 14 at 3 p.m. in the Hoosier Dome. An honorary degree from Purdue University will be bestowed on Donald G. Saari, Doctor of Science. He is a professor of mathematics at Northwestern University who has earned international recognition for his innovative achievements in applied mathematics, particularly in the areas of celestial mechanics and mathematical economics. I.U. honorary degrees will go to Polish-born chemist Mieczyslaw Makosza, Doctor of Science; deputy dean of Yale University Law School John G. Simon, Doctor of Laws, and CEO at Eli Lilly and Company Richard D. Wood, Doctor of Laws. Makosza was born in Warsaw and is a visiting professor of chemistry. He is considered a leader among organic chemists of his generation. His pioneering research on phase transfer catalysis established him as a founding father of the field, and his discoveries have redirected industrial and pharmaceutical chemistry. He is director of the Institute of Organic Chemistry of the Polish Academy of Sciences. Simon is the Augustus Lines professor of law at Yale and is a pioneer in the academic study of philanthropy and tax and trust law. The founding director of the Yale program on nonprofit organizations, he established the first center for systematic research into the theory and practice of philanthropy. Wood began his career at Eli Lilly and Company in 1979 and has served in many capacities, including executive vice president and chairman of the board of directors. He is director of the U.S.-U.S.S.R. Trade and Economic Council.

Chancellor Gerald L. Bepko will preside over IUPUI's commencement this Mother's Day. Steven C. Beering, president of Purdue University, will confer 734 degrees, and Thomas Ehrlich, president of I.U., will confer 3,370 I.U. degrees. The 74th U.S. Army Band, commanded by Master Warrant Officer Richard N. Saddler will provide the musical "Pomp and Circumstance," while richly robed faculty, staff and students form a proud processional. IUPUI's 1989 graduates bring to 73,954 people who earned more than 75,000 degrees from this campus.

Welcoming new grads will be Richard B. Stoner, president of the I.U. trustees, Thomas J. Mitchell, president of the I.U. Alumni Association, and Nikki Horner, associate director of the Purdue Alumni Association. Representing all the graduates will be Robert B. Fong, Continuing Studies, I.U., and Yvette A. Shelton, Engineering and Technology, Purdue. Rev. Donna B. Farrar, director of the Chaplaincy Dept., I.U. Hospitals, will lead moments of reflection, and John A. Ruby will lead graduates, family and friends in song.

Before and after commencement individual gatherings and honor ceremonies will be held by schools in the Convention Center and the Dome. Friends and family are all welcome; tickets are not required and space will be set aside on the floor for handicapped people.

The Alumni Office at IUPUI handles all the arrangements for commencement.

Being Homeless in America

PUBLIC SYMPOSIUM TAKES ANOTHER LOOK AT THE "GRAPES OF WRATH"

For many Americans, life is no better than it was for the wretches depicted in the 50-year-old movie, "The Grapes of Wrath," based on John Steinbeck's book about the wandering homeless. A showing of the movie, a concert by folk singer John Gage and panel and roundtable discussions are all part of a free public symposium, "Being Homeless in America: Alternative Lifestyle/Economic Dead End," May 8-9. It will address the issues surrounding homelessness and discuss the questions of tolerance, homelessness versus dispossession, whether or not the homeless are simply unskilled and lazy, and homelessness in Indianapolis. The symposium is sponsored by the IUPUI Center for American Studies and the metropolitan affairs committee of the IUPUI Faculty Council.

The symposium gets under way Monday at 7:30 p.m. in the Madame Walker Urban Life Center Theatre with "Homelessness in Song and Story," featuring Gage and a showing of "The Grapes of Wrath."

Panel and roundtable discussions begin Tuesday at 9 a.m. in Lecture Hall, room 104. Terence J. Martin, distinguished professor of English at IUB, will present "The Protean Image of Homelessness in American Writing," and Robert M. Hollister, director of the Center for Public Service at Tufts University, will present "The Reality of Homelessness in Contemporary America." IUPUI faculty members Melvin L. Plotinsky, associate professor of English and American studies, will moderate and Rowland A. Sherrill, professor of religious studies and American studies will comment.

In the afternoon, beginning at 2 p.m., there will be a panel discussion entitled "Homelessness in Indianapolis" featuring moderator David Wilson, assistant professor of geography and American studies at IUPUI; Larry Cowper, Salvation Army captain; Linda Frick, Midtown Community Health Center consultant, and Cathy Scott, Midtown psychiatric social worker. Also, J. Bradford Senden, president of Political Designs, Inc.; Marcie Taylor, assistant professor of social work at IUPUI, and Rich Waples, legal director for the Indiana Civil Liberties Union.

Then at 3:30 p.m., Jan Shipps, professor of history and religious studies and director of the Center for American Studies at IUPUI, will moderate a roundtable discussion.
