


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
ZOO PARTY TICKETS SELL WITH GAZELLE SPEED

- 9:00 p.m.--DJ with music and dancing, Party Pavilion tent





GIFT FOR E/T ARRIVES VIA THE BLACK FOREST

Not just cuckoo clocks, but high tech gits for IUPUI come out of the Black Forest in West Germany. An Indianapolis firm, Eimeldingen Corp., whose headquarters is in a village of the same name in the Black Forest region, donated a high tech automated material handling device to the Dept. of Manufacturing Technology in the School of Engineering and Technology. The palletizing system, which moves parts and fixtures from one machine to another, was given in ceremonies June 16 at the company on South Harding Street. Part of the school's "factory of the future" laboratory, the system will be used for study and research. Robert E. Peale, chairman of the department, said the system greatly enhances opportunities for students and faculty.--J. Grim



VICE CHANCELLOR TO TEACH TWO SPECIAL COURSES

Students still have time to register for two new courses to be taught by IUPUI Vice Chancellor Herman Blake. "Education and Social Change," in Summer Session II, will look at education as a force for social change and what that means for educational patterns. Some changes that will be considered are "baby boom," the G.I. Bill, Supreme Court decisions, Sputnik as a catalytic event in American education and the effects of the recent report, "A Nation at Risk." The course is part of the new IUPUI Summer Seminar program. (EDUC, F203, 1 credit hour, enrollment limited to 10.) The second new course is "Workshop in Special Topics: American Ethnic Minorities." It is offered in the fall term and is designed as an introduction to ethnic minorities in the U.S., with the primary emphasis devoted to studying the life, culture and thought of African and Latino Americans. Experiences of native Americans, as well as Asians and European immigrants also will be examined. (COAS, S200, Section R152, 3 credit hours.) Faculty is encouraged to tell students of these late course additions.



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

