

## IMPORTANT CHANGES IN EFFECT WITH DEC. 4 DEADLINE FOR RESEARCH SUBMISSIONS

Research and Sponsored Programs, which is now located in the Union Building, reminds researchers that, effective with the Dec. 4 deadline for research submissions to the Institutional Review Board (IRB) or Institutional Review Committee (IRC, Behavioral/Social Sciences), there are some important changes to the "Instructions and Checklist for Submitting a Protocol Involving Human Subjects." To name some changes, all fully completed materials must be received by 4 p.m. on the deadline date; anything received after that will be scheduled for the next meeting. Also, the investigator is now responsible for submitting the appropriate numbers of documents for new studies to the IRB or IRC. And, sample risk statements for radioactive exposure are available, as is the availability of copying documents onto floppy disks. ## BENNETT TO TELL TALE OF HOOSIER WHO INVENTED SKIN CUTTER USED FOR GRAFTING

Though he died before knowing the success of his design, Harry M. Brown (1914-1948), who did his residency at Wishard Hospital known then as Indianapolis City Hospital, worked with an engineer in 1946 to invent the Brown Electrodermatome, used today in cutting skin for grafting. During an open meeting of the John Shaw Billings History of Medicine Society, Dec. 11 at 4 p.m. in Emerson Hall, Dr. James E.
