For all readers who have been memorizing these little boxes, you may erase from memory the box of February 4, the one dealing with percentages of enrollment and students' ages. The information was, alas, wrong. But, never fear, here's the real story. And the figures deal with last fall's enrollment of 20,000-plus.

About 8,000 persons were full-time students at IUPUI.  
Full-time students over 26 years old represented 9 percent of the total enrollment and 23 percent of all full-timers.

About 12,000 persons were studying part-time at IUPUI.  
Part-time students over 26 years old represented 32 percent of the total enrollment and 54 percent of all part-timers.

### "SEX-PECTATIONS" WORKSHOP NEXT MONTH

Dr. Sol Gordon, a leading psychologist, author, educator and public speaker, who believes that adults have worthwhile things to say to teen-agers about sex, will headline a major workshop next month sponsored by the I.U. School of Social Work and the Coalition for Family Life Education.

Gordon, who thinks the challenge in talking to teens is getting the message across, will speak March 26 at 8 p.m. and lead discussions on March 27 from 9 a.m. to 3:45 p.m. -- both programs at the Essex House Hotel, 421 North Pennsylvania Street.

An internationally recognized expert on adolescent sexuality, learning disabilities and persons with handicaps and preparing youth for family life, Gordon is professor of child and family studies and director of the Institute for Family Research and Education at Syracuse University. The institute currently is involved in projects to train key leadership in community agencies, schools and religious groups to prepare parents to assume their role as primary sex educators of their own children and in planning media programs to reduce pregnancies among teens.

Gordon, a frequent guest on television talk shows, is a prolific author of popular books for teens and adults, articles for medical journals and for general magazines such as Good Housekeeping and Seventeen. His publications include The Sexual Adolescent, Let's Make Sex a Household Word, Girls Are Girls and Boys Are Boys--So What's the Difference?, Parenting--A Guide for Young People, plus many others.

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### "LIBERATION" FILMS COMING

"Films of Liberation Struggles" is the theme of a special spring film discussion series that will focus on the complex themes of political and social liberation in countries that have undergone such upheavals. Many of these films have not been shown before in Indianapolis and all are winners of many international awards for their outstanding cinematography.

Sponsored by the Office of International Programs, the Department of Political Science and the Lectures and Convocations Committee, the series is free and open to the public. The series will run for six Wednesdays, beginning March 7, all at 7 p.m. in Lecture Hall 101.

The opener, on March 7, is "The Battle of Chile," a documentary directed by Patricio Guzman. On March 14, "Harvest: 3,000 Years," a feature film set in contemporary Ethiopia and directed by Haile Gerima, will be shown. On March 21, Gillo Pontecorvo's classic "The Battle of Algiers," centering on the 1954-57 phase of the Algerian rebellion against France, will be shown and analyzed.

"The Hour of the Furnaces" (Part I: Neo-Colonialism and Violence), directed by Fernando Solanas and Octavio Getino, will be shown April 4. This film centers on neocolonialism in Argentina and the use of violence to maintain that nation's society. The connection between women's liberation and the struggle for national liberation and social revolution is the theme of the Cuban film "Lucia" directed by Humberto Solas, scheduled for April 11.

The last film in the series is "Viva Portugal," to be shown April 18. Produced by a team of West German and French film makers, "Viva Portugal" concentrates on the Portuguese military coup of April, 1974, that ended Europe's longest 20th-Century dictatorship.
