

Alumni Spotlight: Words build (and break down) walls By Lindsay Quandt (BA graduate, MA student)



Three years ago I landed a job as a Technical Writer/Business Analyst at a Carmel, IN based Fortune 500 holding company. This past March I was moved to a high profile data project that has direct impact to our financial earnings and reporting. On large technical projects there are lots of players: the IT team, the Business team, and the vendor who is delivering the solution who is often a Big 4 consultant. These groups all have their own titles, their own responsibilities, even their own languages. As communication scholars, we know that communication, and the words we use, co-construct our environments. The same is true in these corporate silos where words are really creating walls between groups that lead to ineffective collaboration across the enterprise.

What this project needed, and the role I play, is someone (or many someones, actually) to make all disparate groups work together. I dig into the details to ensure our delivery team is providing the best solution, and jump up to a high level to explain how this project will impact other parts of the enterprise. Having a degree in accounting preps you for a job in the finance department. A marketing degree readies you for a position in the marketing department. An Informatics degree gets you ready for a job in the IT department. However, often the largest and most important project includes all three. What those projects require is someone to build doorways that their intersections.

What if you don't want to just focus on one specific niche within an organization, but instead want to be a part of the solution and help move it forward? What if you like seeing all moving pieces of an organization and enjoy learning and analyzing? It takes a certain skill set to jump between audiences and in and out of the details. I learned that skill set as a communication scholar. I believe a communication degree prepares you to hold jobs that sit at the intersection of technical skill and business operations. My BA/MA in Communication provides the ability to 1) think critically, 2) consume (listen/read) analytically, and 3) write and speak effectively and persuasively. If you can do those three things, you are filling a gap in corporations that very few people can fill.

Now go break down walls wherever you go!
