

LITTLE EARNS LILLY FELLOWSHIP FOR UNIQUE REPORT

Monroe H. Little Jr., director of IUPUI's Afro-American studies department, has received a 1992-93 Lilly Endowment Faculty Open Fellowships to create the first "State of Black Indianapolis" report. Little, one of 10 fellowship winners for 1992-93, will work with Indianapolis Urban League officials and others in the community to create the report, modeled upon the national Urban League's "State of Black America." Among the topics to be discussed are housing, education, the relationship between blacks and the local criminal justice system, African-American art and culture, health care and politics. The report is due to be released at the same time as the 1993 "State of Black America" report.
