Just what is $4-H$ anyway? Since J. A, has become known as the " $4-H$ of the city," Mary Churchman and David Cochard are here at the conference to tell more about their organization.

Two and one-quarter million members in all 48 states and many foreign countries "learn" home economics and agriculture "by doing."

The basic unit of $4-\mathrm{H}$ is the club which is composed of about 20 members from 10 to 20. Projects include baking, clothing, food preparation, handicraft, and home improvement for the girls, and crops, animals, and soil and wildlife conservation for the boys. Each year the member must complete a set amount of work. Demonstration and judging contests increase both knowledge and interest.

The county fair climaxes each L-H summer. Each member exhibits his work for blue, red, or white ribbons and the chance to exhibit at the State Fair.

In $4-\mathrm{H}$, as in Junior Achievement, the members themselves are responsible for the success or failure of the program. An older member can become active as a junior leader and help new members avoid the mistakes which are most certain to occur.

Just as J. A., $4-H$ has its own extensive set of awards on both local and national levels. Locally, members may receive pins, trophies, trips, and cash prizes. State conferences are held as awards and to train members in specialized phases of their projects or as leadership training schools.

Club Congress is a national event held yearly in Chicago, At Congress nearly 2,000 delegates are royally entertained. Many national award trips and scholarships are presented to members for their all-inclusive Achievement Records.

The National 4-H Club Congress in Washington is one of the top $4-\mathrm{H}$ award trips. Four delegates from each state attend to learn more about government at a na-
tional level. They hear speeches by the Secretary of Agriculture and the President of the United States as well as touring Washington and having an over-all good time.

Thus $4-H$ and J. A. have a lot in common. And even their goals are similar. FourH'ers pledge their Heads to clearer thinking, their Hearts to greater loyalty, their Hands to larger service, and their Heal th to better living. Their motto is "to make the best better."
