IUSD COM DENT 2-74 THREE NEW EDITIONS OF WIDELY USED TEXTBOOKS by faculty members at the Indiana University School of Dentistry have recently been published. One of these is the third edition of <u>Textbook of Oral Pathology</u>, by Dr. William G. Shafer, Distinguished Professor and Chairman of Oral Pathology; Dr. Maynard K. Hine, Executive Associate of the I.U. Foundation, Special Assistant to the President, and Professor of Periodontology; and Dr. B. M. Levy, of the University of Texas Dental Branch at Houston.

The second edition of Dean Ralph E. McDonald's <u>Dentistry for the Child and</u> <u>Adolescent</u> has also been published. In addition, a Spanish-language edition has been issued of the text <u>Oral Diagnosis/Oral Medicine</u> by Dr. David F. Mitchell, Professor and Chairman of Oral Diagnosis/Oral Medicine; Dr. S. Miles Standish, Assistant Dean for Graduate and Postgraduate Education and Professor of Oral Pathology, and Dr. Thomas Fast, formerly of I.U. and now at the University of Florida.

A French-language edition of <u>Oral Diagnosis/Oral Medicine</u> was published earlier. The other two texts have also been published in Spanish.

"TV TEACHING IN ACTION: AN AID TO DENTAL EDUCATION" is the theme of the Fourth Annual Interim Teaching Conference of the School of Dentistry. The program will be held from 5:30-9 p.m. on February 20 and will feature taped examples from various departments, a how-to-do-it presentation, and a panel of experts. Dr. James R. Roche, Teaching Committee Chairman, states that the Conference is part of the Committee's continuing effort to provide the faculty with opportunities to improve their teaching.

THE FOLLOWING NOTE HAS BEEN RECEIVED from Mrs. Ruth Lively in the Mimeograph Room:

"During Christmas vacation a new coin-operated Xerox machine was installed which not only makes change but costs a nickel as opposed to the dime on the old machine. This machine has been placed here on a trial basis. If we do not lose money in a three-month period, we will continue to enjoy the 5ϕ rate; on the other hand, if we operate "in the red," we will have to go back to a 10ϕ machine. We are getting excellent copy, it is much faster and the service of using a key rather than the coin operation for quantities over 20 is still available. We urge everyone in the school to use the machine whenever they need duplication material.

"Also, for official business of the school a new service is available on the 2400 series Xerox machine located in the mimeograph room. For anyone who uses the same mailing list periodically, a master sheet can be typed from which address labels can be produced by the machine. Anyone having use for this service should discuss it with Mrs. Ruth Lively in the mimeograph room."

DR. ROBERT H. DERRY, DIRECTOR OF CONTINUING EDUCATION, reports that the two courses in Vitreous Carbon Implants presented in the current academic year have been among the most heavily attended in the history of the program. The December course drew 150 registrants, and the one in January was attended by 65.

DRS. BRADLEY B. BEISWANGER AND GEORGE K. STOOKEY participated in a Chicago workshop sponsored by the American Dental Association concerning the Physical Functionality of Dentifrices (Abrasion-Cleaning-Polishing) on January 21-22, 1974.

DR. ROBERT L. BOGAN HAS PASSED ALONG A COPY of the base newspaper from the Sierra Army Depot (California) which tells of a Children's Dental Health Program planned by Dr. John W. Miskuf, Base Dental Officer and a 1971 graduate of the School of Dentistry.

In an accompanying letter, Dr. Miskuf wrote: "With such a fine background in preventive from I.U.S.D., we cannot help but get involved to the fullest with the children in the schools here I feel like I brought a little bit of Indiana out here to California."

DR. SIMON KATZ PRESENTED a course on Preventive Dentistry for the Dental Office for the Dental Society of El Salvador, Central America, in December. The course, consisting of 12 hours of presentations and demonstrations on patients was attended by local dentists, public health officers, plus junior and senior dental students.

DRS. JOHN S. STONE AND JOHN C. PARSONS HAVE RECEIVED WORD that they have passed the written portion of the American Board of Periodontology examination. Drs. Stone and Parsons completed their graduate work in the Department of Periodontics in 1973.

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE AMERICAN DENTAL ASSOCIATION HEALTH FOUNDATION has selected the Leonard Davis Institute at the University of Pennsylvania to study dental health manpower in the United States, including manpower supply, dental demand and productivity, and future needs of dental education. Dr. Lloyd J. Phillips is one of the nine members named by the Foundation Board to serve on the Studies Advisory Committee. Dr. Phillips will represent the American Dental Association Board of Trustees. PAPER, PAPER EVERYWHERE. Convincing evidence that a modern educational institution involves plenty of paperwork is provided in a recent report from Mrs. Ruth Lively, of the Mimeograph Room. She notes that during January we used 119,000 sheets of mimeograph paper, or about 238 reams. According to Mrs. Lively, that would make four and a half floor-to-ceiling stacks in her office. The mimeograph room also processed 5700 cards of various sizes and 550 stamped postal cards. By the way, about 75 per cent of the paper used represented sets which had to be stapled or punched and bound. Because of the paper shortage, careful planning for present and future needs is more important than ever, Mrs. Lively says.
