Announcements from the Chair

- This year's report from the College Board on college pricing opens with what passes for good news: The annual increase in average published tuition and fees for in-state students at four-year public colleges, 4.8 percent, is smaller than it has been in more than a decade. That compares with an 8.4-percent jump the year before. <http://trends.collegeboard.org/>
 - Pricing has an important perspective in how we compare to other Indiana institutions.
 - *Data for Indiana institutions appear below.*
- As part of IUPUI's Strategic Planning initiative, the campus will undertake a Strategic Enrollment Management (SEM) process.
 - Formation of SEM Taskforce
 - This will be formed soon and will work quickly on developing an Enrollment Management strategy for IUPUI. Among other elements that will need to be addressed are:
 - The best mix of students (undergrad/grad/profession, resident/non-resident, beginner/transfer, etc. to meet the campus enrollment goals.
 - The best mix of programs, including new or changed programs and related initiatives that will help us achieve the desired mix and number of students.
 - How the campus goes about developing and implementing these new programs.
 - Because of the timing of the overall IUPUI Strategic Planning process, we will need to provide a report by the beginning of March. Given the short timeframe (made even shorter with time lost to end of semester/start of semester activities), we will approach this through providing information to the Taskforce and ask them to respond to it.
 - We recognize that we won't be able to develop a full plan by the March deadline. Instead, we will focus on identifying what *needs to be done* by listing those areas that we believe important, a general strategy for doing so, and the necessary timeline required. We'll also do our best to provide budgetary cost/implications, though those likely won't be final at this stage.
 - More information will be provided as we move forward. To help with this we are developing a new section of the EMC site where we will post relevant documents and SEM-related resources.

 - Marvin Smith, Director of Student Financial Services, has convened a Financial Wellness Council to address issues related to student financial literacy. The Council is in the process of collecting information on the initiatives currently in place on this campus. Additionally, we are working with the IU Office for Financial Literacy on the process of implementing the enterprise-wide financial literacy initiatives. The Office for Financial Literacy has contracted with [EverFi](#) to provide a tutorial that beginning students will be expected to complete.

- Fall 2012 and 2013 Admission comparison
 - The number of admitted students for Fall 2013 is running well ahead of where we were on the same date for 2012.
 - A report from Undergraduate Admissions is attached below that shows both dual admits by unit as well as those admitted to University College. The mean increase is 51%. This reflects that we are substantially farther ahead in both applications **and** processing for the year.
 - This year's applicants may be doing things earlier than later, but we also believe the increased numbers are reflective of recruiting efforts.
 - With early admits, we have a very long period where we need to keep these students engaged with coordinated, regular communication from campus and schools.
 - We had 3 days of [Fall Fest](#), with over 400 students and parents in attendance.
 - University College provided the First Year sessions. Admissions anticipates relying on Student Life for more presentations for [Spring Preview](#) days next semester.
 - A layout of the Academic Fair during Fall Fest and the units represented is attached below.

Spring Enrollment

- We have begun our enrollment for the Spring term. Here is where we stood on 11/12:

- Adjusting for the 44 Adult Education students now enrolling through IUB, **Indianapolis is down 623 heads (-4.0%)**.
- While we can account for some of this with the move of the graduate Adult Education degree to Bloomington, the shortfall is significant. As of 11/12, we were down **667 (-4.3) in heads** and **5,910 (-3.2%) in credits**. The shortfall is most pronounced in seniors and in graduate degree-seeking students.
- The good news is that we have shown improvement over last week when we were down roughly 800 heads after adjusting for the timing of an orientation program last year. We hope to further narrow our shortfall in the coming weeks.
- We remember, of course, that our enrollments for the Fall 2012 term also ran significantly behind until immediately prior to the start of the term, though that was mainly due to delays in new students signing up for and completing Orientation. We noted then that such behavior in this population might carry forward into the future and while it is still quite early in the cycle, we may have our first evidence that this is the case.

- That said, we can't rely on the shortfall to take care of itself. To help address this a number of steps are underway:
 - The Registrar's Office has distributed the first list of not-yet-registered students to the schools to use in their contacting students and encouraging their enrollment.
 - Our front-line staff is checking the Spring enrollment status of students visiting their offices on other business. If the staff member sees the student has not yet registered for Spring, the staff member will note this and then ask if the student was aware priority registration has occurred and is there anything we can do to help. The intent is to take a proactive approach to show that the campus notices and cares and encourages the student to enroll as soon as possible.
 - From an academic unit's perspective, University College is taking a number of steps:
 - through advisors and UCOL's weekly 'News You Can Use' e-newsletter
 - through Bepko Learning Center mentors phoning students in the FTFT cohort
 - through additional personal contacts with under-represented groups
 - UCOL is focusing on sophomores as first-term freshmen should be enrolling through their Learning Communities
- We know the schools are closest to their students and are in the best position to address students' concerns and to encourage their enrollment. While the Registrar's Office will continue to distribute the non-yet-registered lists, we will ask the schools to let us know if there is anything else we can do to help them in this important effort.

2012 Performance Indicators *Gary Pike*

- The EMC Steering Group has been asked to evaluate the [performance](#) of IUPUI on attracting and supporting a diverse and well-prepared student population and to select the appropriate [Performance Indicator](#). The focus of this review is on undergraduates. Last year the group selected a [REDACTED] performance indicator as indicative that "the objectives for this goal are being achieved."
- IMIR prepared a set of reports for the Steering Group's consideration (attached below). While Fall 2012 data are included for the group's deliberations, Fall 2012 data will *not* be in the final report published by the campus. Some of the below data are calendar year while others are for the fall terms and may or may not include students who started in the spring or summer. As a result there can be some variation between reports based on which periods are included.

Among the highlights:

- Since 2002, overall enrollments generally have been stable with a slight decrease this year.
- Our overall minority enrollment continues to grow and we are running ahead of the percentage of minority test-takers both in our region and statewide.
- We are up in both beginners and transfers with some decline in the number of intercampus transfers. The latter is true with other IU campuses as well.
- The qualifications of entering students are up. Moving the average SAT 8 points in one year is quite a feat. We have held essentially the same in high school rank and have virtually no students from bottom quartile
- This year we had a real bounce back in the number of valedictorians/salutatorians and in the number of students in the top 10%.
- 45% of students are from outside of our traditional service region, a significant change from ten years ago. We have become much more a *state* school than a campus serving a defined geographic location. One reason for the share of our enrollment being from our region is that it also is the population center for the state.

- We have experienced a very substantial shift in terms of gift aid over time, with the largest component growth in federal and state aid.
 - A change in how we will process loans will go into effect this fall. In the past the loan for which the student qualified was placed on the student's account. If the student did not want the loan, she or he had to take steps to decline it. Effective this Fall, students will instead have to accept the loan as a demonstration of their commitment. This transition will make for a rough beginning of the semester as many students will not recognize the change and simply expect the loan to be applied.
 - Growth of state expenditures for 21st Century Scholars may eat all other state aid and may result in legislative changes that will decrease eligibility as a way to try to control spending.
- The retention rate is up to 72%, but the graduation rate is down this year, noting that it has been a "problem cohort."
- Following a review of the data and a discussion, the Steering Group reaffirmed [REDACTED] as the most appropriate performance indicator for how IUPUI is doing in attracting and supporting a diverse and well-prepared student population. The objectives for this goal are being achieved.

Student Demographics

Beginning in 2010, Indiana University began reporting race/ethnicity using a new set of definitions required by the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES). Both the old and new race/ethnic categories are included in this table to allow for longitudinal comparisons. Overall, minority student enrollment at IUPUI has increased both in absolute numbers and as a percentage of all students over the past 10 years. African-American students remain the largest minority group at IUPUI, although the number of Hispanic American students has more than doubled over the past decade. The number of international students enrolled at IUPUI continues to grow and now accounts for more than five percent of the student body. Females continue to outnumber males, and the percentage of students age 25 or older continues to decline.

Student Enrollment

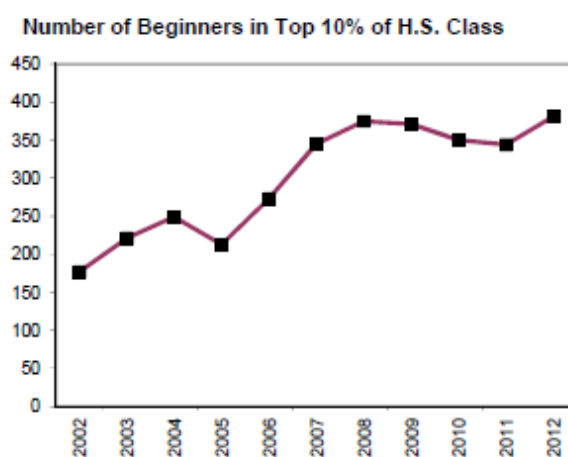
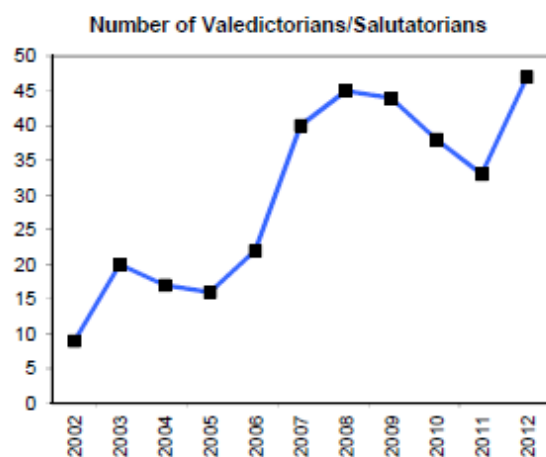
Academic Background of New Undergraduates

As a result of changing admissions practices, IUPUI is enrolling better prepared students as measured by average SAT scores and high school class rank. The numbers of valedictorians, salutatorians, and students ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school class who enroll at IUPUI rebounded in 2012 after several years of small declines.

New Graduate Students

The number of students entering master's degree programs at IUPUI has increased substantially in the last 10 years, even after accounting for the move of the Kelley Direct MBA program to IUB in 2009. New student enrollment in doctoral-practice programs (i.e., medicine, dentistry, law, and health and rehabilitation sciences) remain strong, due in part to enrollment in the relatively new Doctor of Physical Therapy program. The number of new doctoral-research students continued to rebound after a slight decrease in 2006.

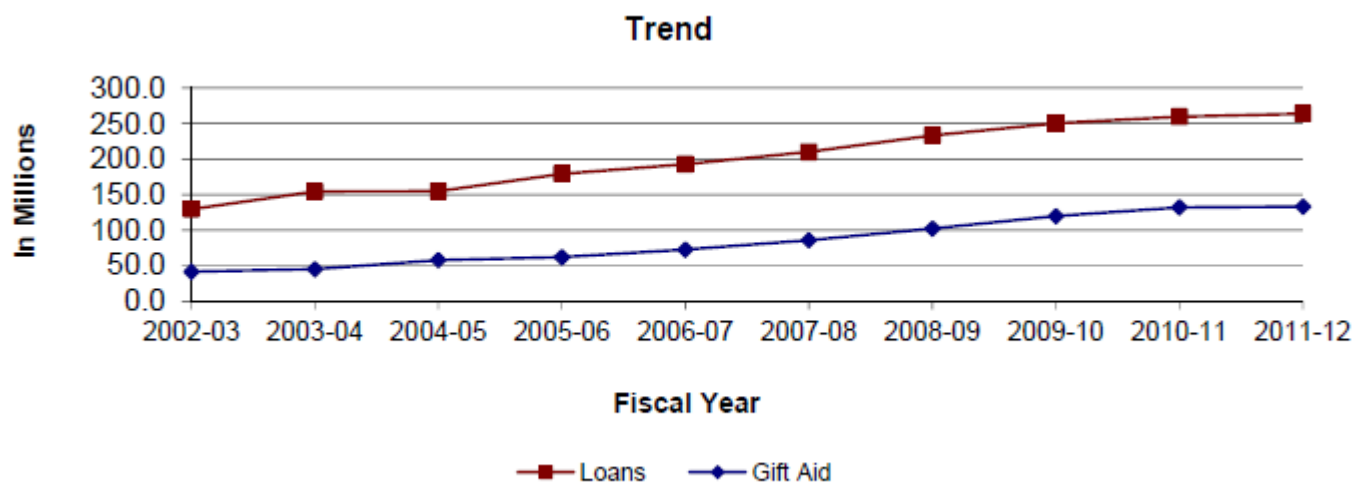
