Presiding over the annual banquet for 1989 were Mrs. Kathy Stoner, president of Theta Chapter of Sigma Phi Alpha dental hygiene honorary; and Dr. Melvin Lund, president of Theta Theta Chapter of OKU dental honor society. Featured speaker was Dr. Arthur Hansen, former president of Purdue University and chancellor of Texas A&M University. Dr. Hansen is now a senior research associate at the Hudson Institute. His topic was "Ethics and the Professional—A Public Concern."

OKU also inducted **Dr. Cecil Brown**, associate professor of endodontics, and **Dr. E. Brady Hancock**, professor and chairman of periodontics, as new faculty members. New OKU life members are **Dr. David Bixler**, professor and chairman of oral facial genetics; **Dr. M. John Borkowski**, assistant professor of prosthodontics; **Dr. Melvin**

Lund, professor of operative dentistry; and **Dr. Ralph Phillips**, research professor in dental materials.

Lynn Albrecht was named the 1989 OKU Outstanding Student, an honor that is based on grade point average, quality and quantity of clinical work, and scores on Part I and Part II of National Board examinations. Mr. Albrecht received a plaque from the organization and his name was added to the OKU plaque on permanent display in the dental school.

The "Dr. William S. Kramer Award of Excellence," established last year by the Supreme Chapter in honor of a past president, was presented to R. Todd Bergman. The Kramer award recognizes a third-year dental student at each component chapter school who has demonstrated scholarship, character and potential for advancement in dentistry.

Professor Yokom Among IU Founders Day Honorees

Nanci G. Yokom, supervisor of the dental hygiene program on the IU-South Bend campus (below), was one of five IU faculty members to receive a newly created award during the 1989 Founders Day ceremonies, held on the Bloomington campus on April 16. The W. George Pinnell Award for

Outstanding Service is named for IU's Executive Vice President Emeritus Pinnell. It recognizes administrative service to a profession or discipline, or to the public.

Professor Yokom is a native of Racine, Wisconsin, who received her dental hygiene training from Marquette University. She spent six years in private practice and taught on the faculty at Ferris State College before moving to Indiana. She was appointed to the IU faculty on the South Bend campus in 1977 and was named supervisor of the dental hygiene program in 1979. Professor Yokom holds two degrees from IU, a bachelor's degree (1976) and a master's (1980). was recently promoted to associate professor of dental auxiliary education.

New Maynard K. Hine Seminar Room Shows a Touch of Class (of 1961)

Drs. Jack P. Mollenkopf and Charles E. Smith got the ball rolling with a letter to their classmates, inviting each one to help the IU School of Dentistry establish a new Maynard K. Hine Seminar Room, in honor of IUSD's former dean and first chancellor at IUPUL.

An enthusiastic response from the majority of the IUSD Class of '61 has made possible the makeover of Room S426 to a comfortable, well-appointed class room ideally suited for graduate seminars and other meetings. New lecture-style chairs permit a larger seating capacity and greater ease in rearranging the room to accommodate a variety of teaching formats.

A new portrait of Dr. Hine, taken by IUPUI photographer Rick Baughn, is displayed in the room along with many of the plaques and awards presented to Dr. Hine by dental organizations throughout the world in recognition of his leadership role in the dental profession over the years.

Dr. Hine was given an opportunity to visit with some of his former students during the Indiana Dental Association annual session held at the Indianapolis Convention Center last May. A photo taken of Dr. Hine with members of the Class of '61 and a plaque citing the class's generous contribution to the School of Dentistry will soon be added as the final touches to the seminar room.

"The Class of 1961's support of this project is deeply appreciated," Dean H. William Gilmore said recently. "We invite all members of the class to stop by the school the next time they're in town to see the Hine Seminar Room. We are very proud of it."

New Friends: IUSD and Singapore Sign Agreement

Pledging to "establish ties of friendship and cooperation for the purpose of promoting mutual understanding and academic, cultural, and personnel exchanges," the National University of Singapore and Indiana University signed an agreement last winter that will offer a wealth of opportunity for postdoctoral students and faculty at both schools of dentistry.

At the invitation of **Dr. Loh Hong Sai**, dean of the Faculty of Dentistry at National University of Singapore, **Dr. H. William Gilmore**, dean of the IU dental school, traveled to Singapore in January with his wife, Marcia, to finalize the agreement. "The dental educational community has become a world-wide community at the graduate level," Dean Gilmore said recently. "We at IU have expertise in certain areas of research to share with faculty members and graduate students at Singapore, just as they have much to offer us. The possibilities for scientific and cultural exchanges are exciting."

Located within a new university setting, the dental school at Singapore greatly impressed Dr. Gilmore. "I was given a comprehensive tour of the facilities and was able to speak with many of the faculty and students," he said. "Their dental program is smaller than ours—they have about 40 students per class and about 35 full-time faculty members. Singapore offers its students a top-quality dental education."

Dean Sai signed the Agreement of Friendship and Cooperation on January 26, and then presented it to Dr. Gilmore to bring back to IU. Dr. Gilmore signed on February 7, and **Thomas Ehrlich**, president of Indiana University, made the agreement official by signing the document on February 24.

IU has already welcomed its first visitors from Singapore. In April, Dr. Chong-Lin Chew, of the National University of Singapore faculty, and his

wife, Doreen, spent several days in Indianapolis. Dr. Chew received the MSD degree in dental materials from Indiana University in 1977 and was enrolled here in a special one-year certificate program in prosthodontics in 1983-84.

Plans for some of the exchanges are already under way. "Dean Sai will be coming to Indiana in the fall," Dr. Gilmore said. "We are collaborating on a project that involves the use of lasers in restoring and sealing teeth and making them more resistant to decay."

This is the second friendship agreement that the IU School of Dentistry has entered into with another dental school. The first was signed in 1985 with Matsumoto Dental College, Shiojiri, Japan, during **Dr. Ralph E. McDonald's** tenure as dean of the IU dental school.

The contract with Singapore marks the beginning of many such programs to be created in the year ahead. Dr. Gilmore recently has returned from a trip to Thailand and Australia, where several friendship agreements with universities in those countries are nearing completion. Many others, including programs with universities in Brazil, are in the planning stages.

New Awards Announced For Clinical Achievement

Dr. Donald R. Tharp, associate dean for clinical affairs, recently met with four fourthyear students to congratulate them as recipients of the new IUSD Clinical Achievement Awards, given for outstanding clinical progress. According to Dr. Tharp, Clinical Achievement Awards will be given several times each year to recognize the periodic progress of third- and fourth-year students (after first and second semesters and at the end of summer session). They also will serve to honor dental students and dental hygiene students at graduation time for overall clinical achievement. Honors Day '89

On Sunday, May 14, 1989, dental graduates joined graduates of dental hygiene, dental assisting, and the postdoctoral programs for an afternoon of celebration and recognition with families, friends, and representatives of the dental school and dental profession during the IUSD Honors Program, held downtown Indianapolis at the Indiana Convention Center. IUPUI commencement exercises in the Hoosier Dome followed.







People In the News

Dr. Samuel S Patterson, professor emeritus of endodontics and former chairman of the department, received the Edgar D. Coolidge Award from the American Association of Endodontists (AAE) during the 46th annual session, May 3-7, 1989, in New Orleans. The award is given annually to an individual who has displayed leadership and dedication to dentistry and endodontics.

A reporter for American Health magazine recently interviewed Dr. Charles L. Nelson, associate professor of oral and maxillofacial surgery, regarding the risk of bacterial endocarditis for dental patients with heart problems who do not receive appropriate antibiotic treatment before dental procedures are undertaken. The article cited a recent Indiana University study by Dr. Nelson and IUSD graduate Dr. Sue VanBlaricum ('88), which found only 39% of 224 dentists and 27% of 141 physicians surveyed had complied with American Heart Association guidelines when prescribing antibiotics to their patients. Dr. Nelson's remarks appeared in the June '89 issue.

Dr. Ronald K. Harris has been promoted to professor of operative dentistry.

For serving Indiana University "above and beyond the call of duty," Dr. Chris H. Miller, professor and chairman of oral microbiology, was among eight faculty and seven staff members receiving the Glenn W. Irwin, Jr., M.D., Experience Excellence Recognition Award on the IUPUI campus on April 21. The Irwin awards, named for the former IU vice president at Indianapolis who retired in 1986, were presented this year during the first Chancellor's Honors Convocation, held at the Conference Center and presided over by Gerald L. Bepko, vice president and chancellor (Indianapolis). Dr. Miller's research efforts in the area of infection control in the dental office have earned him national recognition in recent years. In 1980 he developed a sterilization monitoring service for Indiana dentists that has now served nearly 2,000 dentists in Indiana and elsewhere.

Also, Dr. Miller recently has been invited by the American Association of Dental Schools to chair a working committee dealing with the principles of infection control and equipment and facility design.

Dr. William G. Shafer, distinguished professor emeritus of oral pathology and former chairman of the department, recently received the Past Presidents Award from the American Academy of Oral Pathology. The award was announced at the Academy's annual session, held this year in Savannah, Georgia, in April.

Prof. Chisler Retires From IUSD Faculty

Juanita H. Chisler, assistant professor of dental assisting at the IU School of Dentistry, retired from her position on May 15, 1989, after serving Indiana University for 24 years.

Prof. Chisler was first appointed at IU as a dental assistant in undergraduate pediatric dentistry in 1965. She transferred to the graduate division of the department in 1969, serving

as supervisor of dental assistants from 1970 to 1973. When IUSD's dental assisting program was created in 1973, Ms. Chisler was named to the faculty and taught dental assisting students with Mrs. Marjory H. Carr, the School's first program director. Ms. Chisler was promoted to the rank of assistant professor in 1979.

Prof. Chisler was certified by the

American Dental Assistants Association in 1969. She received a bachelor of science degree in health occupations education from IU in 1978, graduating with high distinction.

Prof. Chisler was cited as "Instructor of the Year" by the Dental Assisting Class of 1976 and was honored with a "Teaching Appreciation" award from the Class of 1979.

During her teaching career Prof. Chisler completed a number of television teaching tapes and served on several dental school committees. longtime contributor to the School's annual teaching conference, she was co-author of an article entitled "Annual Teaching Conference Comes of Age at IUSD," which was published in the IUSD Alumni Bulletin in 1986. She holds membership in the American Dental Assistants Association and is a former member of the American Association of Dental Schools. She is active in the Indianapolis Dental Assistants Society and the Indiana Dental Assistants Association, having served as an IDAA delegate in 1976 and as chairman of registration in 1981.

On April 20 Prof. Chisler was honored for her outstanding contributions to the dental school during a luncheon celebration with friends and colleagues at University Place on the IUPUI campus.

A Deutschland Experience

Having returned recently from a trip overseas, Dr. Ronald K. Harris, professor of operative dentistry, offers the following report:

"In June, Dr. Melvin R. Lund, professor of operative dentistry, and I traveled to West Germany to participate in a three-day symposium co-sponsored by the American Academy of Gold Foil Operators and the University of Gottingen. About 20 Americans joined in the program, which consisted of a series of lectures on direct filling golds and clinical demonstrations. lectured on materials and properties and I discussed practical applications and "everyday" uses for gold foil.

I also clinically demonstrated the handling, placement, and finishing of two Class I occlusal foils.

"The program, held June 8-10, was well attended and very well received. Clinical operations were performed on about 15 individuals, including area dentists and dental students from the University of Gottingen who had expressed a desire to have their restorations replaced.

"All of the American visitors were impressed by the facilities and the level of knowledge displayed by the host school and its students. Participants were conversant in English, and we found their enthusiasm refreshing!

"During the next weekend I presented a one-day course in basic direct gold technique at the office of Academy member Dr. Jan Drews, in Überlingen, which is located in the southern part of the country. Dr. Drews had participated in the basic and advanced gold foil courses that were held at Indiana University in the summers of 1988 and 1987, and he was eager

to share information about gold foils with other dental practitioners. Several dentists came a long distance to attend. He has been enjoying much success with gold foils and reported to us that he now places several foils each week in his practice.

Germany is a delightful place to visit. The food is delicious, the scenery magnificent, the highways somewhat frightening, and the people very friendly!"

The regular meeting place for dental hygiene course H347 Community Dental Health is Room 115 of the IU dental school; but on four occasions during spring semester, members of the second-year class gathered their dental supplies and headed off to Irish Hills, on the southeastside of Indianapolis, to provide dental screenings at no charge for 30 members of the Fountain Square Branch of the Girls Club of Greater Indianapolis.

The course, taught by Louise M. Judd, clinical assistant professor of dental hygiene, guides students through the principles and practice of dental health program planning and gives them an overview of how to implement and evaluate community programs. Prof. Judd and Dr. Sybil S. Niemann, director and assistant professor of dental auxiliary education, supervised activities at the Fountain Square site.

Since the Girls Club has no dental facilities, the dental hygiene students

took an imaginative approach to their work, finding ways to "make do" in their makeshift surroundings. Girls Club members, ranging in age from 7 to 15, were also given dietary counseling and instruction in oral hygiene by the IU students, who provided toothbrush kits and set up a dental home care unit so that changes in the girls' home care habits could be monitored.

The dental hygiene students were invited by Fountain Square to present their dental program as part of an overall Body Awareness Program sponsored for the youngsters by the Club. Plans are in the making to return to Fountain Square for a follow-up next spring semester.

The dental hygiene students have been especially active in outreach-type projects this year, having recently completed a program in which members of the Gorman Boys Club received free dental cleanings and counseling.













Gift of Daruma Doll Reaffirms Goals of Friendship Agreement

When visitors from Matsumoto Dental College, Shiojiri, Japan, came to town last March, they brought with them an unusual gift for the IU dental school to reaffirm the goals set forth in the Agreement of Friendship signed by the two schools in 1985.

In a brief ceremony in the Dean's Office, **Dr. Takahiro Imanishi**, academic director and chairman of pediatric dentistry at Matsumoto Dental College, presented Dean H. William Gilmore with a doll that is a representation of the Indian Buddhist priest Bodhidharma ("Daruma" in Japanese), the founder of Zen Buddhism in China. Also present were **Dr. Hiroshi Yagasaki**, a faculty member in the Matsumoto Dental College department of oral histology who is also a son of the MDC founder and president; **Mr. Arthur L. Bingham**, of the MDC office of external affairs; and **Dr. Lawrence I. Goldblatt**, IU associate dean for graduate and postgraduate education and acting associate dean for academic affairs.

As explained by Mr. Bingham, some of the many legends regarding Daruma's unusual discipline and his pursuit of enlightenment lend meaning to the doll's round shape. As one story goes, the doll is round because Daruma lost the use of his arms and legs after spending nine years meditating

in a cave. Original models of the doll were called "the little priest who stands up" and symbolized perseverence because they always returned to an upright position when tipped over. Although the shape of the doll has changed somewhat, the symbolism remains.

Today, daruma dolls are used as charms for the fulfillment of a special goal. When a daruma doll is made, its eyes are left unpainted because legend has it that Daruma chastised himself for falling asleep while meditating by cutting off his eyelids! When a new goal is undertaken, the owner of a daruma doll paints in one eye and then places the doll on display. Once the goal has been reached, the other eye is painted.

"It is our hope that evidence of a strengthened relationship between Matsumoto Dental College and Indiana University School of Dentistry will manifest in the form of an increase of student and faculty exchanges," Mr. Bingham stated recently.

The daruma doll, which will become part of the IU dental school's exhibit dedicated to Matsumoto Dental College, serves as a symbol of that goal.

Endodontist Receives Second Annual Hine Research Award

Dr. Scott W. Morrison, a part-time assistant professor of endodontics at the IU School of Dentistry and full-time practitioner in Evansville, received the **Dr. Maynard K. Hine Award for Excellence in Research** during the annual business meeting of the Indiana Section of the American Association for Dental Research last spring.

The award, created in 1987 and named for IUPUI Chancellor Emeritus Hine and former dean of the dental school, is sponsored by Procter and Gamble Company and is given annually in recognition of outstanding achievement in research by a postdoctoral student.

Dr. Morrison received the MSD degree in endodontics from IU last September. While enrolled in that program he conducted an in vitro study concerning the effects of steam sterilization and usage on cutting efficiency of endodontic instruments.

Originally from Seattle, Washington, Dr. Morrison attended dental school at Indiana University and stayed on in Indianapolis as a general practitioner after graduating in 1979. He moved to Evansville last year and has been a member of the faculty in the department of endodontics since 1986.
