Peachey Fund awards \$75,000 to IUSCC to support Amelia Project



Guests at the March 21 Amelia Project meeting enjoyed a variety of food that was made from recipes from the Just Peachey: Bearing Fruit cookbook. Sales of the cookbook benefit breast cancer research in Indiana.

The Catherine Peachey Fund recently awarded a \$75,000 grant to the IU Simon Cancer Center to support the Amelia Project for the next five years. The Amelia Project brings together scientists, cancer-research specialists, and consumers to understand breast function and to enhance identification of breast-cancer risks.

On March 12, the Amelia Project hosted a meeting at IU-Kokomo, which attracted nearly 80 attendees, including more than a dozen patient advocates. Senior and junior scientists, clinical investigators, and students from six different Indiana universities and colleges collaborated with consumers to work toward the eradication of breast cancer during that meeting.

In its first 12 years, the Amelia Project initiated the founding and funding of what is now the

Komen Tissue Bank at the IU Simon Cancer Center, the only bio-repository of normal breast tissue of its kind in the world.


