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Foreword



This is the eleventh volume of "Kiwanis Activities" summarizing the officially reported activities of all the Kiwanis clubs in the United States and Canada during the year 1932. The compilation was made possible by utilizing the Official Monthly Reports recording activities as reported by the club secretaries.

At the close of 1932 there were 1,871 clubs, according to the membership records of January 1, 1933, and nearly all, with the exception of the newly built clubs, were carrying on civic and welfare programs.

The Objects of Kiwanis International have made possible these numerous achievements recorded in this present book. These Objects are:

To give primacy to the human and spiritual rather than to the material values of life.

To encourage the daily living of the Golden Rule in all human relationships.

To promote the adoption and the application of higher social business and professional standards.

To develop, by precept and example, a more intelligent, aggressive and serviceable citizenship.

To provide through Kiwanis clubs, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service, and to build better communities.

To co-operate in creating and maintaining that sound public opinion and high idealism which make possible the increase of righteousness, justice, patriotism, and good-will.

Clubs in the United States observed "Constitution Week", September 11 to 17, and this annual occasion has for its purpose the stressing of better citizenship. In Canada, "Canadian Citizenship Week", June 26 to July 2, was a similar occasion for the promotion of good citizenship. The clubs also took part in "United States-Canada Week", April 24 to 30, in celebration of the peace and friendship that has existed between the two countries for over a century, and observed "All Kiwanis Night", June 27, 1932, during the 16th annual convention at Detroit. This latter was a simultaneous meeting of clubs from the Atlantic to the Pacific in commemoration of the unselfish service and accomplishments of the organization.

The 18th anniversary of Kiwanis was observed during the week of January 21, 1933. The organization's birth-date is January 21, 1915 at Detroit, Michigan.

Suggestions for Your Own Club

KIWANIS ACTIVITIES is a summary of the community betterment and service activities of Kiwanis clubs in the United States and Canada. The book is compiled annually from the Official Monthly Reports submitted by clubs.

The activities indicate the many varied and practical applications of the ideals, and objectives of Kiwanis International, and suggest opportunities of similar service for other communities, institutions, groups, and individuals.

The book is not an honor-roll of clubs. It has been compiled as a descriptive presentation of diversified service endeavors.

How to Use the Book

KIWANIS ACTIVITIES is suggestive of what can be done in all communities by active clubs. Every club, large or small, seeking suggestions for community service can find in this volume sources of information on every conceivable kind of activity.

The key which unlocks the treasure of this book for clubs is the index on the final pages. There appear over forty general divisions of activities, which direct the reader to pages of thousands of records of actual club work.

Clubs which have made surveys of their own communities and are planning new or additional service activities, can review the results of clubs in towns of somewhat the same type and population. Clubs seeking suggestions may be located in either agricultural or industrial areas, or in vicinities of both farming and manufacturing.

For a club in an agricultural region, the index will indicate hundreds of valuable activities in better town and country relations work, in city beautiful planning, health campaigns, conservation and general education. If a club functions in a community where all forms of general economic enterprise are in operation, a vast store-house of material is suggested by such index topics as health and sanitation, boys' and girls' work, improvement of civic conditions, aid to business and industry, and many others.

A careful study of KIWANIS ACTIVITIES by members will reveal to them many clubs of about the same size, in localities having similar opportunities and problems, engaged in active and varied service programs.

Every Kiwanian is urged to make a thorough inspection of KIWANIS ACTIVITIES to familiarize himself with the summary of service work of all the clubs in Kiwanis International.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD

The service rendered by all the Kiwanis clubs in the United States and Canada, on behalf of under-privileged children, consists in removing those physical, mental, moral and economic handicaps, which bar them from the full measure of citizenship.

The following under "General Assistance" shows the various kinds of activities accomplished during 1932 to aid the children under this major Kiwanis objective:

General Assistance

- Aberdeen, Wash.** The club cares for the support and medical treatment of a youth now in his last year at high school. For eight years Kiwanians have aided this young boy. An automobile load of jams and jellies were contributed to the Oakhurst Sanitarium at Elma.
- Ada, Okla.** School books and pencils were provided children of one school. Under-privileged children were sent to hospitals for surgical attention and one crippled boy was aided in having his braces repaired and adjusted.
- Allentown, Pa.** A Boy Scout troop was organized for under-privileged youths. One hundred boys and girls have been provided memberships in the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A. All of these youngsters were sent to a summer camp. Ten other girls were also given a week at a Salvation Army camp.
- Altadena, Calif.** Kiwanians are responsible for weekly programs at the La Vina Sanitorium and at the Preventorium.
- Ann Arbor, Mich.** Fifty-four Kiwanians acted as newsboys and sold over 4,000 papers. The revenue was added to our welfare budget. All performers of the Hagenbeck-Wallace circus were taken to the University Hospital where they put on a show for the crippled children.
- Antigo, Wis.** Old toys were collected and repaired and later distributed to the poor children of our county.
- Asheville, N. C.** A council was formed to include all the child welfare groups with the hope that there would be no duplication of work in our territory. A contribution was given to the North Carolina School for the Deaf and poor children were taken on various trips and provided entertainment.
- Athens, Tex.** Coin jars were placed throughout the business district to secure funds for food, milk and medicines. The club found four children, all seriously ill, and saved the lives of all but one of them. The club will make donations to the Scottish Rite Hospital for Children located in Dallas.
- Atlanta, Ga.** Funds are constantly available for the activities of the club at the Hillside Cottages and the Home for the Friendless. For many years Atlanta Kiwanians have taken a special interest in the boys and girls in these institutions.
- Atlantic City, N. J.** Wives of Kiwanians organized sewing parties for making dresses for girls between the ages of 2 and 14 years. Hundreds of garments were finished and distributed to the city's poor. Food and shoes were also supplied to indigent children.
- Baltimore, Md.** Appropriations were made during the year for a baby clinic and general welfare work at the University of Maryland. A fellowship fund amounting to \$1,500.00 per year is available for activities at the Children's Hospital School.
- Beatrice, Neb.** All school children who need attention, but whose parents are unable to pay for the service, receive free medical aid. Professional service was given to 37 young people.
- Boulder, Colo.** Needy children were given clothing, and Kiwanis groups made inspection trips to the homes of the needy to find out what service could be offered.
- Brandon, Man.** Children were admitted to our eye clinic and provided with the necessary glasses. We continue to operate a flower car for the Children's Home. Our annual apple day sales amounted to \$640.00, which was used for service work.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Gen. Assistance)—Cont.

- Bridgeton, N. J.** An investigation was made by Kiwanians to find children unable to attend school because of lack of clothing and shoes. In our general relief work all children were properly clothed and provided with nourishing food.
- Brooksville, Fla.** School books were purchased for the children of poor families.
- Caldwell-West Essex, N. J.** Shoes and clothing were purchased and over 200 pairs of shoes repaired. Twenty boys and girls were sent to summer camps. Money was given to the high school so that under-privileged children could buy warm luncheons.
- Calgary, Alta.** A tag day secured us \$5,000.00 for the Woods' Christian Orphans' Home, which is sponsored by the Kiwanis club. All the orphans are entertained with races, sports, games, amusements and refreshments.
- Camden, N. J.** The welfare committee gave donations of money, food and clothing to the Sheltering Arms Home. The wives of Kiwanians made clothing for all the inmates of this institution. A milk fund was also available for youngsters.
- Canoga Park-Reseda, Calif.** The club hopes to have a band organization at the Pacific Lodge Boys' Home, where Kiwanians are taking an individual interest in the youths. The club is responsible for programs and entertainment for these boys.
- Canton, Ohio.** Over 4,000 people attended our annual Hallowe'en party. Sixty under-nourished boys and girls were taken to a fresh air camp for an eight-weeks' vacation. The Fairmount Children's Home now has a 40 piece band for which the club helped to furnish instruments. Entertainment is provided for the children in this home.
- Centerville, Iowa.** Transportation was furnished during the entire school year for a youth who lived 10 miles out in the country but desired to attend high school.
- Claremont, Calif.** The club contributes to the support of a 16-year-old orphan girl. She has been placed with a private family where the right advantages and environment will help her.
- Clarksburg, W. Va.** We paid the tuition for a boy at West Virginia University and also the transportation charges for a crippled girl attending high school. Helped to secure funds for sending tubercular children to a state preventorium.
- Clermont, Fla.** During 1932 the club members made weekly trips to Orlando where a blind youth was taken for special handicraft training. A minstrel show gave us money for under-privileged child hospitalization work.
- Covington, Ga.** Two under-privileged children are being sent to a kindergarten school by the club.
- Cumberland, Md.** Personal service and Big Brother work goes on constantly for 60 under-privileged child cases. Orthopedic shoes, braces and an artificial leg were purchased for various children. An inspection was made to find all under-nourished children in the public schools.
- Des Moines, Iowa.** The club has had developed a motion picture film showing the different kinds of activities for unfortunate children. Many clubs in Kiwanis International have had the privilege of using this film at their meetings. The Des Moines club carries on general under-privileged child work throughout the year.
- Dover, N. H.** One boy was placed in the Golden Rule Home so that he might secure a proper education. The club is happy that he is interested in the school work, in music and athletics.
- Dover, N. J.** Kiwanians visit a nearby reformatory where they present programs for the boys.
- East Dearborn, Mich.** An appropriation was made for a summer camp and the club is now interested in special work for mentally deficient pupils at the Roulo School.
- East Los Angeles, Calif.** A nurse is engaged to care for children while mothers are in classes studying citizenship and household arts.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Gen. Assistance)—Cont.

- East Orange, N. J.** A contribution of \$250.00 was given the New Jersey Orthopedic Hospital for a Kiwanis free bed. Tuition was paid for a talented youngster who was attending a technical school and our dental clinic is achieving excellent results. A truant boy has been placed in a good country home. Theatre parties, automobile rides and a summer camp were part of our program for under-privileged youngsters.
- Edmonton, Alta.** Our second annual Indian stampede, with 1,000 Indians present, gave us \$500.00 for work at the Kiwanis Home. We also raised \$1,600.00 on our apple day.
- Enderlin, N. D.** Collected children's story books and sent them to a juvenile home at Fargo.
- Endicott, N. Y.** Clothing, stockings and overshoes were provided for all under-privileged boys and girls. Used an old automobile and covered it with miniature snapshots of people. The club offered prizes for persons who could guess the total number of photographs pasted on the car. This contest secured us some added funds for our welfare work.
- Eufaula, Ala.** The club furnished school books for all children unable to buy them.
- Eustis, Fla.** Paid the expenses for a boy at an industrial school. Furnished free dental service to needy youths and adults, and we took all children to a lake resort picnic.
- Everett, Wash.** A donation was made to help purchase an automobile trunk to be used in gathering supplies for the Deaconess Children's Home. Each child in this home is remembered by some Kiwanian at the time of the youngster's birthday.
- Falmouth, Mass.** The club made a contribution so that a young woman might continue her studies as a teacher for the blind. When this young lady completes her course she will then be self-supporting. She will herself become blind in the near future. Shoes were distributed to all under-privileged children.
- Galion, Ohio.** Furnishings for an assembly and play room at the County Children's Home were purchased by the club. Thirty-two boys were given shoes and clothing and a number of others were sent to a Boy Scout camp.
- Hamilton, Ohio.** Kiwanians work with the municipal judge, the Probate Court and the Chamber of Commerce in caring for all children needing immediate attention. All these cases are cared for until the welfare organizations can take over the task. Permanent homes for two young girls were secured and the club was responsible for getting the county commissioners to increase the mothers' pension fund to approximately \$15,-000.00 a year.
- Hamilton, Ont.** Weekly visits are made to the children at a sanitorium and a check for \$250.00 was presented to the Hamilton Health Association. Children at the sanitorium were provided with candy at Easter time.
- Harvey, Ill.** Placed a destitute girl in a private home and one member is providing funds for sending a child through school. All needy children were given dental attention.
- Henderson, Tex.** Made arrangements so that a crippled boy could attend college.
- Hermosa Beach, Calif.** We continue to support a boy at the McKinley Home and monthly donations are made for a milk fund for the schools.
- Jacksonville, Fla.** Big Brother work goes on in the orphan homes of the city. Over 200 children have been contacted. Valentines and birthday presents are given to all these youngsters. Money was available to help the children in all the homes of the unemployed. Our Foster-Parent plan is being carried on enthusiastically and successfully.
- Kingsport, Tenn.** One youth was placed in a tailoring establishment at Knoxville, where it is hoped he will learn the trade and become self-supporting. So far the club has spent \$2,800.00 in assisting this youth. Free milk was distributed to needy children. The Happy Health Camp was given over \$1,000.00 during 1932.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Gen. Assistance)—Cont.

- Kingston, Ont.** Over \$5,000.00 was spent in direct relief work for providing clothing, furniture, stoves, etc., for needy families.
- Lake City, Fla.** Our main interest is to see that delinquent children are not rushed off to homes of correction. Each individual case is studied and proper recommendations made to a court officer before children are declared delinquent. School books and supplies were provided for children of poor families.
- Lindsay, Ont.** Our annual Picadilly Circus was again a success, with merchants distributing trade coupons with each 50 cent purchase. These coupons were redeemable at stores for merchandise and the stub of the coupon entitled the holder to a free admission to our circus. A net profit of \$1,200.00 was available for service work. This was secured with the awarding of a prize automobile during a street dance and carnival.
- Lockport, N. Y.** Seventeen members are Big Brothers to boys at the Wyndham Lawn Home. Some of these youths have been placed in good homes, principally on farms. All of this work has been the outgrowth of a Boy Scout troop sponsored at the institution several years ago. A home talent entertainment gave us \$400.00 for our milk fund.
- Logan, Ohio.** Paid the expenses so that a boy could graduate from high school and purchased orthopedic appliances for another child.
- Logansport, Ind.** Cooperated with the Red Cross in establishing a central clearing house for the distribution of charity throughout the county. This was carried on in connection with under-privileged child work.
- Los Gatos, Calif.** A special committee spent many hours in adjusting the estate of a farmer who died leaving a family of five small children. Kiwanians subscribed to an educational fund for one of the little girls. Clothing, shoes and milk were furnished to all needy children.
- Lubbock, Tex.** Over 100 children were given Kiwanis personal service so that they might have necessary clothing, shoes and school supplies. A special case record is kept on each child so that the club knows the progress being made.
- Miami, Fla.** The club works directly with the juvenile court so that under-privileged children can be given medical attention, food, milk, clothing and school supplies. Warm meals were given to children at one of the city's schools and glasses were secured for eight others. Doctors of the club made medical examinations of needy children in an elementary school. Special foods and medicines were available for children of families registered with the County Unemployed Relief Committee.
- Monroe, La.** Ten Kiwanians have signed up for personal service work with children. Food and shoes were purchased for needy youngsters.
- Moose Jaw, Sask.** The club has paid school tuition and secured clothing for two deaf and dumb children.
- Nashville, Tenn.** A special program and entertainment was arranged for 500 boys at a state penal institution. The club has also built up a library for these youths.
- Newark, N. J.** At Easter time various Kiwanis groups visited the city's six day nurseries. Candies and presents were distributed on the Fourth of July and at Christmas time. Several thousand gift packages were distributed among the orphan asylums and other institutions. Clothing was purchased for the children who needed help so that they could attend school.
- North Platte, Neb.** Kiwanis Dads are helping unfortunate boys and girls so that they may have a better chance to make good.
- North Shore, Chicago.** It was arranged so three blind children could receive music instructions. A free dental service was placed in operation for under-privileged children at the Goudy School.
- Ocean Beach, Calif.** Free transportation was furnished to boys and girls whose parents could not afford to give them street car fare to and from high school. Milk and clothing were given to poor families.
- Oil City, Pa.** We operate a dental clinic and an orphan boy is being assisted in his educational endeavors.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Gen. Assistance)—Cont.

- Oxford, N. C. A committee was appointed to attend the sessions of a boys' leadership course, which was held at an orphanage.
- Panama City, Fla. Needy students were helped in their preparations for high school graduation and financial assistance was given to a state orphanage at Pensacola. Dental service was available for needy youngsters.
- Perry, Fla. All organizations in the city were united in an effort to supply school books for children unable to purchase them. School supplies were purchased for the poor in the primary grades and a contribution was made for a soup kitchen at a school for the under-privileged.
- Philadelphia, Pa. The Kiwanis Happiness Car visits all the charitable institutions, city playgrounds and recreational centers. Over 100 pairs of shoes were given school children and 500 under-nourished boys and girls were provided with turkey dinners.
- Plainview, Tex. Employment was secured for five high school students who otherwise would have had to leave school.
- Pleasantville, N. J. The club became responsible for the care of an 11-year-old boy so he might have the proper environment and living conditions. Crippled children were taken on a picnic and the poor were supplied with shoes and wearing apparel.
- Prescott, Ariz. Fifty per cent of our club members are engaged in personal service work. Destitute children and their families were given clothing, shoes, glasses and medical attention.
- Quakertown, Pa. Kiwanians have volunteered to act as Big Brothers for all boys at the American Rescue Home. Wives of Kiwanians are the Big Sisters to the girls in the institution. Clothing and toys were given to this home at Christmas time.
- Racine, Wis. Our main interest is to see that children, whose parents have become unable to send them to school, are given help and encouragement.
- Richmond, Ind. The Child Welfare Committee is in close touch with all children returned from the Riley Memorial Hospital so as to conserve the benefits received from treatments and operations. Clothing and books were given children so that they could attend high school. Milk was provided under-nourished youngsters.
- Riverside, Detroit, Mich. It is impossible to determine the amount of time and money spent in welfare work during 1932. All physicians and dentists have offered their services free and Kiwanis employers have kept their men on the payrolls even when there was no productive work to be done. Children were provided with food, clothing, milk and shoes and others were sent to a summer camp.
- Riverside, N. J. Arranged for the education of a child permanently confined to a hospital. Under-nourished children were given cod liver oil twice a day. Those of pre-school age were given the bottled sunshine in their homes. Four girls were sent to a health farm and medical necessities were supplied to others.
- Rochester, N. Y. Purchased a new joy car, with a seating capacity of 50 children, for transporting boys and girls and aged persons of the local institutions to and from beaches and parks. Our old automobile had been in service for over nine years.
- San Jose, Calif. We employed a teacher during the summer months for the children at the county hospital.
- Saskatoon, Sask. The club has adopted several youths and will continue an interest in their supervision and guidance. Each boy is given a bank account and is urged to pal with his Kiwanis Big Brothers. All the children from a deaf and dumb school were taken on a picnic.
- Shawnee, Okla. Old school books were collected for children who this year were unable to buy these supplies. All were admitted to a picture show who provided old but worth-while text-books. A \$700.00 fund was available for the crippled children of Oklahoma.
- Smithfield, N. C. A deaf and dumb boy was paid expenses so that he could take a course as a linotype machine operator.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Gen. Assistance)—Cont.

- South Haven, Mich.** A teacher has been engaged to give daily instruction to two crippled children who live outside the city limits.
- South Pasadena, Calif.** Our club is sponsoring an orphan boy through school and we are helping the other youths in our vicinity. A camp fund was made available for organizations needing financial help.
- South Side, St. Louis, Mo.** A merry-go-round was purchased for the South Side Day Nursery. It has capacity for 16 youngsters. After being notified, the club gave money so that noon meals could be furnished school children. Our club physicians gave free medical service to indigent children in our community. Visitations and entertainments are made available for some 800 boys and girls in a poor neighborhood.
- South Tacoma, Wash.** The Vocational Guidance Committee continues its weekly manual training class for the orphans at the Washington Industrial Home. Sponsored an Easter egg hunt, supplied milk to school children, obtained medical aid for poor families and took all orphans and under-nourished children on a picnic.
- Stamford, Conn.** The Under-Privileged Child Committee is active in helping the youths who appear in the city court. The judge, who is a Kiwanian, is also giving every aid possible. Sixteen boys were sent to a Salvation Army camp.
- Steubenville, Ohio.** Each Kiwanian has been appointed as a Big Brother to some under-privileged boy. Medicine, cod liver oil, glasses, clothes and books were supplied for the poor. Eighty boys and girls were taken to a carnival.
- Sumter, S. C.** Each Kiwanian is appointed to some under-privileged child and his responsibility is to visit, supervise and direct the boy's interests throughout every month of the year.
- Tahlequah, Okla.** Necessary funds were given to pay for county court action so that good homes might be found for two young children. Nine doctors and nurses were in charge of the crippled children's clinic.
- Tarentum, Pa.** Penny collection jars were placed throughout the business houses in our community and we collected over \$185.00 for purchasing clothing and shoes. Several crippled children are being given every possible kind of service, and Big Brother work is being conducted by our members.
- University City, Mo.** The club has subscribed \$2,000.00 towards the building of a mothers' and babies' home at Ferguson.
- Wichita, Kan.** Furnished lunches, clothing and school supplies. One 16-year-old boy was provided assistance so that he could return to school. Each Friday afternoon Kiwanians entertain the youngsters at a children's home and 2,000 of Wichita's unfortunate children were taken to a circus.
- Winsted, Conn.** The club placed 20 children, sent by the New York Herald-Tribune, so that they could enjoy a two-weeks' vacation.
- Wyoming, Ill.** Our main efforts were to collect and disburse funds for unemployment relief and to provide clothing and milk for needy school children.
- York, Pa.** Fifty youngsters, sent from New York City, were found good homes during the vacation period. General welfare work was conducted throughout the year.

Physical

- Albany, Ga.** Observed the tenth anniversary of the opening of the Kiwanis clinic for under-privileged children. Nearly 700 individuals were given medical attention and care, and over 250 others received dental corrections.
- Alexandria, Ind.** Physicians, dentists and a registered nurse are in charge of our clinic, which is in full operation and open each Wednesday. This year, particular attention was paid to the health conditions in our public schools.
- Alliance, Ohio.** Warm cereal and milk are provided for school children at breakfast time.
- Amarillo, Tex.** During the entire school term, food and milk were furnished to all under-nourished children in one of our schools. Medical and surgical attention were also available to children whose parents were unable to pay for this service.
- Americus, Ga.** A Kiwanian, who is an eye specialist, gave his services free so that school children could be given examinations and provided with glasses.
- Appleton, Wis.** A dental clinic is being continued, and also all general forms of under-privileged child work.
- Barrie, Ont.** Distributed several thousand quarts of milk, and various public entertainments gave us funds for the organization of a clinic for crippled children of our county.
- Bartow, Fla.** Free medical attention for crippled children, distribution of milk for the under-nourished, the furnishing of clothing, and the sending of one youth to St. Louis for medical aid were some of the activities of the club during 1932.
- Beaver Dam, Wis.** A letter was sent to all parents of children in the kindergarten of the public and parochial schools, urging that the youngsters be inoculated with smallpox and diphtheria antitoxin. Children, whose parents could not pay for this attention, were administered the antitoxin free.
- Bellingham, Wash.** Our medical and dental clinic cares for all children whose parents are unable to offer any compensation. Nine doctors are in charge of the clinic. Food and stockings were given to poor children, and a number of girls were sent to a summer camp.
- Berlin, N. H.** All our under-privileged children dismissed from the hospital are assigned to Kiwanians for weekly visits and general assistance. There is a free distribution of milk to all needy school children.
- Billings, Mont.** There were 24 children treated in our tonsil and adenoid clinic, and 34 youngsters spent vacations at our health camp. The camp is under the supervision of a registered nurse, a playground supervisor and a cook. School books are donated to needy children of the orthopedic school. Glasses, dental assistance and other aid were available for children.
- Bluefield, W. Va.** Our main objective was to give financial assistance to the pre-natal clinic. A home talent play secured funds for this endeavor.
- Bristol, Tenn.** One youngster was sent to Greenville, S. C. to the Shriners' Hospital for Crippled Children. Orthopedic and dental services were available for children of the poor.
- Brooklyn, Cleveland, Ohio.** A fund of several thousand dollars was used to furnish free milk every day for approximately 550 school children. We entertained 3,000 under-privileged children at a theatre party, and several hundred went for a day's outing at a county park.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)—Cont.

- Buena Park, Calif.** Food and milk were supplied all needy children, and dental examinations were made for 500 students of the public schools. There were 105 patients and several hundred extractions, operations and other work.
- Butte, Mont.** A Kiwanis welfare nurse makes over 190 calls each month of the year at homes of the poor. Medical attention and child welfare care are available for all children and their mothers. Physicians and nurses conduct a pre-natal clinic, and milk, clothing, cod liver oil and medicine are dispensed freely. All crippled children are given exceptional care.
- Canajoharie, N. Y.** Thirty-two children from New York City were sent here for a two-weeks' vacation.
- Chester, Pa.** During a period of 22 months the eye clinic has attended 705 cases, and furnished 510 pairs of glasses.
- Chillicothe, Ohio.** All indigent school children in the rural districts are provided with shoes and clothing. Free milk and medical attention are available for children who are of pre-school age.
- Cincinnati, Ohio.** The club conducts a school at a tuberculosis sanatorium. A contribution was made to the St. Edmunds' Home at Glendale, Ohio. Shoes and clothing were purchased for boys and girls, and repairs were made for the summer camp.
- Cobalt, Ont.** Arrangements were made so all school children needing dental attention were provided this care at the expense of the Kiwanis club.
- Colorado Springs, Colo.** A mid-day hot meal was arranged and provided for children in a rural district, who were suffering from depression hardships. Two children are being maintained at a day nursery.
- Columbia, S. C.** Luncheons were served to over 100 school children. Those suffering from pellagra were given fresh vegetables. Medical services were available for all needy children, and the club took an interest in the case of a feeble-minded child, who needed institutional care.
- Concord, N. H.** Over \$3,000.00 worth of professional services for dental and eye operations were given free to 50 children.
- Cullman, Ala.** Free medical examinations were given to all children entering school in September. At the Kiwanis dental clinic 2,267 children were examined, and many of these were given free treatment. The club is engaged in summer playground activities for all under-privileged children.
- Danville, Ill.** The club furnished funds for conducting the public school food kitchen for 15 weeks with 2,348 free meals being served to youngsters. The services of the dental clinic are available for needy children.
- Danville, Va.** A preventorium was built by the club in 1927 at a cost of approximately \$26,000.00, and the debt has now been reduced to \$2,000.00. Treatment is provided for all children with tendencies toward tuberculosis. This work has been the major objective of the club for the past six years.
- Daytona Beach, Fla.** The club continues its Little Mothers' League and pre-school clinics, which are in charge of doctors, dentists and a nurse for supervising the work, giving health lectures, consultations, demonstrations in child care, health examinations and general aid. Milk, medicine, clothing and all necessities are purchased by the club. This year a Thrift House was opened in the business district for collecting all kinds of personal property which was later sold and the proceeds used for welfare work. Seven children have been adopted by Kiwanians.
- Dayton, Ohio.** Presented a crippled children's hospital with a new automobile. Kiwanians are responsible for programs each Monday night for the children at the Barney Community Center, and we provided clothing and other necessities for the children.
- Dearborn, Mich.** An old clothes drive secured 600 garments and shoes, and all this material was given to poor families. The parent-teachers' group mended and cleaned the clothing, and we received so much that charitable organizations were given the excess. A donation was made to the Children's Hospital at Ann Arbor.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)—Cont.

- Delray Beach, Fla.** Milk, clothing, antitoxin, dental, and medical examinations and treatments and school books were available for all under-privileged school children.
- Dubuque, Iowa.** A special room has been set aside for all under-nourished school children where milk, clothing and food are provided through the Kiwanis club. This activity of ours is now in its sixth year.
- East Cleveland, Ohio.** Kiwanians provided funds for groceries and milk for children at a high school. Free dental service is available, and clothing is distributed to the needy. Poor children were taken to a circus.
- Emporia, Kan.** Each year a pre-school clinic is conducted for the city. Several individual cases have necessitated special instructors. Glasses, school supplies, and toys were distributed. Kiwanians, who are members of the medical profession, give their time and talent to crippled children.
- Eureka, Calif.** A brace was purchased for a crippled child, and 221 pairs of shoes were provided needy school children. Three other children were sent to a hospital for surgical attention.
- Eureka, Kan.** Nineteen children were sent to a Kansas City hospital for operations, and our hospital cared for about 25 others who needed general assistance. One little girl, almost totally blind, was treated, and now has nearly a normal eyesight. A home talent play gave us sufficient profit for our under-privileged child work.
- Fairfield, Ala.** A clinic was held for children of pre-school age who needed medical, surgical and dental help. Free physical examinations were available to all boys and girls of school and pre-school age.
- Fairmount, W. Va.** During 1932 our clinic for needy children gave service to 169 youngsters.
- Fayetteville, N. C.** The club is responsible for three clinics. Orthopedic, prenatal and baby cases are all given the best of attention. The work covers six counties. Milk is furnished for all under-weight and needy school children.
- Florence, Ala.** The operation of a health clinic, supplying milk, fruit, jellies and clothing for under-privileged children, and rehabilitation health services are all constant activities of our club.
- Florence, S. C.** School books, milk, clothing, free medical, surgical and dental attention, and personal service for indigent children was the under-privileged child program for 1932.
- Flushing, N. Y.** Kiwanians were responsible for purchasing milk, food and coal for poor families. Medical and dental aid were also available for needy youths, and two children were aided by our Vocational Guidance Committee. The club received special recognition from the Health Department of the City of New York for its splendid service work.
- Fonda-Fultonville, N. Y.** Children from the poor districts of New York City were sent to us by the New York Herald-Tribune. These youngsters were given a vacation and supplied with nourishing food, supervised care and good entertainment at a welfare camp.
- Fort Worth, Tex.** The club donated funds so that over 1,000 meals were served each month to under-privileged school children. Shoes, stockings and clothing were also given to the needy.
- Framingham, Mass.** We sponsored a free vaccination clinic for all school children. Two youngsters were sent to Boston for orthopedic and eye troubles. Our minstrel show, attended by over 1,700 people, secured for us money with which to carry on our splendid activities. Two concerts by an orchestra in the community centre also interested our citizens, who contributed funds for the club's endeavors.
- Frankfort, N. Y.** One youngster, a victim of infantile paralysis, was sent to a New York City hospital to undergo six operations. The boy, crippled since childhood, will at least be able to walk with the help of crutches.
- Fresno, Calif.** A thorough survey was made in all the Fresno schools so that under-nourished and needy children could be given attention. A full investigation was made of home conditions so that an intelligent approach could be made to each individual case.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)—Cont.

- Fullerton, Calif.** General welfare work, the furnishing of milk, a scholarship loan fund, and a dental clinic are our activities for the under-privileged.
- Fulton, Ill.** All physicians and dentists of the community are helping the club and school authorities in the effort to protect the health of our children in the schools. Milk was purchased for under-weight children, and a brace was secured for a crippled boy.
- Gainesville, Fla.** Free school luncheons and hospital service were part of our activities for 1932. We also provided shoes, clothing and playground equipment for a group of needy children. One member is caring for a homeless boy.
- Greensburg, Ind.** On two occasions we sent a number of children to a speech clinic at the Riley Memorial Hospital in Indianapolis. One child, thought to be a helpless cripple for life, will be able to walk normally, and in the future care for its own livelihood.
- Greensburg, Pa.** Since 1928 forty crippled children have been given hospital treatment and care. Fifty children spent a vacation at a health camp.
- Greenville, Ky.** One of our members sent over 1,000 garments for distribution among needy school children. Food was provided for 56 children at the noon-day luncheon period.
- Greenville, Miss.** Donated funds to the Children's Orphanage at Jackson, Miss., secured brace for a crippled child, and sent eight under-privileged girls to a summer camp.
- Harlingen, Tex.** Nearly 11,000 children have been given dental examinations, and 2,500 tubes of tooth paste were supplied. Weekly contributions are made so that children in junior high school may have nourishing luncheons.
- Harrisburg, Pa.** Supplied braces and corrections for crippled children, secured funds for a college education for one under-privileged girl, and sent over 100 youths to a summer camp. On Thanksgiving morning our annual children's party was held. Entertainments were given at theatres with admission being four potatoes, and all the vegetables were later delivered to a children's home and an orphanage.
- Hartford City, Ind.** A number of children were taken to the Riley Memorial Hospital for treatment. The club paid for the food for noon-day luncheons for school children, and we endorsed a movement for a special appropriation for hospitalization for all tuberculosis patients in the county.
- Hopkinsville, Ky.** We have inaugurated a plan for examining every school child each year. Our under-privileged child work has now been going on for eight years, and we offer free medical service for all indigent youths.
- Hot Springs, S. D.** At our health clinic 238 children were examined. We continue to purchase milk for 100 under-nourished grade school children, and we gave a large number of books to the welfare camp.
- Huntsville, Ala.** Free medical service, school supplies, shoes, milk and food are donated to all worthy children. Two girls, victims of infantile paralysis, have undergone a series of operations. They are gradually improving.
- Independence, Kan.** Kiwanians secured necessary funds for repairs and improvements at an orphanage. A survey was made in the city schools to find all under-nourished children, and those needing corrective surgical attention.
- Indianapolis, Ind.** A medical and dental committee is being maintained at a boys' club where doctors spend two evenings each week making examinations. Many calls were made each month for maintaining our work at the Riley Memorial Hospital.
- Ingersoll, Ont.** Two children were sent to a hospital in London for treatment. Donations were made to a milk fund, and 30 children attended our summer camp.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)—Cont.

- Janesville, Wis.** A clinic is maintained for treatment and care of our poor children. Our doctors give their services free, and the club maintains a suite of rooms in a hospital, and pays the salary of a full-time nurse. We also supply books and playthings for the young patients. Each year we notice a marked increase in preparing children for their school work. Glasses are freely supplied.
- Jasper, Ala.** There were 105 operations performed in two days at our annual tonsil and adenoid clinic. Investigations were conducted in the schools to determine the children needing nourishing luncheons.
- Jasper, Tex.** The club secured all surplus foods in the surrounding vicinity, and with the aid of other organizations had 4,800 cans of food ready for feeding the needy children in the schools. Later in the year a program of immunizing all children against diphtheria was successfully carried out.
- Jefferson City, Mo.** During 1932 the clinic treated 594 patients. Orthopedic appliances, immunization against diphtheria, smallpox and typhoid was provided, and free milk was supplied to the schools.
- Joplin, Mo.** A soup kitchen was established in several schools, and 750 children received daily rations of milk and crackers. We had 240 children taken to the Joplin dental clinic. Medicine and clothing were purchased for needy youngsters.
- Kankakee, Ill.** Our community milk fund reached a total of \$1,400.00, and it was used to purchase 200 quarts of milk every day. Money was raised by placing coin bottles throughout the community, and the holding of a tag day.
- Kansas City, Kan.** A soup kitchen provided the students of six public schools with food at noontime. The average gain per pupil was about four pounds over a 12-week period, and the expenditure was approximately \$1,000.00.
- Kansas City, Mo.** Our Well Children's Station was operated again in 1932, and professional nurses made several hundred home calls each month. In this work, family physicians and clinical assistance, all aided in rehabilitation work. In six school districts children were given food, and 114 mothers and their children spent a vacation at a fresh air camp. From Eureka, Kansas, a number of children entered the Mercy Hospital. During their stay in the city we cared for them. Entertainment was held for 1,300 under-privileged children.
- Kinston, N. C.** A free hospital bed is maintained, and milk is distributed throughout the schools.
- Kirkland Lake, Ont.** The club has undertaken to erect a hospital home, and our carnival netted us \$3,118.00 for this building. A dental clinic was established. All poor children were given the opportunity to enjoy a vacation period at Culver Park.
- Kissimmee, Fla.** Our tuberculosis clinic made over 500 tests, and dental services were offered poor children free of charge. Eye examinations and minor operations on children were also available without cost to the poor.
- Klamath Falls, Ore.** Each school day approximately 200 children were supplied with milk. Medical and dental services, and clothing were secured for the homes of the poor.
- Lakeland, Fla.** Four children, who were not showing progress in their school work, were given physical examinations and supplied with glasses. Donations were made to the Salvation Army and the Children's Home Society of Florida. The club helped purchase an artificial leg for a boy.
- Lake View, Chicago.** Nourishing mid-day luncheons, cod liver oil, glasses and orthopedic appliances were purchased for indigent boys and girls. A manual training teacher started a shoe repair shop for the purpose of teaching the trade and also repairing the needy children's shoes without cost. Our club donated all the necessary equipment.
- Lancaster, Ohio.** Kiwanians bought school books, shoes and clothing, and had a fund with which to give medical attention to the children of the community. Twenty-nine children attended an under-privileged child's camp.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)—Cont.

- Lawrence, Kan. Over 150 worthy cases were found in our county after a survey, and there is every opportunity for relief and complete cure under the proper treatment. Our mental and nervous clinic had patients from many surrounding counties.
- Leesburg, Fla. Assisted in conducting a district welfare conference, helped to purchase clothing, food and milk for school children, and 26 children were given dental treatment.
- Lenoir, N. C. Monthly orthopedic clinics were conducted for both crippled children and adults. Our annual report revealed 156 cases, with 105 from our own county, which had received care. A donation was made for free luncheons for under-nourished children.
- Lincoln, Neb. Clothing, medical attention and hospitalization were made possible by the club being active in all kinds of welfare work.
- Lincoln Park, Chicago. Wives of Kiwanians helped to prepare noon-day luncheons for 200 children, and at our dispensary there were available all forms of medical service. We donated over \$1,700.00 for supplies for the Olivet clinic. Glasses and dental supplies were distributed free of charge. Over 300 boys and girls were sent to a summer camp, and we took all the children to a circus.
- Liverpool, N. S. Established a free clinic for children of poor families, and gave our support to the Children's Aid Society. Dental treatments were available free of charge, and milk was distributed.
- Logan, W. Va. Tooth brushes and paste were supplied under-privileged children in the country schools.
- Manassas, Va. During the year, 130 children were taken to a hospital for examination, and 125 received general corrective treatment.
- Matoaka, W. Va. Kiwanians are sponsoring a tuberculosis clinic, and needy boys and girls were supplied with clothing and school necessities.
- Medicine Hat, Alta. The club found a girl who had lost her eyesight. She was sent to the Canadian Institute for the Blind where she is being taught a trade. All children who were supplied with glasses in previous years were given re-examination and corrections. Orthopedic patients and others needing hospitalization were given the attention of our club.
- Midland, Ont. Dental treatment was given to 231 children, and glasses, orthopedic appliances and milk were supplied to all under-privileged in the schools.
- Midville, Ga. A young girl was sent to Augusta where she underwent four operations for cataract. She was able to return to school and continue her educational work.
- Milwaukee, Wis. In 1924 we began our under-privileged child work. The club has spent over \$10,000.00 for this welfare endeavor. During 1932 medical attention and orthopedic appliances were secured for all under-privileged school children.
- Monett, Mo. A survey was made of two counties, and 65 children, all of them crippled, were examined at our clinic. Hospitalization was paid for by the club. Kiwanians interviewed parents of these children to talk over their welfare and future obligations.
- Montreal, P. Q. An ambulance for crippled children was presented to the Province of Quebec Society for Crippled Children. Kiwanians assisted the Gyro Club at a fair and carnival to raise funds for purchasing an ambulance for the Children's Memorial Hospital. Donations were made to the Diocesan Camp Corporation, University Settlement of Montreal, Girls' Cottage Industrial School, and the Protestant Children's Home. Hundreds of children were taken on a picnic, and many attended a concert. Milk, food and clothing were distributed among needy families. Assistance to crippled and under-nourished children of the schools was given constantly.
- Mt. Airy, N. C. The club assisted in making it possible to serve 5,000 meals to children in the city schools. An orthopedic clinic was held each month.

- New Albany, Miss.** We are contributing a fund for the education of a blind boy, who is attending the University of Mississippi at Oxford. A free clinic for adenoid and tonsil operations was sponsored for poor children.
- New Britain, Conn.** Our club developed a shoe repairing department at the New Britain Boys' Club, and our membership is divided into two groups to work with these boys one evening each week repairing shoes for the needy school children.
- New Haven, Conn.** Ten children were placed in a tubercular preventorium. The club has constructed a wading pool at the cost of \$1,700.00, and other appropriations were made for general welfare work. Clothing and toys were distributed among poor families.
- New Liskeard, Ont.** Milk was provided during the entire year for children of needy families. Our fifth annual carnival gave us \$2,000.00 for welfare work. Twenty-two tonsil operations were performed free of charge by our doctors.
- Newport News, Va.** Our orthopedic clinic constantly gave aid to 25 or more patients during each month of the year. While it was started for indigent children, we have had a number of adult cases.
- Newport, Wash.** There were 990 school children examined for physical defects. Parents were notified of the desire of Kiwanians to help to have the boys and girls given medical aid.
- Newton Falls, Ohio.** A donation of clothing, shoes, cod liver oil, and the serving of thousands of meals for school children were some of the activities during 1932.
- Norfolk, Va.** The club had a budget of \$2,000.00 for making improvements and additions to a building owned by the Society of Prevention of Cruelty to Children. Purchases of beds, sheets, etc. were also made. A free bed was sponsored in the Victory Memorial Tubercular Hospital. Boys were sent to a summer camp, and a club fund was used to support a free clinic. Shoes and other necessities were supplied to needy boys and girls.
- North Adams, Mass.** The club arranged for a number of children's plays during the winter months, the proceeds being used for welfare work. An infantile paralysis clinic and the Kiwanis camp are two of our other excellent objectives.
- North St. Louis, Mo.** The club has made a donation to a mothers' and babies' home, which is a non-sectarian institution at Ferguson. Members also participated in the entertainment and programs held for the patients and youngsters at this home.
- Okeene, Okla.** School books and supplies were purchased for a number of needy children. One youngster, found in a rural district, was sent to a crippled children's hospital in Oklahoma City.
- Omaha, Neb.** We opened two shoe repair shops in the grade schools, where boys work to keep up with the demand made by the poor. Milk, ice, glasses and orthopedic appliances were secured through donations of the club.
- Orange-West Orange, N. J.** A lip-reading class for the deaf was organized for 12 pupils. Worthy boys and girls were sent to a summer camp, and free medical attention was available for the needy. The club paid \$250.00 for maintaining a free bed at an orthopedic hospital. Many Kiwanians are doing personal service work among boys and girls.
- Orlando, Fla.** The club sponsored and contributed toward the upkeep of a day nursery. Free medical examinations are available for high school students.
- Pembroke, Ont.** Over 300 patients received orthopedic and other medical assistance. An ice carnival, a baseball game and an amateur concert gave us additional funds to carry on our welfare work. Delegates were appointed to act as members of the Board of Directors of the Victorian Order of Nurses.
- Petersburg, Va.** There were over 1,800 patients treated at our clinic, and nearly 5,000 home visits were made by our nurse. Thirty children were sent to hospitals, and donations of milk, clothing, medicine and shoes were made during 1932. Our orthopedic surgeon gave his services free, and these amount to around \$20,000.00 a year.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)—Cont.

- Phoenix, Ariz. The club has completed a reorganization of what was known as the Arizona Society for Crippled Children. The directorate is composed of district officials of the leading service clubs in the state. More than 25 children were given orthopedic and general medical aid.
- Picton, Ont. One youngster was sent to a children's hospital in Toronto for observation and treatment, and several others were given free surgical attention. We paid the room and board for two boys from a rural district whose mother would otherwise have been unable to send them to school.
- Port Arthur-Fort William, Ont. Clothing, glasses, food and medical relief were made possible by Kiwanis help for worthy children whose parents could not afford this service.
- Portland, Me. Contributions were made to various children's institutions, and the Edward E. Philbrook Memorial Fund Committee cared for a contribution of \$2,200.00 for welfare work and winter aid. Children were taken to a circus, and at the time of the total eclipse there were 1,000 people who attended our lecture by Dr. George R. Lockwood. The proceeds were used for relief work.
- Princeton, Ky. Seventy-five children from six counties attended our clinic, and three of the most severe cases were sent to Louisville for aid by specialists.
- Pullman, Wash. Health examinations were made for all school children in the grades. Seventeen boys and girls were sent to a hospital for operations.
- Punta Gorda, Fla. After an investigation it was found that one child's school work was below normal due to defective eyesight. Examination was made and glasses purchased. A milk fund was provided for our schools.
- Quebec, P. Q. A campaign was started to fight an epidemic of infantile paralysis, and donations were made to buy medicine for the children's clinic at the Jeffrey Hale Hospital. Repairs were made at the fresh air camp, and motion picture shows and other entertainment were enjoyed by hundreds of orphans of the local institutions. Our annual frolics gave us a profit of \$1,200.00 for our work.
- Richmond, Calif. Purchased material so that members of the Social Service Bureau could provide garments for infants and other small children.
- Riverdale, Toronto, Ont. Repair work was completed at the East End Day Nursery playground, and a donation was made to Sunfish Camp, Bolton Camp and the Y. M. C. A. Children from the Hospital for Incurables were provided with entertainment and automobile rides. Shoes, clothing and medical attention were available for the needy.
- Roanoke, Va. An invalid chair, glasses, school luncheons, and a vacation for 40 worthy boys at a summer camp were all possible due to the club's interest in welfare work. A donation was made to the Society for Crippled Children.
- Rochester, N. H. The club purchased milk for all children in the public schools who were under-weight. Glasses, tonsil operations and the sending of children to a summer camp are other of our activities. We paid a tutor for instructing one child so that she could graduate with her own class.
- Sacramento, Calif. At a cost of \$1,400.00 numerous improvements were made at the Sunmount Preventorium, an institution for children who are susceptible to tuberculosis.
- St. Augustine, Fla. The club continues to operate a children's clinic, and a special nurse is keeping in touch with all under-privileged children in the schools. Coin jars were placed around the community for collections with which to buy shoes and clothing. All proceeds from the annual carnival were used to finance welfare work.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)—Cont.

- St. John, N. B.** Our main objective for 1932 was financial support for the St. John Day Nursery, which cared for over 650 children while the mothers were at work. A separate fund was maintained to give employment to mothers who have no other means of support. The nursery supplied hot mid-day meals to children attending school, and a separate depot had a daily attendance of over 100 under-privileged children whose parents were out of employment. Over 3,000 meals were served each month to school children. Our annual radio auction gave us \$1,800.00 for this work.
- St. Lawrence, Montreal, P. Q.** The Julius Richardson Hospital for Convalescent Children was given a piano. Music and handicraft work are taught the children. Wives of Kiwanians gave funds to purchase playground equipment. Cod liver oil was given to the Family Welfare Association for all under-nourished and ailing children. School books, clothing, institutional necessities and milk were available throughout 1932. Children were sent to health camps and given various entertainments.
- San Diego, Calif.** The club took out a membership in the State Society for Crippled Children, and excellent rehabilitation work was undertaken for several boys and girls. One of our chief objectives was to aid the Helping Hand Home for Children. Blankets, bedding, cooking utensils and other equipment were purchased for the institution.
- Sanger, Calif.** Two girls were sent to a tubercular sanitarium for treatment. Another youngster has returned from the Shriners' Hospital in San Francisco. Milk was provided under-nourished children, and the club agreed to furnish the necessary funds to provide lights at a playground.
- Santa Monica, Calif.** The club presented the McKinley Home for Boys with a new wood-working machine. At a cost of \$2,700.00 a site for a new day nursery was purchased.
- Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.** A clinic has been organized and is open on the first and third Saturday of each month for free examinations of all under-privileged children. The club pays the hospital fee in cases where parents cannot do so. Over 2,000 children took part in an annual Hallowe'en frolic and parade. Our financial drive for a Children's Home went over the top with a total of \$3,064.45 collected.
- Seattle, Wash.** For the third successive school year the Kiwanis dental clinic was opened for poor and unfortunate children. Several hundred parents asked for aid at the clinic for their children. There were 7,000 school children who needed clothing and garments so that they could attend school. All Kiwanis clubs in the Seattle metropolitan district aided in securing the necessary clothing.
- Sedalia, Mo.** Clothing, shoes, milk, glasses, books and other school supplies were furnished the school children who were in need. All members assisted in transportation work during a crippled children's clinic held at Bothwell Memorial Hospital.
- Sioux City, Iowa.** Free hospitalization and treatments are furnished in the Kiwanis ward at the Methodist Hospital. Roses are distributed on Sunday among all children in the hospital.
- South Bend, Ind.** Our work continues in the special sunshine room for crippled children at the Lincoln School. A nurse is engaged by the club to carry on physical therapy.
- Stockton, Calif.** The club maintains a sunshine school for all under-nourished children, and we made a contribution to the Parent-Teachers' Association and the Piney Hill School for Colored Boys.
- Tacoma, Wash.** For several years the Kiwanis clinic has been conducted at the Tacoma General Hospital, and every Thursday morning children who need attention are admitted. The club buys braces, wheel chairs, clothing, milk and cod liver oil for the youngsters. A free bed has also been endowed at the Seattle Orthopedic Hospital, and contributions are made to the Tacoma General Hospital for orthopedic services.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)—Cont.

- Terre Haute, Ind.** Over \$1,500.00, realized from a minstrel show, paid the expenses of a tonsil and adenoid clinic. Over 150 children received operations, and the cost of this would have been in excess of \$9,000.00. The club has an orthopedic ward in a hospital.
- Titusville, Pa.** Purchased school books and clothing for needy children, and provided funds for the high school cafeteria. There were 322 tonsil operations.
- Towson, Md.** Individual families were given help. Free dental work was provided for wards of the county Children's Aid Society, and shoes, clothing, glasses and home instruction were available for a number of others. Free hospitalization was secured for one girl.
- University Circle, Cleveland, Ohio.** Furnished playground equipment for the Rosemary Home. Individual children were also given our assistance. Clothing was distributed among needy families.
- Ventura, Calif.** Provided free milk to under-nourished children. The fifth annual pet show and parade secured funds for this endeavor.
- Washington, D. C.** At the Kiwanis clinic in the children's hospital over 80 new cases were handled each month of the year, and the staff nurse made several hundred home visits each month. The club's newest activity is the organization of the St. Johns boys' club. Mothers and children were taken to Camp Good Will for outings and entertainments.
- Waupun, Wis.** A city-wide clinic for all school children was opened in January. It was felt that such a clinic was necessary because there was not enough health service in the city schools. The work is conducted in co-operation with physicians, dentists and county nurses. The club is at present concerned with the work being done for relief among the poor.
- Weatherford, Okla.** Sixty-five children, all of pre-school age, were given physical examinations and a general immunization against diphtheria was carried out in the schools. Glasses and clothing were furnished unfortunate youngsters.
- Wellsville, Ohio.** During May the nurse employed by the club secured the names of all children of pre-school age so that they might attend the school clinic. Assistance in this work was given by the Parent-Teachers' Association. Sixty children were examined, and a number, suffering from infantile paralysis and other defects, were secured orthopedic appliances, and given other attention.
- West Palm Beach, Fla.** The club operates three clinics medical and surgical; eye, ear, nose and throat; and a dental clinic. A total number of cases in the first clinic was 774, with a total expenditure of \$3,302.14. The eye, ear, nose and throat clinic gave attention to 1,269 cases with an expenditure of \$1,671.30. In the dental clinic there were 2,642 finished cases with a total expenditure of \$6,182.13. A county nurse made 1,191 home visits, 269 school visits and held over 1,000 health conferences. There were treatments and antitoxin administered for hook worm, diphtheria and smallpox cases. An emergency ward is maintained for all accident cases of school children. In all this work colored youngsters are also given adequate care. We put on our seventh annual under-privileged child benefit show, and realized about \$6,500.00 for all our service and welfare endeavors.
- Willoughby, Ohio.** A bequest of \$5,000.00 was made for crippled children's work, and this fund will be distributed through Kiwanis channels for administering the service. Free meals and dental services were available during 1932.
- Winnipeg, Man.** Sent boys and girls to a summer camp, appropriated \$1,000.00 for a clothing fund, collected 500 school books for needy children, provided piano lessons for a blind girl and gave \$400.00 for a hospital shelter at a Salvation Army camp. The club also gave \$100.00 for camp libraries and provided entertainments for orphans.
- Woodbury, N. J.** Shoes, glasses and orthopedic braces, milk for needy families and dental care for children was our under-privileged child service during 1932. The third annual minstrel show gave us funds for this work.

Ypsilanti, Mich. Shoes, clothing, milk and school luncheons as well as dental services were available for the children in our community. The club gave \$100.00 for under-privileged child work at the University Hospital at Ann Arbor.

The following clubs, while offering various forms of service to the under-privileged, were engaged in securing surgical treatment and hospital care for children, organizing eye, ear, nose, throat, dental and orthopedic clinics and purchasing equipment for hospitals and schools for crippled and sub-normal children:

Health Centers, Children's Hospitals, Day Nurseries and Camps

Altoona, Pa. Fifty-one youths were sent to our health farm during the summer. There was a maximum gain of eight pounds per child. The total cost of operation was \$1,534.00. We dedicated a bronze plaque at the entrance of the farm in memory of a deceased past president. The Quota club also had the privilege of using the farm for 25 under-nourished girls.

Battle Creek, Mich. Sent seven children to a camp and provided thousands of bottles of milk for the grade schools. A donation was made to the Ann Arbor club for work with under-privileged children at the University Hospital.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)—Cont.

- Bozeman, Mont.** All repairs at a children's camp were completed by Kiwanians and the club sent a representative to the Child Health and Protection Council so that we could aid in the national movement for conservation of child health.
- Brantford, Ont.** Our camp is in charge of a camp mother and three assistants, and during the season 160 little girls were given a vacation. Our funds for this work were secured through public entertainment features.
- Cambridge, Mass.** Forty under-nourished and tubercular girls were given a supervised vacation at our sunshine camp.
- Conneaut, Ohio.** We continue to cooperate with the Ashtabula and Geneva clubs in preparing the annual summer fresh air camp, which includes a free clinic and other service.
- Conway, S. C.** The club has developed a nutritional camp for the under-privileged.
- Denton, Tex.** Over \$3,000.00 has been spent in the last six years for our annual camp, which during 1932 accommodated 52 boys. College teachers and business men gave the youths instructions in woodcraft, forest fire prevention, plant life, swimming and hunting. Over 150 children have also been given aid to remedy their physical defects.
- Detroit, Mich.** Starting on June 25 our camp was opened for 201 little girls.
- Flint, Mich.** Our camp for tubercular children was opened on June 23 with the first contingent of 50 children. A wading pool, rock garden, steel flag pole, refrigerator and other necessities were supplied during the year. We furnished entertainment for the children of the Whaley Memorial Home.
- Hastings, Neb.** At our camp the boys were under the supervision of an instructor who taught camp life, educational programs and recreational sports.
- Hoboken, N. J.** Our Under-Privileged Child Committee placed 14 children in a tuberculosis camp and 23 others in various health camps. A donation of several hundred dollars was made to a tubercular clinic and a day nursery.
- Jersey City, N. J.** We secured about \$3,000.00 from our annual follies show and this was used for summer camp and other activities. One hundred boys had a month's vacation at a camp and there was an average gain of three and one-half pounds per boy.
- Kalamazoo, Mich.** At the Pretty Lake vacation camp 500 boys and girls, between the ages of 5 and 12 years, were given a two-week's outing. Approximately \$7,000.00 was needed for meeting the expenses of this camp. The addition of 100 acres of land has given the camp considerable more shore-line and privacy. We gave \$300.00 for a shoe and rubber fund for poor youngsters.
- Kitchener-Waterloo, Ont.** During July and August between 600 and 700 boys and girls vacationed at Paradise Lake camp.
- Lethbridge, Alta.** Twenty-five mothers and their young children were our guests at the camp at Watertown Lakes. Doctors of our club gave their professional services free to youngsters.
- Lewistown, Mont.** Our health camp is under the supervision of trained executives. Reservations from all parts of the state are given the club's attention. Two hundred trees were planted and other repairs were made by Kiwanians at the camp.
- Little Rock, Ark.** One hundred boys spent a vacation at the Joseph Pfiefer Kiwanis Boys' camp, which is an 80-acre plot purchased in 1929. Two large swimming holes were constructed so that the boys could learn to swim. A thousand dollars was used for the summer camp activity in 1932.
- Lowell, Mass.** Purchased and donated an automobile truck for our health camp which runs for eight weeks with a capacity of 40 children. Our annual costume ball gave us \$1,300.00 for welfare activities.
- Manchester, Conn.** We gave 100 boys and girls a two-weeks vacation at our camp. There was a net gain in weight of four pounds per child. The expenditure for the summer was about \$1,100.00.
- Newark, Ohio.** Our children's health camp was conducted for ten weeks for 50 youngsters.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)—Cont.

- New Westminster, B. C.** All members worked to clear the playgrounds and lawns at the Children's Provincial Orphanage. During the year programs of entertainment are arranged for children.
- Peterborough, Ont.** For a period of eight weeks 205 children attended our health camp, which was conducted at the cost of over \$1,000.00. A clinic was established for the purpose of follow-up work for the children who attended the camp. Glasses, shoes and other necessities were supplied to the poor.
- Pittsfield, Mass.** Fifty-one girls, the most needy in the community, were accommodated at our health camp for seven weeks. A home talent entertainment and the annual flower day gave us funds for this work.
- Portsmouth, Va.** Our fresh air farm was opened on July 1. One hundred and thirty-three children were given physical examinations, but only 100 were admitted. The other 33, because of their physical condition, had to undergo treatment before going to camp. Nurses made nearly 500 home visits and there were a series of minor operations on these children. The average gain in weight per child at the camp was four and one-quarter pounds.
- Poughkeepsie, N. Y.** Twenty-four boys were sent to the Hopeland camp.
- Rock Hill, S. C.** We have established a camp for under-privileged children. During the summer alternate groups of boys and girls are given a two weeks vacation. The camp is located on a river and a large six room house accommodates the youngsters. Special supervision is under the direction of a camp instructor and a teacher. A milk fund for the schools was established.
- St. Paul, Minn.** The Kiwanis camp was opened June 20 with 63 boys ready for a 10-day vacation period. Graduate dieticians are in charge of the food and the children gained astonishingly. Over 400 children are accommodated each year and all are given thorough medical examinations. A new cabin is to be built at this camp. Children from a preventorium were taken to a circus.
- Sarasota, Fla.** At a cost of \$6,000.00 the club has established a large camp for the Boy Scouts, the Girl Scouts and all under-privileged children. Clinics were held to find the most needy children so that they could receive medical and dental care and be sent to camp.
- Schenectady, N. Y.** With our Crippled Children's Hospital, which was our chief objective, well underway, our relief work has been directed toward the Kiwanis Health Farm. Forty boys and girls were sent to the farm during the summer. Our seventh annual Kiwanis Kapers held in April gave us \$1,000.00 for our service fund. The wives of Kiwanians were very active in assisting the children during their stay at the farm. Our crippled children's hospital, Sunnyview, which is a rehabilitation home for children, is administering a great deal of aid throughout each year.
- Shelton, Conn.** Children who had contracted tuberculosis were sent to a health farm. A contribution was made to purchase clothing and food for poor children.
- Spokane, Wash.** Sixty-one boys and girls, children of our Pensioned Mothers, attended our health camp during the summer. The average gain in weight was 9.6 pounds per child. The Kiwanis Health Center is operated for children needing medical attention and dental care. A merry-go-round was contributed by one of our members and another Kiwanian also donated playground equipment. A \$400.00 refrigeration system was installed at the camp through the courtesy of a third member and the club purchased a player piano in June. A booth was maintained during the Spokane jamboree and other forms of entertainment also gave us money for our endeavors.
- Springfield, Mass.** The club voted an appropriation of \$1,137.95 for sending 100 boys to the Y. M. C. A. camp. A contribution was made to the St. John's church for sending colored youngsters to a camp. Physical examinations were made of the boys and clinical cards are being kept on all the individual cases. Clothing and other necessities were supplied to each youth. In December 438 boys and girls were given shoes and rubbers.

THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILD (Physical)—Cont.

Strathmoor, Detroit, Mich. The club sent 65 children to the Kiwanis cottage at a Salvation Army camp. Needy children were given shoes, rubbers, milk and clothing.

Tiffin, Ohio. There were more than 600 hobby exhibits and 30 industrial displays at our annual exposition. Over 2,500 people were in attendance. The net profit of \$200.00 was used for our summer camp, where 50 boys and girls enjoyed vacations.

Windsor, Ont. In June we purchased a permanent camp site at Ambassador Beach on Lake Erie. A cottage was completed to accommodate 40 children. The actual cost of the property and buildings was over \$3,300.00. There were 152 girls who were given a vacation at the camp this year. Over \$1,000.00 was placed in our child welfare fund for relief work.

DEVELOPMENT OF BETTER TOWN AND COUNTRY RELATIONS

Kiwanis strives "To promote the spirit of mutual understanding between the farmer and the city man by encouraging an appreciation of their common aims and purposes." The accomplishments in furthering the development of better town and country relations, during 1932, shows varied activities of real value. The results for the past year were as follows:

General

- Abbeville, Ala.** Registered Duroc Jersey gilts were purchased for young farm youths. Prizes were awarded for the best litters. Entertained 56 boys who entered the pig raising contest. Kiwanians made visits into the rural communities and were in charge of interesting programs and agricultural discussions.
- Aberdeen, N. C.** Our Committee on Agriculture is interested in establishing a Grange group for the farmers of the community.
- Aberdeen, S. D.** A contest with cash prizes, open to all farmers, was conducted with the hope of developing, improving and beautifying rural landscape. The 4-H clubs, which have been instrumental in raising 5,000 head of live-stock with a profit of \$9,000.00, the making of 350 garments and the canning of 5,000 jars of fruit are all activities which have received Kiwanis commendation.
- Ann Arbor, Mich.** A series of agricultural meetings were held to discuss such topics as taxes, cooperative marketing and landscaping. The club was in charge of the recreational program for children at the opening day of the county fair. An achievement banquet was held for 4-H club members.
- Anniston, Ala.** Kiwanians sponsored the work of planting winter legumes.
- Arcadia, Fla.** Our main interest was to secure an agricultural course for the high school. We had 5,000 people at our annual farmers' picnic. The club is interested in having farmers attend the weekly meetings.
- Athens, Tex.** Kiwanis was responsible for mailing to farmers price lists on all local produce. A better seed program was also encouraged among farm boys and an effort was made to send boys to the Texas State Fair to see the produce exhibits.
- Atlanta, Ga.** Kiwanians are interested in general farm relief and in a market where farmers may dispose of their vegetables and other produce. The 4-H club boys were sent on a five-day encampment.
- Augusta, Ga.** Our major activity was a program to raise cotton and corn, and \$1,000.00 was offered in prizes for the best yields. This is to promote better and more profitable farming. Some 60 contestants were enrolled. Good-will trips were made into adjoining communities.
- Baraboo, Wis.** A farmers' institute was attended by 2,125 and we participated in a farm festival.
- Baxley, Ga.** We endeavored to secure free grain seeds from the government and were instrumental in developing a curb market. Kiwanians purchased pigs for a farm boys' club.
- Boonville, Mo.** Farmers were given 1,150 young chicks and it is hoped that flock owners will be interested in disposing of scrub stock for blooded strains. All farmers of three counties were guests at a meeting held in the early part of the year.
- Boscobel, Wis.** Agricultural agents and speakers from the University's agricultural school were program headliners for our farmers' day program, which was attended by 360 rural residents.
- Bowling Green, Ohio.** Sponsored a county corn husking contest and the club invites officers of all farm organizations to attend special programs.
- Cambridge, Ohio.** Our main activity was the promotion of good-will meetings in rural towns. Kiwanians were elected to offices in the Farm Bureau.
- Canajoharie, N. Y.** Each Friday afternoon the farmers' market is open. Thirty-two 4-H club members in the county were our guests in October.

- Carrington, N. D.** A corn demonstration and a discussion of better seed crops gave the rural residents some idea of the club's interest in urban-rural relations work. Visits were made to rural communities for a series of meetings. The club urged the development of a trench silo.
- Chattanooga, Tenn.** We again sponsored the 4-H club fair with about 300 boys participating in the stock and produce exhibits. There were 450 prizes awarded.
- Chehalis, Wash.** Kiwanis took part in the farmers' and merchants' picnic. Supplied judges for a music and declamation contest held by the Grange. Loaned funds to the 4-H clubs so members might attend a live-stock show at Portland. Purchased achievement pins for the 4-H club winners and entertained the rural people at a farm program.
- Clanton, Ala.** Held a cattle show, took 70 farmers to an agricultural experimental station, planned a 4-H club rally and held one meeting to bring all the business men and farmers together for a social occasion.
- Clatskanie, Ore.** The club again was responsible for farm products displays in all store windows. Attended the meeting of the Oregon State Dairy Association and held a banquet for its members. The Committee on Publicity arranged for a series of articles on dairy lands which appeared in the Oregon Journal.
- Copperhill, Tenn.** A five-year program was developed by the club. It hopes to change this industrial community into a part agricultural area. Several successful urban-rural meetings were held.
- Cornelia, Ga.** A strong appeal was made to the federal government so that an experimental station would not be removed from this district. Boy winners in the state seed corn selection contest were our guests.
- Coshocton, Ohio.** We had 400 in attendance at our rural meeting and 200 heard a discussion by an economist and tax expert. Trophy cups were presented to winners in the agricultural department of the high school.
- Cuero, Tex.** An effort is being made to develop an interest in the poultry industry and we sponsored a turkey demonstration farm. One program was given over to the discussion of the advantages of government seed loans.
- Cullman, Ala.** Planned a county-wide picnic with the purpose of increasing an interest among farmers for planting winter cover crops. There were 1,500 in attendance. Held a stock judging contest and several agricultural meetings.
- Decatur, Ala.** Organized a strawberry growers' association with 35 farmers signing up for acreage. Also encouraged the growing of more corn with 1,000 acres pledged for a start. The Committee on Agriculture with the Chamber of Commerce and both banks have taken up the study of the farm program that has proven so successful in South Georgia. A ten-year agricultural program has been placed into action.
- Delhi, N. Y.** Conducted an open forum for a free discussion of prevalent distressing conditions in agriculture. Our farm meetings were well attended.
- Edmonton, Alta.** Distributed over 6,000 magazines among farm families.
- Endicott, N. Y.** Held an agricultural exhibit for the rural schools with 300 in attendance.
- Enfield, N. C.** Sponsored a campaign to have farmers plant more food crops and organized a canning demonstration.
- Florence, Ala.** Over 2,000 attended a big rally and we took 78 farmers on a pilgrimage to a state experimental station and demonstration farm. Held rural meetings and entertained winners of 4-H club projects.
- Forest City, N. C.** Our farm program consists of growing sufficient supplies for local needs with special attention given to the all-year-round gardens and orchards. Farmers are urged to plant more clover, soy beans and other legume crops and to standardize on community products. We are also interested in an increase in all live-stock, the use of certified seed, cooperative buying and marketing and the absolute encouragement of cooperation among all groups. In January, a poultry school was held and the club participated in a number of farm picnics and meetings.

- Greenfield, Ind.** Kiwanis was responsible for the development of a farm short course and during the year we entertained farmers and 4-H club boys and girls.
- Hominy, Okla.** At a farmers' meeting each Kiwanian was assigned one rural resident so that assistance could be given him in keeping a farm business record. Grass seed was purchased for a test to find which kind was best suited for this section.
- Hope, Ark.** Nine farm villages in the county and trade territory were visited, and over 2,500 people attended our entertainments. Talks were given on citizenship and farming. There were 1,500 farmers entertained at an experimental station.
- Jellico, Tenn.** With the help of a newspaper the club circulated helpful information concerning tobacco raising. A mass meeting was held for farmers seeking agricultural information and instruction.
- Jesup, Ga.** The club is interested in developing the poultry industry in the county and in the teaching of truck farming. Kiwanians also planned for a canning factory for truck growers. Good-will meetings were held in rural communities.
- Joplin, Mo.** An active campaign was started to secure the services of a county agricultural agent. There were large group representations at our good-will meetings.
- Lambertville, N. J.** Following a farm meeting, the club became interested in acquainting farmers with the actual costs for distributing their products.
- Lenoir, N. C.** We held monthly auction sales for farm products and a special committee appeared before the county commissioners so that the offices of the farm and home demonstrators would be continued. Prizes were awarded to 4-H club winners. Meetings were held in the rural areas.
- Live Oak, Fla.** A special committee secured subscriptions for farmers who were unable to finance themselves and it was later possible to get \$5,400.00 for purchasing seeds and fertilizer. In November a committee was appointed to finance all tobacco farmers. The county agent, who is a Kiwanian, organized a cooperative plan for community farming.
- Madison, Ga.** Assisted needy farmers with farm loans and secured various kinds of stock for them. Farm boys were sent to the agricultural college for a short course. A lot of good fellowship work was accomplished throughout the county.
- Madisonville, Ky.** Representatives appeared before the fiscal court for continuing the farm bureau and home economics departments. At our tobacco show \$300.00 was distributed in prizes.
- Manchester, Ga.** We are sponsoring a back-to-the-farm movement.
- Marietta, Ga.** Twenty-four farm bulletin boards have been placed in the county area. These are used to list trade and exchange items. Any time a farmer wishes to sell, buy or exchange the information is placed on one of these boards for two weeks. Farm boys are still interested in pig raising projects.
- Marshall, Tex.** Assisted the Chamber of Commerce in a food and feed campaign so that farmers could be encouraged in raising more produce. Help was given in establishing a seed loan office and the club made rural visits and gave assistance for 4-H club work.
- Medford, Ore.** Kiwanians helped in attempting to secure a quarter of a million dollars for an agricultural finance corporation, with the money to be used for the fruit industry.
- Melbourne, Fla.** Seventy-five farmers were present at our home products luncheon.
- Metter, Ga.** Entertained 4-H club boys and girls of the county. We continue to be interested in a better farming campaign.
- Middlesboro, Ky.** The emergency garden proposition was explained to all residents and the Committee on Agriculture planned a trip into Tennessee to inspect the berry crops and to get information as to the handling and marketing of farm products. Four-H club boys and girls were urged to plant a large strawberry crop.

- Morrilton, Ark.** Planned a county-wide program which urged the planting of a garden and the keeping of chickens, pigs and cows on every farm. Encouraged Smith-Hughes activities and offered prizes for this work.
- Newark, Ohio.** Over 20,000 people attended our corn husking contest and farm machinery demonstration.
- New Westminster, B. C.** Assisted boys and girls in the sheep and live-stock industry. The club is proud to have a young lady from this community on the stock judging team representing British Columbia at the Royal Agricultural Exposition in Toronto.
- North Wilkesboro, N. C.** Two thousand farmers attended rally day at the county fair. The club is interested in the dairy and cheese industry for this community and 13 prizes were awarded in a better farming contest.
- Ontario, Ore.** We cooperated with farmers in a campaign for utilizing more dairy products. Kiwanians furnished the entertainment for a Grange program.
- Ottawa, Ont.** We entertained 350 farm boys and girls at the opening day of the Central Canada Exhibition.
- Parker, S. D.** Assisted in a campaign to raise funds for purchasing live-stock.
- Pe Ell, Wash.** Kiwanians are interested in furthering agricultural development, sheep raising, 4-H garden work and Grange activities.
- Pharr, Tex.** The business men declared a holiday and all went among the citrus fruit growers so they would join a cooperative marketing association. We also urged the spraying of all fruit trees with material supplied by the federal government for eradicating the morelos fly.
- Pineville, Ky.** Information was made available for farmers so that they could purchase seeds at reasonable prices and held a home-farm night. Provided jars for a 4-H canning project, boosted for the county fair, held rural group meetings and urged increased hog production.
- Plant City, Fla.** Our club secretary was appointed secretary for the Florida strawberry festival which the club took over as its main agricultural objective.
- Platteville, Wis.** Aided the State Teachers' College in holding a short course for farmers and entertained members of the Southwestern Wisconsin Breeders' Association.
- Plymouth, Wis.** Held a 4-H club soil testing demonstration, sponsored a farmers' institute and donated funds for prizes for a 4-H club achievement day.
- Pocatello, Idaho.** Arranged for a meeting to discuss agricultural problems and the work of the Idaho Grange. One meeting was given over to plans for the state seed show.
- Princeton, Ky.** Helped to organize a dark tobacco pool.
- Providence, Ky.** Many weeks were given over to cooperating with the tobacco growers for the establishment of a receiving station.
- Reynoldsville, Pa.** Held our third annual farm tour, and arranged for farmers of the township to get first hand information on proper grading, packing, marketing and price advantages. Farm boys and girls were given prizes for their potato club.
- Ridgway, Pa.** A farm tour was made which included all the important dairies in our county. Inspection was made of equipment, cattle, grain and other farm products. The business men and bankers also made a tour of the farms.
- Rock Rapids, Iowa.** A farmer and business men's institute was held in October.
- Roseburg, Ore.** We sponsored the annual Kiwanis-Grange picnic with 400 in attendance. Throughout the year our country meetings were attended by many urban and rural people.

- Scottsbluff, Neb.** Promoted a demonstration of canning peas so that farmers would be interested in the development of a canning factory.

We made contributions to the 4-H club for scholarships and the sending of a girl to Chicago for the 4-H national conference. The annual achievement meeting of the 4-H club was held under the direction of the Kiwanis club.
- Springville, Utah.** Farm meetings were held to interest increased growing of worth-while marketing crops which would bring cash returns.
- Storm Lake, Iowa.** A car-load of grain and money was sent to farmers of South Dakota so that live-stock could be saved.
- Thomas, Okla.** Programs were held in rural schools to increase good-fellowship and also enlarge the trading area of this community.
- Traverse City, Mich.** A Kiwanis float was placed in the national cherry festival parade.
- Tryon, N. C.** Free educational movies were available for rural residents and the club spent \$110.00 for purchasing pigs for 4-H club members.
- Wagoner, Okla.** Over \$1,200.00 worth of stock was sold at a sales day which was organized for farmers.

There were cash rewards for this fair. Marion Sears, who was sent to the state leadership camp, was awarded a scholarship at Purdue University for completing 30 projects in 4-H club work. Presented a pennant to the winning team in the 4-H boys' baseball contest.
- Antigo, Wis.** We had 650 young men and women at our annual 4-H club achievement day.
- Astoria, Ore.** To give employment to boys and girls during the summer, we organized clubs for city gardening work. A prize was given for the best garden in town. All members of the 4-H club were guests at one of our meetings.

- Auburn, Neb.** Since there is no county agent, Kiwanis has been sponsoring 4-H club work for several years. Throughout the county we have calf, pig, sewing and canning projects. All farm leaders were guests at one of our meetings. One meeting was held in a rural district.
- Auburn, N. Y.** Kiwanians were hosts to 300 county 4-H club members and the entire day's program was taken up with achievement awards and other interesting features. Thirty-seven farmers attended our annual urban-rural get-together meeting.
- Baltimore, Md.** Kiwanians aided every one of the 4-H clubs in the county and Kiwanis Day was observed at the live-stock show.
- Batesville, Ark.** Our club furnished 18 brood sows to the junior farmers in this vicinity. One meeting was held in the rural area and all proceeds were used to help purchase a steam pressure canner.
- Bend, Ore.** Sent one 4-H club boy to school at Oregon State College. The club helped promote a county fair and sponsored all forms of 4-H club work.
- Birmingham, Ala.** Over 1,000 boys and girls attended our annual 4-H club rally, and donations were made to carry on farm projects and a cotton exhibit.
- Bluffton, Ind.** Four delegates were sent to the junior leadership training camp, and we assisted the county agent in putting on a corn husking contest.
- Bremen, Ind.** An agricultural exhibit, including grains, potatoes, fruit, sewing and cooking projects, was held for the farm boys and girls. - Galveston, Tex.** Sent a boy and a girl to attend a short course at College Station, Texas. One meeting was held in the farm district with over 100 in attendance.
- Glens Falls, N. Y.** There were 183 boys and girls enrolled in our potato project, and we had over 80 exhibits which excelled those of other years.
- Grinnell, Iowa.** The 4-H club fair with 209 entries and over \$700.00 in prizes was held in August. All winners were entertained at a meeting.
- Hartford City, Ind.** Sponsored a corn contest and later a husking bee. Forty youths exhibited the 60 best ears of corn raised in this vicinity. A farm banquet was held in March, and we were entertained later in the year by the farm bureau.
- Huntsville, Ala.** We assisted in a 4-H club rally which was attended by over 1,000 needy boys and girls. Our major agricultural objectives were concerned with everyone having thorough information about the agriculture college, the knowledge of marketing of farm products, and the necessity of 4-H boys' and girls' projects.
- Independence, Mo.** With the County Farm Bureau, we sponsored a 4-H club show and all winners were entered at the state fair in Sedalia and the American Royal Live-Stock Exposition in Kansas City.
- Indiana Kiwanis District.** The junior leadership training course, sponsored by the Indiana Kiwanis District, was held June 6 to 10 at Shakamak Park with an enrollment of 336 boys and girls from all parts of the state. All food was turned over to the city relief organizations for distribution among the poor. Tested seed corn was given to farm boys and we enjoyed a picnic supper served by the ladies of a near-by rural community.
- Logansport, Ind.** Participated in the promotion of all 4-H club activities and sent four farm youths to the leadership training camp.
- Malone, N. Y.** Fifty-five boys and girls attended one of our luncheons. Each Kiwanian was assigned to one or more of these youngsters with the hope of encouraging them in their endeavors. An interest was taken in the county fair and practically one-half of all the 4-H club members had exhibits and were counted among the prize winners. At no time did a 4-H club member have produce for which there was not a ready market.
- Manitowoc, Wis.** Four hundred 4-H members and their leaders in this county were entertained by Kiwanis. Our club has been the pioneer in urban-rural get-togethers, the first meeting having been held eight years ago. Kiwanians were in charge of the annual 4-H club banquet and achievement meeting with 350 in attendance. Farmers were organized for dairy and grain projects and we gave our support to a successful county fair.
- Memphis, Tenn.** Financial aid was given so that seven members of the 4-H club could secure Jersey calves. The boys are required to keep a record of their projects and all profits will be applied to the purchase price of their stock.
- Miami, Fla.** The Committee on Agriculture continued its supervision over the agricultural class in high school. The work consists of financing practical farm projects. A survey was made to reveal the value of agriculture, horticulture and animal husbandry in the county.

- Milwaukee, Wis.** Kiwanis trophies were awarded to the winners in the agricultural, horticultural and home economics contests held in connection with the mid-winter fair. Eight leaders in 4-H county club work were awarded scholarships for a short course at the University of Wisconsin. One hundred farmers were guests at our annual good fellowship meeting.
- Modesto, Calif.** A prize of \$100.00, which is a scholarship award, was given to the 4-H club member showing the best results in school work. Made it possible for 50 youths to go to Davis, California. Kiwanians were in attendance at a farm picnic and all farm bureau members were guests at one of our meetings.
- Mt. Airy, N. C.** Farm boys were given 21 thorough-bred brood sows and we hope this will improve the quality of hogs raised for market. Through the efforts of the club, 125,000 pounds of Lespedeza seed were sown in the county, and we continue to stress the value of raising legumes for soil improvement and the necessity of diversifying crops.
- New Richmond, Wis.** The 4-H club fair for the county, in which over 400 boys and girls had exhibits, was the enterprise of the Kiwanis club.
- Newton, N. C.** Our main work is the sponsoring of all 4-H club projects in the county. Adequate prizes and rewards are given for the winners in all the projects.
- Ogden, Utah.** The Committee on Agriculture is sponsoring a forestry club among the boys, and all members of the Future Farmers of America are encouraged in their projects. Cash prizes were awarded 35 agricultural students.
- Peru, Neb.** Our activities are concerned with 4-H club garden, pig, sewing, and other projects.
- Philippi, W. Va.** Assisted the 4-H club in gathering magazines for country distribution. A series of rural meetings were held throughout the summer and early fall months.
- Plymouth, Ind.** Six 4-H club boys were sent to the state leadership training school.
- Portland, Ore.** Transportation was furnished for 150 boys so they could go to the Mount Hood National Forest and join the 4-H club groups. Arranged so a Kiwanian could take part in the State Grange Convention program. We entertained all the 4-H club winners of the Pacific International Live-Stock Exposition and also arranged so the three winning 4-H girls from Oregon could be entertained by Chicagoans during the National Stock Exposition.
- Reedsburg, Wis.** Sponsored a seed judging contest, and had farmers given the latest information on fodder and crops. Entertainment was provided for 4-H club members and their families.
- Regina, Sask.** Fifty-eight boys entered our seed grain contest.
- Ryan, Okla.** Our main endeavor is to encourage diversified farming. Members of the 4-H club were given ten registered pigs. A minstrel show toured the rural districts and gave free entertainments.
- Shawnee, Okla.** The pig project continues to be a worthy enterprise. Starting with five pure-blooded pigs, there have now been 115 of these animals distributed in the interest of pure-bred production. We shall urge something similar with calves and chickens in the future.
- Spartanburg, S. C.** Four thousand high grade baby chicks were selected for 4-H club boys. All boys who won diplomas at Clemson College were our guests.
- Syracuse, N. Y.** Our sixth annual achievement day for the 4-H club was held at Syracuse University with 400 farm boys and girls in attendance. Championship medals were awarded to the individuals with the winning projects.
- Tillamook, Ore.** The club is considering building a 4-H dormitory at the fair grounds. Achievement pins were awarded to all winners in the 4-H club projects. All children of the county were entertained at fair time.

Tuscumbia, Ala. Entertained all the 4-H club boys and girls of the county at a barbecue and picture show, and food was served to 850 youths and over 150 of their parents. State 4-H club winners were entertained at one of our meetings.

VOCATIONAL GUIDANCE

Vocational guidance was added during the convention year of 1925-26 by Kiwanis as an International Objective. Listed here are a few of the undertakings for 1932:

- Ann Arbor, Mich.** Thirty Kiwanians and others spoke to groups of pupils on vocational endeavors. Vocational guidance reports were prepared by these young people.
- Beaver Dam, Wis.** Unemployed boys were urged to attend the vocational school to secure instructions in the various trades.
- Berkeley, Calif.** A new vocational guidance bulletin was completed and distributed among the schools.
- Boonville, Mo.** The Committee on Vocational Guidance has prepared 6,000 pages of vocational guidance material and had it distributed among 700 students. This work has been going on by the club since 1927 and has the cooperation of the school faculty, professional men and all of the parents.
- Bowling Green, Ohio.** A series of vocational guidance conferences under the direction of a skilled counselor was held in 1932.
- Butte, Mont.** Our first annual city-wide vocational guidance conference was attended by 1,000 boys.
- Chattanooga, Tenn.** Personal conferences were arranged for all seniors and a banquet, attended by leading business and professional men, gave the opportunity for conferences for 400 boys.
- Chehalis, Wash.** Thirty of our members are constantly presenting the business and professional opportunities of their own vocations to the youngsters in our schools.
- Decatur, Ill.** The Committee on Vocational Guidance broadcasts weekly programs so that both parents and youngsters may have the opportunity of familiarizing themselves with the various vocations.
- East Aurora, N. Y.** Ninety per cent of our members pledged to act as counselors for our boys needing vocational help.
- East Los Angeles, Calif.** Our two Key clubs are interested in vocational education. There were 1,300 boys divided into 29 groups to receive information about their special interests.
- East St. Louis, Ill.** Over 2,400 students were assisted in their vocational endeavors.
- El Paso, Tex.** Over 1,000 students, interested in 55 different business and professional occupations, were assisted by men and women in our town.
- Eustis, Fla.** We have started a vocational library for the public school students.
- Greenfield, Ind.** Sixteen adults gave instructions to school pupils interested in various business, professional and trade occupations.
- Highland Park, Calif.** We had 1,200 high school boys instructed by skilled representatives of the different vocations.
- Hinton, Okla.** We are sponsoring night classes in our trade territory and urging a vocational agricultural program in the high school.
- Hollywood, Calif.** Over 1,000 boys of high school age were given information on vocational pursuits and over 125 received personal conferences following the group lecture work.
- Joliet, Ill.** Over 400 interviews were given young people so temporary and permanent employment could be secured, and valuable instructions were available to help them in their school work and vocational interests.
- Lake View, Chicago.** Kiwanians devoted their time to arousing interest in vocational programs broadcast over the Columbia System.
- Lancaster, Pa.** Each Friday afternoon a Kiwanian speaks to the high school groups and his address is broadcast over the radio so parents may get these messages.

VOCATIONAL GUIDANCE—Cont.

- Malone, N. Y.** Five hundred high school pupils filled out questionnaires and were given personal conferences, and later there were group discussions on 34 vocational subjects. No effort is made to have these youngsters pursue any particular endeavor, but Kiwanians point out both the difficulties and advantages in the different vocations.
- Meadville, Pa.** The club urged students to become interested in a "Find Yourself" campaign at the high school.
- Miami, Fla.** A thousand students participated in 33 separate conferences, each representing a different vocational activity.
- Milwaukee, Wis.** Our club cooperated with the National Council on Vocational Guidance to assist in the publicity work for the weekly broadcasts over the National Broadcasting Company's network.
- Mt. Vernon, N. Y.** Following 145 group conferences discussing 46 business and professional classifications, visits were made to commercial and industrial plants so youths might familiarize themselves, by close observation, with their desired life work.
- New Bern, N. C.** Rural children are brought into the city so they can discuss their interests with business and professional men.
- New Liskeard, Ont.** Literature on vocational guidance was purchased for the high school library.
- Norfolk, Va.** The Committee on Vocational Guidance arranged for a series of weekly broadcasts by business and professional men, each discussing his occupational pursuit. Many inquiries were received for personal interviews.
- Olympia, Wash.** At the high school, members of Kiwanis and other service clubs are creating an interest in a vocational guidance program. Over 200 of our citizens have agreed to talk and counsel with the students. Night meetings were held at the Y. M. C. A. for those seeking advice. After general conferences 53 vocations were discussed with interested groups and over 450 personal interviews were completed. In placement work 337 youths were given temporary or permanent employment. Our placement bureau has increased the contact between the schools and employers.
- Roswell, N. M.** Young people are being placed with business and professional men so they will receive direct information and advice.
- Searcy, Ark.** The club is sponsoring a vocational-pal movement so boys can be given vocational direction and education.
- Springfield, Mass.** We have had printed a thousand copies of informational monographs and have had them distributed for use in the public schools.
- Washington, D. C.** The Vocational Guidance Committee gave talks in the high schools and broadcast programs over the radio. Copies of these talks are available for all interested persons.

The following clubs had business and professional men give vocational guidance talks and lectures at schools, conducted group vocational meetings, opened employment bureaus and secured positions, sponsored mechanic and art clubs, granted personal interviews and provided counsel, gave radio talks on vocational guidance, sponsored key clubs, provided vocational literature for schools and libraries, held find yourself campaigns, developed aptitude tests and used questionnaires in determining vocational needs and desires:

EDUCATIONAL WORK

Many activities were undertaken by Kiwanis clubs during the past twelve months. Educational assistance was given students as well as schools, faculties and authorities.

Abbeville, Ala. The club solicited funds to pay the tuition for 42 children who would otherwise have been unable to complete the school term.

Alva, Okla. School children who lost their books because of a fire were furnished new texts by Kiwanians. A survey was made to find all needy children so that milk could be supplied. Prizes were offered in a George Washington essay contest.

Arcadia, Fla. Assisted so that there might be an agricultural course in the public school and we held an essay contest on "Why We Should Buy Home Grown Products."

Arkansas City, Kan. One entire month was given over to a back-to-school movement.

Ballard, Seattle, Wash. We took part in a drive for clothing and shoes for needy school children. About 25,000 articles were received.

Baton Rouge, La. Sponsored a state-wide movement to have the old historical state house used for a museum.

Baxley, Ga. A strenuous effort was put forth so that all children of school age would have the opportunity of going to school. Planned an entertainment program for 1,000 visitors attending a meeting of the Georgia Educational Association. Entertained members of the senior high school class.

Birmingham, Ala. One program was in charge of the sons and daughters of Kiwanians. All of them are college students and were at home for the summer.

Canoga Park-Reseda, Calif. The club succeeded in arousing a great deal of civic interest for our community school.

Casselton, N. D. There were 3,000 entries in the annual county music, spelling and athletic contests.

Cincinnati, Ohio. A teacher was employed at the Kiwanis school for boys and girls during the summer season. A scholarship was given one boy so that he could enter for a commercial art course.

Columbia, S. C. The club has a program for citizenship training, which has been made part of the school curriculum.

Comanche, Okla. At our annual school picnic we entertained 600 youngsters. We were able to secure 300 rural transfer pupils for the high school.

Elwood, Ind. At the commencement exercises our club presented honor awards to outstanding pupils. A donation was made for the Hoosier Art Salon. We observed National Educational Week and proposed special school tax legislation.

Enfield, N. C. Each month an outstanding student of the high school is a guest at our club meetings.

Eugene, Ore. Kiwanians were active in helping to defeat the moving of the University to Corvallis, abolishing three normal schools and the establishing of a law school.

Eustis, Fla. One boy at the Montverde school was given financial aid and a prize was awarded to the winner presenting the best historical letter. We entertained the high school graduates and assisted the Parent-Teachers' Association.

Fort Collins, Colo. Every assistance was given for promoting the college summer school.

Fostoria, Ohio. Outstanding students from the high schools were present at our club meetings.

- Los Gatos, Calif.** Rural schools were visited to give instructive talks on subjects of interest to the youngsters.
- Malone, N. Y.** An investigation was made of the public schools so that every one might be familiar with educational and community problems. Hundreds attended our lecture by Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd.
- Marion, Ky.** The state legislature, after our agitation, withheld a proposed bill which would have presented a serious handicap in maintaining the present high standing of our school system. A dictionary was presented to each one of the 24 county spelling champions and all students with perfect attendance records were entertained at a theatre.
- Mason City, Iowa.** We purchased library memberships for rural children. Entertained honor students and sent a delegation to Webster City to an honor student meeting.
- Medicine Hat, Alta.** The Committee on School Visitation was in touch with all schools within a 25-mile radius of our city. Books, magazines, athletic equipment, musical supplies and fruit were given to schools. Health talks were also given the children. Scholarship prizes were awarded several pupils who during three years had the highest general efficiency averages.
- Milwaukee, Wis.** Worthy students are given financial help and the club continues its interest in the Milwaukee Vocational School.
- Newnan, Ga.** A young girl, an honor pupil, is being given help so that she can complete her education.
- Okemah, Okla.** Sponsored a back-to-school movement and provided shoes and clothing for 40 children. Text books were also secured for needy pupils.
- Olympia, Wash.** A citizenship class is being conducted at the high school.
- Pampa, Tex.** All talented children are given encouragement and recognition.
- Park Ridge, Ill.** Kiwanians took a part in selling tax warrants so that schools might remain open.
- Pekin, Ill.** Two hundred joined in our educational tour to Washington, D. C. The club works with the nature study classes in the county high schools.
- Perth Amboy, N. J.** The club opposed the elimination of county vocational schools and awarded a gold medal to the high school graduate having the highest average during the four-year course.
- Peru, Ind.** A series of lectures by an educational authority were enjoyed by our students and town people. Awarded medals to honor students.
- Peterborough, Ont.** Club members spoke in 23 rural schools on Empire Day.
- Polson, Mont.** The school board held open meetings for the discussion of various problems and we assisted in urging that the Smith-Hughes and domestic science work be continued in the schools of Montana.
- Portland, Ore.** Opposed the elimination of military training at the University of Oregon and cooperated in opening a new museum.

- Santa Barbara, Calif.** The club contributed its share of work so that the Chamber of Commerce could entertain over 5,500 children.
- Spokane, Wash.** Our educational endowment fund aided worthy students to continue their general education and prepare them for the business world. Children of our Pensioned Mothers are being given constant assistance.
- Springville, Utah.** A contribution of \$300.00 has now been given to encourage art exhibits.
- Superior, Wis.** We sponsored a ten-day athletic coaching school at a cost of over \$2,000.00.
- Tonkawa, Okla.** Sponsored a pilgrimage to Washington, D. C. for 25 high school boys. Members of the junior college debate team presented the subject "War Debts" at one of our meetings. We held our second annual oratorical contest for the schools.
- University, Seattle, Wash.** All Kiwanians of our district were invited to give the names of their sons and daughters attending the University of Washington so our club could make friendly contacts with these young people. Winners in a civics and history essay contest were awarded prizes.

AID TO BUSINESS AND INDUSTRY

Many civic improvements, aimed to better the general conditions in business and industry, were accomplished during 1932. They are classified here as improvements of a general nature, fairs, expositions, new markets, new industries, new hotels, and aviation.

Improvements of a General Nature

- Ahoskie, N. C.** Sponsored the opening of a new bank.
- Albany, Ga.** A Georgia products dinner was held to stress the need for improved and enlarged state agricultural development.
- Albany, N. Y.** Kiwanians were placed on various committees for the official opening in June of the Port of Albany, making the city virtually a sea port. Kiwanis was represented in a civic parade with a beautiful float depicting the historical eras in the life of Albany.
- Allston-Brighton, Mass.** All Kiwanians took an interest in the organization of a board of trade.
- Ambler, Pa.** The club was instrumental in starting a campaign for patronizing home-town merchants.
- Americus, Ga.** The club gave its cooperation for combating hoarding of money and sponsored a movement to increase the use of cotton goods and clothing. We also held a Georgia products dinner.
- Anderson, Ind.** Observed a better homes week and had a real estate board equip and furnish a model home. We communicated with United States senators and urged legislation for economic recovery and joined in an anti-hoarding campaign.
- Arcadia, Fla.** Our influence was used to have county commissioners make a worth-while expenditure for a state exhibit at the Century of Progress to be held in Chicago. Assisted in an anti-hoarding campaign. Held an All-Florida products dinner, secured a gas plant, gave cash prizes for a children's essay contest on "Buy Home Grown Products" and entertained visitors at our tourist camp.
- Asheville, N. C.** Pledges were received from property owners so that \$250,000.00 would be spent for improvement work. This was done to help restore business and give work to the unemployed.
- Atlanta, Ga.** Kiwanians participated in National Cotton Week, Georgia Products Week and we engaged in an anti-hoarding campaign and a buy at home drive.
- Atlantic City, N. J.** The club urged an ordinance requiring all applicants for non-transferable mercantile licenses to be investigated. Kiwanians took part in the second annual trade show.
- Aurora, Ill.** Assisted merchants in a friendship week campaign and we took an active part in a drive to restore nation-wide confidence in business.
- Bainbridge, Ga.** Our major objective for the year was better marketing plans for the territory.
- Baxley, Ga.** Advertised the tobacco market, sought to obtain a reduction in the price of gasoline, urged the use of more cotton, and tried to secure a turpentine and rosin warehouse and also a milk company plant. Advertising was extensively carried on for the potato market.
- Boscobel, Wis.** Arrangements were made for a four-day school for cheese makers.
- Bradford, Ill.** For 15 weeks a merchants' booster program, with cash prizes, was successful in bringing from 2,000 to 3,000 people to town each Wednesday evening.

- Brooksville, Fla.** Held a special program on salesmanship and merchandising. Aided an industrial plant to obtain funds for operation and furnished an active committee to engage in an anti-hoarding campaign.
- Caldwell, Idaho.** An industrial survey was made of the community showing the volume of business and the production possibilities. This was done to eliminate waste and to secure new industries. One meeting was given over for boosting the dairy industry.
- Calgary, Alta.** Kiwanians assisted the board of trade in a drive for additional members.
- Chattanooga, Tenn.** A milk war was ended by conferences with producers and distributors so an equitable price could be secured and harmony maintained.
- Covington, Ga.** Sponsored a county canning factory and secured a large electric sign advertising the city.
- Darlington, S. C.** Helped in the establishment of a new bank and solicited advertising funds for the tobacco market. All officials of the building and loan associations were asked to meet to consider increasing the activities of the home loan bank.
- East Suburbs, Kansas City, Mo.** Protested to the city council against prohibiting suburban coal dealers from selling within the corporate limits of the city. During the trade-at-home campaign a committee was appointed to inspect and grade the various mercantile establishments. Prizes were offered to those showing the greatest improvement in merchandise displayed.
- Elwood, Ind.** Endorsed an anti-hoarding campaign and held a mass meeting to prevent withdrawal of bank funds without a 90-day written notice. Sponsored a proposed bank reorganization. Engaged in the preparations for a horse show and the club was instrumental in reorganizing a community council. We helped to make the merchants' exposition a success and became interested in an automatic lock nut proposition which was the invention of a local individual.
- Gas City, Ind.** The Committee on Public Affairs was influential in having a factory remain in operation after the plant officials had ordered the industry stopped.
- Geneva, N. Y.** The club is assisting in traffic problems so out-of-town buyers may have sufficient parking accommodations.
- Georgia Kiwanis District.** Every one of the 2,167 Kiwanians in the state of Georgia participated in a state-wide campaign to increase the use of cotton. All members were urged to wear cotton suits starting with the first regular meeting in May.
- Hollywood, Calif.** One of the foreign trade programs of the club gave sufficient information to the officials of an ice cream company so they were able to run their plant at full capacity for 24 hours each day supplying the trade in Honolulu and South America.
- Jefferson City, Mo.** Our help was given the Chamber of Commerce in a campaign to sell \$300,000.00 worth of stock in a reorganized and consolidated bank merger.
- Kenosha, Wis.** A series of booster meetings was held with the plan of encouraging and increasing the prospects for our industries.
- Lowville, N. Y.** Seventy-eight merchants joined in our trade stimulating campaign. Prizes were offered and approximately 5,000 people were brought to town.
- Madison, S. D.** Invited all business men to a national merchants' institute and organized a live business men's club to replace the Chamber of Commerce.
- Milford, Ohio.** Sponsored the establishment of a credit rating bureau for the business and professional men.
- Monroe, Ga.** The main work of the club was the establishment of a curb market and a small canning plant.

- Montreal, P. Q.** During better business week, the club endeavored to put at least an additional \$500,000.00 in circulation so there could be unemployment relief. One hundred thousand pledge cards, asking citizens to spend a minimum of \$5.00 during the week, were distributed. The results after a general survey showed that merchants had realized an excellent business pick-up. The Committee on Public Affairs cooperated with the Industrial Commission for bringing new industries into Montreal and the Province.
- Niles, Ohio.** A membership campaign for the board of trade was sponsored by our club.
- Norwalk, Calif.** The club spent a great deal of time in bringing to an end a milk war which if continued would have brought disaster to both producers and distributors.
- Ozark, Ala.** A series of trade days during the early months of the year brought approximately 4,000 people to our town.
- Pullman, Wash.** Helped to organize a vigilance committee to protect business houses against robbery and assisted in securing a new ventilating system for a hotel.
- Shamokin, Pa.** Our main interest was to have men returned to the various mines which had been closed because of a strike. After two years of hard work the club was rewarded when the state asked for bids for an eastern outlet to Shamokin. This project will cost about \$250,000.00 and means big things for the next ten years.
- Shenandoah, Iowa.** The annual Kiwanis tour for 1932 was to Niagara Falls. Every one enjoyed the trip.
- Smithfield, N. C.** Stimulated increased sales among local merchants, appointed an anti-hoarding committee and raised \$1,200.00 for advertising the tobacco market. The club is interested in the building of another tobacco warehouse and better parking accommodations for prospective buyers.
- Somerset, Ky.** Secured a milk plant, sponsored a beauty contest to aid local merchants in stimulating their business and appointed a committee to consider the building of a tobacco warehouse.
- Watonga, Okla.** A series of good-will meetings were held in neighboring towns. This gave an opportunity of each man meeting his competitor and to have business men get better acquainted.
- Waupun, Wis.** A committee appeared before the State Industrial Commission in the interest of our local industries.
- Waycross, Ga.** Promoted and encouraged cattle raising in the southern part of the state and the club is attempting to locate a land bank in Waycross. Conducted an anti-hoarding campaign and a wear more cotton program. Held an All-Georgia products luncheon and assisted in securing a new factory for the town.
- Wenatchee, Wash.** The club opposed all misleading advertising so the buying public would not be misled in their purchases.

- Albany, Ore.** A father and son program was held at the high school with the club interested in helping these youths.
- Albuquerque, N. M.** Our annual hobby show for boys of high school age developed many exhibits of handicraft, hobbies, stamp collections and other works of interest. We awarded 17 prizes. Twelve boys were given memberships in the Y. M. C. A.
- Alhambra, Calif.** A visit was made to the California Junior Republic at Chino and the club presented a stereotype casting machine for the print shop.
- Allentown, Pa.** Fifteen needy youngsters were purchased Y. M. C. A. memberships so they would not be denied personal contact, fellowship and health building exercises because of financial limitations.
- Altoona, Pa.** Our Buddy club has a membership of 85. These youths gather at the Y. M. C. A. one night each week, for exercises, entertainment and vocational training.
- Austin, Chicago.** During Youth Week, boys and girls prepared a hobby and vocational exhibit which attracted the attention of many parents, instructors and friends.
- Bartow, Fla.** Observed National Boys' Week with part of the program being a field meet. We obtained the release of one young boy who had been arrested for vagrancy.
- Beacon, N. Y.** An airplane model contest was conducted for high school pupils.
- Beaumont, Tex.** One booth at the South Texas fair was used to display the handicraft work taught all under-privileged boys at the Kiwanis work shop. Our Hallowe'en party was held so that youths would be kept off the streets and out of mischief. We held a father and son program and took newsboys to a baseball game.
- Belleville, Ont.** The Sea Cadet corps, which was sponsored by the Kiwanis club for 36 boys, was one of our major activities for 1932.
- Blue Ridge, Ga.** The sons' and daughters' program was a real success and of benefit to the boys and girls in our town.
- Brunswick, Ga.** A boys' club has been formed for youths too young to join the scouts.
- Buffalo, N. Y.** The club is proud of one young man who graduated from Colgate University and is now to continue his work in preparation for the diplomatic service. Under the sponsorship of Kiwanis, this young man has been given educational opportunities which would fit him for valuable service to humanity.
- Central Cape Cod, Mass.** During Boys' Week, the club took charge of visits made to local industries. Youths were acquainted with the various civic and municipal offices, and prizes were awarded for the best written essays during this observance. On Sunday an interesting sermon was given by a minister, who was president of the club.
- Denver, Colo.** Sunday evening get-togethers are held at the Boys' Home with Kiwanians giving interesting talks on things of interest to the youths. We held a father and son program.
- East Orange, N. J.** Over 2,000 entries were scheduled in our hobby show, and prizes were available for the winners.
- Elgin, Ill.** Our Boys' Week program consisted of a youth's parade, vocational talks, youths taking part in the duties of city officials, athletic programs, and a large banquet.

- El Segundo, Calif.** A group of grade school boys were organized into a group which functions similar to the Kiwanis club. Kiwanians meet with these boys and help them in their everyday problems. The Committee on Vocational Guidance also offers its help for these youngsters.
- Frankfort, Ind.** Sponsored an Older Boys' conference for the Hi-Y club.
- Hamilton, Ont.** The tenth annual Kiwanis encampment for boys gave 56 youngsters a two-weeks' vacation. The expenditure of the camp was \$750.00. Three members are appointed each week to attend the Y. M. C. A. classes conducted for our Kiwanis boys. A father, son and daughter day was held in December.
- Houston, Tex.** In July there were 2,000 boys signed up for our Knot-Hole Gang. The Boys Work Committee is in charge of the various activities for these youths. The entertainment includes baseball and basketball leagues, and there is a variety of welfare assistance for the needy.
- Independence, Mo.** During Boys' Week 16 high school students were in charge of the routine duties of the city government. They were taught the duties of the various offices by the city officials themselves.
- Jacksonville, Fla.** During National Boys' Week students from the high schools were nominated as candidates for various city offices. Campaign speeches were made and the victors were in charge of all branches of the city government for several hours. Our father and son meeting was a very worth while occasion.
- Joplin, Mo.** An inter-city baseball league, supervised recreation, industrial tours, and character and recreational programs were part of our program for the youths of Joplin. Over 100 under-privileged boys are enrolled in the Kiwanis Y. M. C. A. club.
- Lake View, Chicago.** Our fourth annual handicraft exposition brought in over 400 entries, and an attendance of over 13,000 adults visited the show. Fifty prizes were awarded. We held our annual sons' and daughters' banquet.
- Livingston, N. J.** The son of a deceased Kiwanian was secured a comfortable home with a responsible family.
- London, Ont.** A club has been organized for all of the older boys who graduated from the Ki-Y club, and a club room has been secured for these youths. Forty-eight boys were sent to a summer camp. Regular meetings are held on Thursday nights and Sunday mornings at the Y. M. C. A. where a boys' orchestra, various programs and entertainments are enjoyed by these youths. Our minstrel show secured us over \$3,000.00 for boys' work activities.
- Marion, Ohio.** Our fourth annual hobby show had 800 entries of handicraft, painting, sculpturing and other hobbies. Playground work was supervised for all under-privileged children during the summer.
- Mason City, Iowa.** Personal service by Kiwanians for worthy youngsters commenced in January. There were 575 exhibits at our sixth annual hobby show. Meetings are held in the Y. M. C. A. for under-privileged boys, and our circus in December included all kinds of activities which the club is sponsoring for these youths.
- Midland, Ont.** The annual dog derby and hobby shows were well attended and successful. Ten boys were sent to a summer camp.
- Montreal, P. Q.** All Kiwanians are interested in service work at the Griffintown boys' club and at the boys' farm and training school at Shawbridge. Clothing, shoes, glasses, musical instruments, a billiard table and other necessities were given during 1932. Concerts, moving picture shows and entertainments are held weekly. Several thousand children were entertained at picnics and sporting events. Three thousand people attended our weekly boxing contest, and a picnic was held at Bnai Brith, a mountain camp for Jewish boys.

- Moscow, Idaho.** A gang of boys, annoying to residents, has been formed into a club so they can be supervised. Our main work with them is along vocational and athletic lines.
- Nashville, Tenn.** Contributed \$250.00 for a boys' work secretary at the Y. M. C. A. This individual meets with the Scouts and other groups. Over 500 boys at a penal institution are provided with entertainments. Boys were sent to a summer camp and vocational service is rendered whenever possible.
- New York, N. Y.** Over 300 boys at our summer camp were taught craft work and given instruction in vocational endeavors.
- Norristown, Pa.** Sent 75 boys to camp and all Kiwanians are rendering personal service to the worthy youths of the community. Each boy must bring his school report card so our members may take an individual interest in the welfare and progress of these boys.
- Orange-West Orange, N. J.** Boys and girls were sent to summer camps. A basketball league was organized at the Y. M. C. A., and all service clubs joined to conduct a mammoth hobby show. Educational motion pictures are given once each week at the Y.M.C.A. for all young people.
- Ottawa, Ont.** Over 4,000 were in attendance during the winter months at our boys' club. Medical examinations, clothing, teaching of manual training and handicraft, and entertainments were all under the direction of our members. A hobby show developed a variety of bird-house models.
- Rome, N. Y.** At our boys' camp we have built a new swimming pool and installed an electric light system. Five hundred evergreen trees were also planted on this property.
- St. Augustine, Fla.** The club was responsible for the city-wide observance of National Boys' Week. Churches, schools, city officials, Boy Scouts and all others took part in our daily programs.
- San Bernardino, Calif.** The club hired an instructor and took over the responsibility of the Red Shield club of the Salvation Army. A father and son day was held in December.
- San Fernando, Calif.** Monthly subscriptions are provided for the McKinley Boys' Home.
- Sanford, Fla.** A drive was made against all gambling devices, and an active part was taken in National Boys' Week.
- Sanger, Calif.** Many youngsters were reported to be gathering themselves in street gangs, and through cooperation with the educational authorities, Kiwanis paid the expenses for lighting a portion of the athletic field where all boys participated in sports. In this way the gangs were broken up.
- Spokane, Wash.** Our Big Brother committee in 1932 organized five sub-committees to carry on an extensive program. Forty-three Kiwanians were Big Brothers to 62 youngsters. Our members encouraged Boy Scout activities and made available free instruction in mechanical drawing, art work and music. The Big Brothers contacted 30 schools to secure duplicate report cards. Clothing, medical service, part-time employment, court work and a big picnic were all part of our program.
- Toronto, Ont.** At our boys' club vocational classes are conducted in handicraft, printing and music. Over \$1,000.00 was spent building a new dining hall and making improvements at the club. There are two bands, a bugle and harmonica, and both gave concerts to aid the Glad Hand club of Evangel Hall. The harmonica band won first prize at the Broadview boys' fall fair. The woodworking class prepared 400 toys for distribution at Christmas, and a new motion picture projector was purchased. There were 200 boys present at a Hallowe'en party. Our sons' and daughters' day was a delightful occasion.

- Auburn, N. Y.** The club felt that it was losing a real chance for some personal service so it is returning to its Kiwanis Daddy plan for under-privileged child work. Fourteen boys were sent to a summer camp.
- Berea, Ky.** The committee on Under-Privileged Child is active in inducing Kiwanians to take an interest in boys whose fathers are dead, or who need personal help. Twenty boys are now being given this service.
- Birmingham, Ala.** Ten Kiwanis Big Brothers are giving personal service. A donation was made to the Boys' Council of Birmingham. During National Boys' Week speakers were present at all the high schools.
- Burlington, Iowa.** Boys were sent to a conference at Ames and 25 youngsters are being contacted in our Big Brother work.
- Elmira, N. Y.** Our club is sponsoring a group of 62 boys between the ages of 9 and 15 years. Entertainment, athletics and personal supervision were available for them during the year.

Winnipeg, Man. A budget of \$3,730.00 was approved for 1932 service work with boys and girls. We arranged for a boys' conference and visited the boys' club camp in July.

Yonkers, N. Y. Our Boys Work Committee is interested in establishing a series of clubs in the various juvenile delinquency areas of the city, for the development of good citizenship. A recreational program for colored boys and girls of the community is also one of the club's endeavors. Boys taken from the Children's Court are assigned directly to the Big Brother Committee. Y. M. C. A. memberships are provided for all worthy youngsters.

- Galveston, Tex.** Each Saturday the Committee on Under-privileged Child visits the juvenile court and assists unfortunate children. During National Boys' Week a full program was carried out under the auspices of Kiwanis.
- Glendale, Calif.** We have organized a Coordinating Council to handle all the problems of delinquent boys and girls. The Y. M. C. A., Boy Scouts, police officials, school authorities, court officers and representatives of the Parent-Teachers' Association assist us in our work.
- Greensburg, Pa.** All service clubs in the county have joined to help juvenile delinquents who are paroled to the custody of responsible citizens.
- Jamestown, N. Y.** Boys and girls from the children's court are placed under probation and Kiwanians have taken the responsibility of personally assisting these unfortunate youths. A committee of 16 Kiwanians are aiding in the formation of county Y. M. C. A. clubs in the smaller communities.
- Kenmore, Ohio.** Our club is interested in helping the Home for Juvenile Youths.
- Kent, Ohio.** The Committee on Under-Privileged Child works with the probate judge for accepting youngsters who need supervision.
- Lancaster, Pa.** Kiwanians act as parole officers for boys sent to them from the courts.
- Middlesboro, Ky.** All delinquent boys under 16 years of age are turned over to the club and Kiwanians take an active and personal interest in these youths.
- New Brunswick, N. J.** Youthful offenders, after instruction has been received from the court, are turned over to Kiwanians.
- Oklahoma City, Okla.** The county attorney has paroled 17 boys to our Committee on Under-privileged Child. A junior police unit has been organized for 36 senior high school boys. Supervised drill and uniforms will be provided for this group.
- Olympia, Wash.** Assistance is given to the prosecuting attorney so adult advisers can be secured for boys paroled from court.
- Omaha, Neb.** A steadily increasing number of pre-delinquent boys sent to us from the juvenile court are being given the personal attention of our members.
- Pampa, Tex.** A committee has been appointed to investigate the home conditions and environment of delinquent boys. It is our plan to assist these youths so they can be kept from the reformatory.
- Pittsburg, Kan.** We work with all deserving lads who are first offenders and who have been paroled to our Committee on Under-Privileged Child.
- Plymouth, Pa.** The club asked the court to appoint three Kiwanians as probationary officers.
- Ridgefield Park, N. J.** Kiwanians worked with the courts on all under-privileged child cases. Summer vacations were arranged for several youths.
- Riverside, Calif.** Kiwanians are contacting the Juvenile Industrial Institution and are giving books and personal service to these unfortunate youths.
- St. Petersburg, Fla.** Returned one youngster to Georgia when authorities were going to commit the youth on a technical larceny charge.
- Utica, N. Y.** Our full cooperation is given the probation court in the handling of cases of all young men.

PLAYGROUNDS AND RECREATION

- Amarillo, Tex.** Our city-wide Hallowe'en party was attended by over 6,000 children. The local college and high school bands furnished the music.
- Anderson, Ind.** The community Easter egg hunt interested 3,000 children and over 6,000 people were in attendance. There were 300 awards. The police, fire departments, Boy Scouts and the safety patrol boys assisted in the work of handling the groups.
- Auburn, Wash.** Raised funds to employ a playground instructor who would supervise the activities of the boys and girls. During the ten-week season there was a total attendance of nearly 8,000 youths and adults at the playground. We also held a swimming school for three days and assisted in the opening of a golf course.
- Baxter Springs, Kan.** Kiwanis park was completed with a baseball diamond, tennis courts, adequate camping equipment, benches, tables, shelters and a lighting system. The club is now considering the construction of a swimming pool. Prizes were awarded in a kite flying contest.
- Bayonne, N. J.** There were over 100 entries in our annual pet show with prizes awarded for the smallest, most beautiful, and the comical dogs, cats and other pets.
- Brockton, Mass.** We entertained over 10,000 children at an outdoor program which included baseball games and track events. There were six professional acts and fireworks.
- Burlington, Iowa.** A \$40,000.00 swimming pool sponsored by the club was opened in June. It is 150 feet long and 100 feet wide and has a bath house with 60 dressing rooms.

- Covington, Ga.** Kiwanians met with rural community groups for encouraging the erection of a community house.
- Edmonton, Alta.** The mayor and city councillors were our guests.
- Elkton, Md.** The club was interested in the organization of a city planning commission composed of technicians, engineers, members of the Board of Town Commissioners and the Chamber of Commerce.
- Hope, Ark.** The club insisted on the enforcement of all traffic laws and regulations.
- Jackson, Ga.** Developed a plan for better mail and express service and urged rigid economy in city, county, state and national government.
- Kansas City, Kan.** Forty members of the club enrolled in a tax study club so that Kiwanis might offer its suggestions and helpful assistance to various taxing bodies.

Individual Cases of Assistance

- Ada, Okla.** All old clothing was collected and distributed to the poor.
- Akron, Ohio.** The Florence Crittenton Home which the club organized in 1921, with an investment of \$20,000.00, was redecorated. The Juvenile Court and the Court of Domestic Relations works along with Kiwanis in this activity.
- Allentown, Pa.** The club has made contributions for a community cafeteria where meals are served to the poor for five and ten cents. A vacant store building was filled with toys so 15,000 children and adults to whom Christmas might have been a bit unreal could have a good time.
- Arcadia, Fla.** Boys of the manual training department and girls of the domestic science class repaired old toys which were distributed to poor youngsters at Christmas. We received about two truck loads of gifts. A ten-acre community garden was sponsored by the club.
- Arkansas City, Kan.** Through our efforts a shoe repair shop was opened at the Salvation Army quarters. Nine hundred children attended our theatre party with admission being non-perishable food. This was later distributed to the poor.
- Atchison, Kan.** Over 3,000 fruit jars were collected and given to the welfare board for canning purposes for the needy. Clothing was also distributed.
- Atlanta, Ga.** There were over 12,000 toys collected and distributed among 4,000 unfortunate families.
- Bristol, Tenn.** We established and put into operation a community canning kitchen so all fruits and vegetables might be utilized for the needy.
- Brookhaven, Miss.** A mother was sent to Jackson for an eye operation. Her sight was restored and she was able to see her own child for the first time.
- Hollywood, Calif.** Made arrangements for the distribution of food and clothing to all destitute people.
- Jersey City, N. J.** After investigating over 1,000 cases, there were 250 boys who received clothing and a Christmas dinner. Sixteen families were helped with medical aid, food and other necessities.
- Kingston, Ont.** The annual Kiwanis carnival gave us over \$7,000.00 for our relief work. This was the second largest sum ever realized by the club.
- Lakewood, Ohio.** Our third annual old clothes campaign was so successful that over 2,000 persons were outfitted. The balance was distributed among the welfare societies in our town. We also distributed milk and food and found jobs for some of the unemployed.
- Portland, Ore.** We signed a contract to furnish clothing for all children in four welfare institutions.
- Riverdale, Toronto, Ont.** Sent an invalid woman and her family to Scotland; participated in the relief fund drive; made a donation to the Canadian Federation for the blind; paid the taxes of a dependent individual; distributed over 1,500 Christmas baskets, and made donations of money, food and clothing to relief groups.
- St. Johnsbury, Vt.** The club realized over \$1,000.00 for supplies when our annual food show attracted over 3,000 people.

ASSISTANCE TO THE NEEDY—Cont.

- St. Lawrence, Montreal, P. Q.** Food, clothing and relief for the distressed were some of our activities during 1932.
- Salem, Ore.** Took part in a drive to find jobs for the unemployed. More than \$110,000.00 worth of work was secured and Kiwanis lead the organizations in getting these assignments. Funds were available to help maintain a soup kitchen for transients. Gifts and entertainments were available for the poor at Christmas time.
- Shelby, N. C.** The club purchased canning equipment, with a 3,000 daily capacity, so all surplus vegetables and fruits could be preserved for distribution among the poor during the winter.
- Spokane, Wash.** The 17th and 18th Pensioned Mothers' Homes were built during 1932. All of these homes are in constant use and the club's real estate holdings are valued at approximately \$50,000.00. The 40-acre summer camp, costing over \$6,000.00, was used for under-nourished and unfortunate youngsters. In December, the first pensioned mother was given free use of her home, without taxes, for the rest of her life. This worthy woman has raised her four children, paid her \$15.00 per month for 110 months without missing, thus paying up the appraised value of the home. The sewing class continues its excellent work and the club was instrumental in securing piano lessons for daughters of some of our pensioned mothers. House furnishings, clothing, shoes, canning supplies, food and milk were distributed among the group during the year. We engaged in a back-to-work campaign.
- Springfield, Mo.** Old clothes were collected and 19,573 garments were distributed to children and adults. All clothing was repaired in the Kiwanis clothes shop. Donations were made to charity organizations and thousands of toys were collected and repaired so poor youngsters might have a happy Christmas. The Kiwanis thrift gardens of 28 acres were started in 1932.
- Vancouver, B. C.** Over \$2,000.00 was spent for fuel, clothing, milk, fruit, vegetables and cod liver oil for the poor.
- Waterloo, Iowa.** Arrangements were made with the Waterloo Canning Company so 40,000 cans of tomatoes could be preserved for winter use. The company donated the entire use of their equipment. There were 611 men and women furnished garden seeds and in addition to our contributions a total of nearly \$1,000.00 was used for welfare aid.
- Westbrook, Me.** A recreational headquarters was opened for the unemployed and funds were used to care for hospital cases and those needing clothing.
- Wrens, Ga.** The club opened a small cannery at the community hall and 4,000 cans of vegetables were prepared for distribution to the needy. Over 200 packages were delivered to the poor at Christmas.

- Amsterdam, N. Y.** Kiwanians helped to raise \$1,000.00 for the city hospital.
- Ann Arbor, Mich.** Our receipts were \$1,700.00 from a rummage sale which went to benefit the University Hospital. Our budget for the hospital during 1932 was set at \$4,000.00.
- Atlantic City, N. J.** The club entertained the graduating class of the Hospital Nurses' Training School and we awarded to Miss Hilda Weber, who gave the best service to under-privileged children during her training school career, a prize of \$25.00. The club helped to furnish a special room in the Municipal Hospital.
- Brooklyn, N. Y.** Some x-ray equipment at a cost of \$700.00 was given to a hospital doing crippled children's work.
- Chillicothe, Ohio.** The club furnished one room in the new addition to the city hospital.
- Doylestown, Pa.** We sponsored an annual hospital campaign for \$6,000.00.
- Joplin, Mo.** When a hospital was to close its doors because of lack of funds, Kiwanians helped to raise money so the institution might remain open.
- Louisburg, N. C.** Equipped and furnished a room in the new hospital and the club is giving its help in establishing a county hospital.

HEALTH AND SANITATION

The following show the ways in which Kiwanis clubs worked to improve health and sanitary conditions in their respective cities.

- Ada, Okla.** Observed national children's health day and insisted upon physicians making milk inspections and tests.
- Albuquerque, N. M.** An appropriation was given for serum and vaccine for the County Health Department which lacked sufficient funds to carry on general health work.

HEALTH AND SANITATION—Cont.

- Anderson, Ind.** Cooperation was given the Health Center, which operates with the community free clinic, so the dangers of epidemics could be eliminated. The club carried on an educational campaign, the public reporting all contagious diseases promptly for immunization.
- Belmar, N. J.** Pressure was brought to bear so that the services of the community nurse would be continued. The club contributes \$200.00 a year for her work.
- Bradford, Ill.** General inoculation of children to prevent diphtheria was carried on in December.
- Bremerton, Wash.** A posture clinic with prizes for the grades, high school and junior high was one of the club's activities.
- Charlotte, N. C.** A maternity clinic, where hundreds of destitute mothers could receive care and instruction, received the club's assistance. The work is carried on by the medical students of Duke University. In about five months there were over 105 cases which received help.
- Chelsea, Mich.** Health education for rural schools, health lectures for town people and the selling of tuberculosis seals, all received Kiwanis approval and help.
- Erwin, Tenn.** We were successful in having retained a county health office which consists of a doctor, a nurse and a sanitary officer.
- Fall River, Mass.** The club gave approximately \$1,000.00 so the District Nursing Association might carry on its maternal and child welfare work. Formerly the city supported this health service but it was necessary for the club to carry on the activity.
- Fredericksburg, Va.** Over \$200.00 was raised to aid the Stafford County Health Association. Kiwanians repaired one home where out of a family of eleven, eight had contracted tuberculosis.
- Galt, Ont.** We gave \$825.00 to the Victorian Order of Nurses.
- Greenville, N. C.** A contest was held in the county to award prizes to the healthiest girls.
- Harvey, Ill.** We sold \$683.00 worth of Christmas seals.
- Hopkinsville, Ky.** After about seven years of agitation we finally succeeded in introducing a bill in the legislature for issuing bonds for a sanitary sewage system.
- Indiana, Pa.** We had as guests the graduating class of the Indiana Hospital.
- Kirksville, Mo.** A clinic for the blind and for the prevention and cure of blindness was held in November.
- Mt. Vernon, Ind.** Over 3,500 persons, including both adults and children, took advantage of our community-wide immunization program. A donation was given to the State Sunshine Society.
- Neenah, Wis.** Through action of the club a dental hygienist was appointed for the schools.
- New Albany, Ind.** The club was active in the passage of a milk ordinance for the city.
- Orlando, Fla.** Free medical examination for high school students was made available by our medical society.
- Pittsfield, Mass.** Our third annual healthy baby show and health food exposition was held for six days with a total attendance of 5,709. Thirteen booths were rented to exhibitors of health articles such as food, milk, shoes, clothing and accessories. Prizes were awarded the 12 healthiest children. About \$250.00 was cleared on this venture but money making is not the object of the show. The money was used for the Kiwanis Health Camp.
- Pullman, Wash.** Following an announcement that there would be no budget funds for the school nurse, the club decided to secure the part-time services of a nurse.
- Tahlequah, Okla.** There were 717 students given vaccines for the prevention of typhoid fever.
- Victoria, B. C.** At the Provincial Exhibition we distributed 5,000 pamphlets on the prevention of tuberculosis. Over 3,000 children were weighed and examined and advice given to parents. The tuberculosis seal campaign receipts were approximately \$3,700.00.
- Winnipeg, Man.** We gave over \$1,600.00 for purchasing equipment for a cancer clinic, a donation was made to the Winnipeg Health League and an anti-mosquito campaign was part of the club's health program.

Other clubs were interested in general health clinics, sanitariums and camps, in selling health seals, guarding against epidemics, purchasing equipment for health organizations, and giving assistance to community nurses and health officers. Securing pure milk, good water supply, proper sewage disposal and cleaning up polluted streams were other activities.

CONSERVATION

- Ada, Okla.** We built several nursery ponds for 4,000 bass which were received from the state fish and game commission.
- Amarillo, Tex.** Arbor Day was observed and 50 of our members planted trees in one of the city parks.
- Anderson, Ind.** During the George Washington Bicentennial an acre of trees was planted as part of a reforestation program.
- Ashland, Ky.** One meeting was given over to the development of an Izaak Walton program.
- Billings, Mont.** Fifty-six Kiwanians have joined the volunteer fire wardens' department to answer calls from the National Forest Service.
- Chelsea, Mich.** One thousand trees were planted on Arbor Day as part of our Washington Bicentennial activities.
- Clarksburg, W. Va.** There were 9,000 evergreen trees planted in a 12-acre plot given to us by the city.
- Clatskanie, Ore.** We secured 40,000 trout for our river and the club financed and built pens for 400 pheasants and other birds.
- Dade City, Fla.** To maintain a uniform water level for the protection of fish, the club's first objective was an inter-lake and river canal system which was suggested by Kiwanian W. M. Larkin.
- Hynes-Clearwater-Hollydale, Calif.** Over 900 trees were given to school children for planting in their own home yards.
- Kalispell, Mont.** Opposed a decrease in appropriations for the state forestry department and we had planted 1,000 trees in the spring.

- Michigan Kiwanis District.** The Michigan Kiwanis Forest, which is part of the Huron National Forest on the banks of the Au Sable River near East Tawas, was dedicated on September 21, 1928. Planting has gone on since this time and it is the largest project of its kind ever undertaken by a civic organization.
- Wisconsin-Upper Michigan Kiwanis District.** In 1930 funds were received from clubs for a Kiwanis Forest Nursery. Work was started with 2,000,000 sprouts which were transplanted in 1932. The nursery is to be cared for by the forestry division of the federal government. The total cost of this Kiwanis nursery at Rhinelanders will be \$15,000.00.
